WE SHOULD BE REPORTING!

Is Our District Reporting?

Some Clubs are. Some are not. We are half-way through the Club year. Taking a glimpse at reporting, in the month of October—28 Club reported nothing that month. Looking at December—27 Clubs reported nothing that month (not necessarily the same Clubs). So, what does it mean for those Clubs not reporting? Does it mean that they don't care; probably not. Does it mean they don't know how; probably not because info and

help are available.

Does it mean they had nothing to report that month, not even meetings? Are they waiting to do it all on June 28? I HOPE not.

So, when should they be reporting? Ideally, at the end of every month. If that isn't possible then report quarterly on these dates:

In September by the 28th

In December by the 28th

In March by the 28th

In June by the 25th

Part 1—Benefits to each Club for Reporting (In this issue)

What benefits make reporting beneficial to the Club.

- It helps the Club assess weaknesses and strengths.
- It helps the Club get a BIG picture of involvement.
- It serves as a road map.
- It provides a comparison year to year.
- It helps Officers report to Club members.

Did you know that on June 28 [near end of Club year (or quarterly, or biannually)] you can export a report to a spreadsheet. Why is that useful? **So you can let the community know what the Club has done.** You can edit and filter the spreadsheet and from that do a news release to the local paper.

Here is a report I sent to the newspaper for the Club I am a member of for the 2022-2023 Club Year:

Past President and Publicity Chair Galen Burkholder has issued this statement about what the club has done from July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023. He reports the club has served 23,220 people in 74 activities with 1,136 volunteer hours. The club raised \$13,127 in funds and donated \$20,242.

"But that report is just a bunch of numbers," he said. "How does one realize what they mean? Let me explain.

Let's look at service:

- Under Vision: The club members collected 905 pairs of glasses and conducted 3,000 vision screen tests; 260 volunteer hours.
- Environment Adopt-A-Highway: People Served 1,000, 11 volunteers, 26.5 hours.
- Humanitarian Red Cross Blood Drives: People Served 100, 16 volunteers, 61 hours.
- Humanitarian Carlisle Events collecting donations for Ukraine: 9,000 people, 3 volunteers, 13.5 hours.
- Awareness, Education Children's Fair: 225 people, 1 volunteer, 3 volunteer hours.
- Awareness, Education Flags for Heroes: 6,000 people, 16 volunteers, 21.5 hours.
- Service Activity Home football concession stand: 3,000 people (Maximum allowed to report) 26 volunteers, 478 hours.
- Meetings: 208 people, 229 hours.

Let's look at Fundraising:

- Golf Tournament \$1,930
- Concession Stand Home Football Games: \$9,994

So where did the money go. Let's look at donations:

- Boy Scout Troop 120 for cleanup after football games: \$375
- Cub Scout 251 for cleanup after football games: \$375
- Environment Lowes gift cards for Kentucky Flood Relief: \$350
- Youth Shippensburg Little League: \$250
- Environment Partnership for Better Health: Cumberland Valley Rail Council: \$200
- Hunger Partnership for Better Health: Shippensburg Produce Outreach:
 \$200
- Partnership for Better Health: SRC Hounds Packs: \$200
- Partnership for Better Health: Christ Among Neighbors: \$200
- Partnership for Better Health: Shippensburg Community Nurse: \$200
- Childhood Cancer Four Diamonds Penn State Children's Hospital: \$200
- Youth Kids Summer Swim Lessons: \$200
- Shippensburg Coy Public Library Summer Reading Program: \$150
- Shippensburg Chamber of Commerce: \$100
- Western Cumberland County Lions Project Golf Tournament: \$100

Burkholder concluded, "As you can see the Club had a very active and successful year. Thank you to the community for supporting us in these efforts."

So why tell the newspaper?

- It makes it easier to invite someone to a meeting.
- The Club might end up with a new member.

So, what Club wants a new member anyway?

More members yield the ability to do more service.

Sock It To Me in Hanover



Lions Clubs around the world are, also, encouraged to sponsor students in the Lions International Essay Contest. The Essay Contest was created to offer the opportunity to visually impaired young people to express their idea of world peace. The theme is, also, "Peace Without Limits." Students who are visually impaired and who are ages 11-13 as of November 15 are eligible to participate. The Essay Contest rules and application form are available on the LCI website.

The A B C's of LCIF

This is the seventh edition of "The A B C's of LCIF." So what did we learn so far?

- The Foundation has been in existence for over 55 years and has awarded more than
 1.1 billion U.S. dollars in grants!
- LCIF is the charitable arm of LCI, designed to assist Lions with humanitarian projects.
- Our global causes include vision, youth, disaster relief, humanitarian efforts, diabetes, childhood cancer, hunger, and the environment.
- LCIF grants are funded by donations from Lions clubs and individual members worldwide.
- There are basically 9 distinct types of Grants.
- LCIF does not receive any portion of Lions membership dues. 100% of your financial gift goes to grants and program expenses, not Administration.
- Administrative costs are handled through the returns on investment income.
- Donors can invest with confidence. LCIF consistently receives a 4-star rating from <u>Charity Navigator</u> and was also <u>named the #1 NGO</u> to partner with for these reasons by Financial Times.

- No matter where across the globe disasters strike, Lions are there when recovery funds are needed.
- For funds to be presented to a specific area, there must be a Lions Club (or Clubs) located in that area. They then become the distribution center for all Foundation funds.
- Matching Grants are for large-scale humanitarian projects which will serve a large population.
- Childhood Cancer Grants do not fund medical care directly but are used to acquire equipment or improve facilities.
- Diabetes Grants focus on large-scale prevention, management, awareness, and screening projects designed to improve the public health of a community.
- Hunger Grants are designed to support school-based feeding programs, food banks, feeding centers, and similar facilities that provide food to people when they need it most

This month, the grant type we'll discuss is: **SightFirst.** There are 2 grant types that fall_within the SightFirst program

The first is the **SightFirst Comprehensive Eye Care** grant program of Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) is to develop or improve comprehensive eye care systems to fight blindness and vision loss, and to assist people who are blind and visually impaired in underserved communities. SightFirst supports high-quality, cost-effective, equitable, and sustainable eye care projects that focus on the following:

- ✓ Upgrading the infrastructure of existing eye care facilities
- ✓ Training eye care professionals and management personnel
- ✓ Increasing access to eye care services and eye health education SightFirst Comprehensive Eye Care does not provide funding for expenses related to daily operation of facilities, rent, salaries, the construction of new facilities, scientific research and individual assistance.

The second type is the **SightFirst Research** grant which provide funds to support public health research initiatives that evaluate and directly influence the operation of the SightFirst program. SightFirst research projects evaluate existing approaches, identify and validate innovative or improved program strategies, determine the eye care needs of a particular region or population and/or assess the barriers to uptake of eye care services. Research grants of up to US\$100,000 will be awarded to support an experienced individual, institution, organization or consortium engaged in a public health research project to be completed in less than 36 months. I thought you'd like to know that from July 2023 to December 2023, (the first 6 months of our Lion's year) LCIF has awarded 148 disaster relief-related grants totaling \$5,750,476 US.

We Serve!

From the desk of PDG Dennis Cope, Global Service Team (GST) Coordinator

Hello Lions, and welcome to February. I hope all of you are surviving, if not enjoying, these winter months.

A recent Letter to the Editor in my local newspaper caught my attention with the headline, "Help Those In Need." The author, a psychotherapist, stated she has "seen many individuals who are alone for a variety of reasons and in need of someone to help them in some way." She goes on to describe some of those needs and writes she is aware of communities "where such a community network exists, comprised of sincere individuals who will offer a ride or to provide a service for someone who lives alone."

Then came the statement that caused me the most grief, but wasn't necessarily a surprise. The author wrote, "In the 30 years I have lived in [this] County, I have not seen any such network as this. There are many groups that have formed over the years and lately, many social media posts that hint of the idea that we need to be there for each other. But I have not seen any of these groups that have actually done a service to community members in need."

Folks, there is a Lions club in the community listed as the author's home! Why doesn't she know about this club and that community service is the reason it exists? I believe this situation points to a primary reason so many of our clubs are struggling to attract new members. Many of our clubs are not making their presence known and aggressively seeking ways to serve individuals in need in their communities.

It is not difficult to come up with may excuses as to why this is the case, and most of them come down to leadership and communication. If you want to rejuvenate your club and start attracting new members, it will take leaders who are willing to devote time and effort to the cause along with ongoing communication through community outreach and marketing. Community outreach includes identifying and partnering with other non-profit groups who provide humanitarian service. Marketing includes letting every member of your community know your club stands ready and willing to provide assistance when needed.

If your club is struggling, take time to reflect on exactly how aggressively you are seeking to assist those in need. Start reaching out to community leaders and other organizations to find out the needs that exist and how your club could work to address those needs. Consider borough council members, township supervisors, the police chief, the head of the fire department, and county and non-profit agencies that work to serve underprivileged individuals in the community.


This type of oureach will "get the word out" that your club is active and wants to help people in need. It will also put you in contact with potential new members. If your club shows a sincere interest and follows through with assistance, people will notice and be more likely to want to join you in your service.
