

#### A Message From the 1st Vice District Governor

Fellow Lions, Lioness/Lions and Leos:

As February comes to an end, it is almost time to SPRING forward. Hopefully, all of you have had time to digest my message for last month about peas. (I have actually had a number of people say they enjoyed that message, truly liberal with their praise, -thanks). Since we examined "peas" last month, the next logical step would be to look at "Q's". As luck would have it, in February, I just spent a week at the Q Center (St. Charles). Who could find a better resource to explore Q s. The week was part of training and learning for incoming District Governors from around the world. I am happy to report that many of the District Governors from Pennsylvania spent a great deal of time at the *library* aka Bistro. This location provided direct hands-on research,

regarding one of the theories of "Watch your P s and Q s ". Yes, legend has it that early bartenders kept track of patron's drinks by recording the number of pints or quarts they ordered. As the old saying goes, I got some good news and some bad news. Let's start with the bad news first. FLD Killian has been Career Changed. He was doing so well with his training and made it through until the point when the handler mimicked being blind. When Killian realized he was guiding a blind person, he stressed out. The more the trainer and handler worked with him, the more stressed he became until he reached the point that he refused to put on the harness. This does happen sometimes with the dogs in training. Leader Dogs works with about 450 dogs a year and only about 200 actually become Leader Dogs. But the good news is I am happy to say he came home. With the help of my Daughter-in-law, my Grandchildren, and I loaded up the truck and headed to Michigan to bring Killian home. On February 11<sup>th</sup>, we picked up Killian and he is now my forever boy. My plan is when I can walk again, (I'm in a boot cast from ankle and foot surgery) to get Killian certified to be a Therapy Dog. On February 18<sup>th</sup>, CC Killian and I, along with my Grandson's help since I'm still using a scooter, represent Leader Dogs by attended the Community Breakfast sponsored by the York Springs Lions Club. I estimated about 150-175 people attended. We had a great time and talked to a lot of people.

Here is some more good news. I have planned a bus trip to Leader Dogs for the Blind in Rochester Hills, Michigan. Mark your calendars for July 21st, 22nd and 23rd for the bus trip. We will lead early Friday morning with several stops on the way to Leader Dogs and stay at Days Inn. The cost for the hotel is \$75.00 a night plus tax. The cost is about \$164.00 per room for the 2 nights. The hotel does offer breakfast. Food and hotel is the responsibility of the individual. The cost for the bus is \$154.00 per person. We will travel on Friday to Michigan; on Saturday we have a presentation and tour Leader Dogs and have a blindfold walk. Sunday we will leave Michigan and return home. We will be traveling in a 47 passenger bus from Elite Coach. This trip is similar to the one in October 2018 which was fun and educational.







#### Arendtsville Lions Learn About CERT

The February 14, 2023, Arendtsville Lions Club meeting featured a special presentation by Zone Chair Ray Highlands, who is also the Lions District 14-C Disater Relief Coordinator. Lion Ray's presentation provided an overview of Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT) and how they can be an effective way to help communities prepare for disaster situations, respond during an emergency, and recover after an emergency. Lion Ray has an extensive background in emergency response, including military service, working for PEMA, and working for FEMA. He explained that a "disaster" is when a situation exceeds the response capability of a local jurisdiction. In cases when federal assistance is needed, the federal government will cover 75% of the cost, and local municipalities are responsible for 25%. To be a certified CERT, team members must participate in at least 20 hours of training. The training includes preparedness, scene assessment, search and rescue, fire safety, triage and treatments, and incident command. Communities that utilize CERTs help residents become a resource to address a problem rather than part of the problem.

Following Lion Ray's presentation, the club approved a \$500 donation to LCIF for Earthquake relief efforts in Turkey and Syria.

Shiloh Lions Hoops for Sight will be a "live" event this year for the first time since 2019. We are excited to be back to the actual foul shots competition. This will be our 15<sup>th</sup> year for the event, and even though the past three years were done through virtual pledges and an auction instead of the raffle, the support was amazing. Since we started the event, we have donated over \$100,000 to the Foundation Fighting Blindness (FFB) to support research for the cure/treatment of Retinal Degenerative Diseases. When we started this 15 years ago, children and adults alike were still being told that there was no hope, no cure or treatment for their Retinitis Pigmentosa (RP), their Macular Degeneration or other retinal disease. Since then,



FFB has supported clinical trials for potential treatments and funded 81 grants globally (just in 2022). Over 280 retinal disease-causing genes have been identified. The first gene therapy for inherited diseases of the eye and the first bionic retina have been FDA approved. Vision has actually been restored to some patients. We're almost there! We're so close to beating these diseases.

Thank you for all of your support the past 14 years. Please help again this year to make our 15<sup>th</sup> year one of our best FFB donations yet. We need shooters with pledges and/or donations. #### We Serve!

#### From the desk of PDG Dennis Cope, Global Service Team (GST) Coordinator

I want to start by thanking all of the Club Secretaries and Club Administrators who have been working to report their club's activities in MyLion. 80% of District 14-C's clubs have now reported at least one service activity, which exceed's DG Keith's goal of 75% for the year. We are now down to 9 clubs who need to report activities in order to achieve my goal, which is 100%

So what does that reporting show us? So far this year, our district has served nearly 200,000 people through 1,028 service activities. 23,900 volunteer hours have gone into those activities. The reporting also shows District 14-C clubs have raised over a quarter-million dollars, and so far, they have made donations totaling \$145,563.

There is still a lot of reporting to be done this year, I'm hoping we can at least double all of these numbers. Please remember that you can and should be reporting your club and board meetings. Your club members are volunteering their time to attend these meetings, and the good things we do as Lions would not happen without the discussion and planning that goes on at these meetings.

The last thing I want to discuss is that LCI is in the process of developing a new Lion Portal. Not much information has been released yet, but we are being told all reporting will be done from one landing page. No more jumping back-and-forth between MyLCI and MyLion. LCI is stressing the importance of making sure the member information in MyLCI is up-to-date and accurate prior to the roll-over to the new portal, which is expected sometime between July 1 and December 31, 2023.

I recommend Club Secretaries run the *Membership Information Update Report* for your club from MyLCI. This report will give you a page for each member that contains the information on file for them in the MyLCI database. Members can review their page, make necessary updates, and return the paper to you so you can make the necessary updates in MyLCI. Please encourage members to include an email address, which will be needed to access the new Lions Portal. Email is also the primary way members receive information from LCI and District 14-C.

In closing, I want to highlight the need to review member information in MyLCI by sharing that I recently ran a report showing birthdates for every member in District 14-C. We have just under 1,200 members in our district. According to the information in MyLCI, 357 members, just over 30%, were born on January 1st. Of those 357 members, 23 were born on January 1, 1900, which means we have 23 Lions members in District 14-C who are 123 years old!






