

Is Our District Reporting?

Some Clubs are. Some are not. We are half-way through the Club year. Taking a glimpse at reporting, in the month of October—28 Club reported nothing that month. Looking at December—27 Clubs reported nothing that month (not necessarily the same Clubs).

Part 1—Benefits to each Club for Reporting (February issue)

PDG Tom Gregg shared at the February Symposium cut-off dates. See new dates,

- 1. Ideally, reporting is at the end of every month.
- 2. If #1 isn't possible then report quarterly on these dates:
 - In September by the 26th
 - In December by the 26th
 - In March by the 26th
 - In June by the 24th
- 3. Are they waiting to do it all on June 24? I HOPE not. If it doesn't update in time, it won't roll into the next year. LOST!!!

Part 2—Benefits to District and LCI for Reporting (In this issue)

I am not going to reinvent the wheel. Here's what LCI says:

Lions Clubs International encourages its members to report their service activities for several reasons. Service reporting helps to increase global awareness of the needs of communities around the world and provides tangible evidence to prospective partners of Lions International's global engagement and impact. It also helps to identify best practices that can be shared globally, which in turn sharpens the organization's focus and leads to insight. Service reporting allows Lions clubs to continually engage their communities, tell their story more effectively, and ultimately grow their member base.

Reporting service helps transfer knowledge and best practices to your club's future leaders. Club officers can review past service activity reports, learn from the successes of the club's previous activities and better plan for their future activities.

Reporting service is a matter of local pride. Reporting puts your club on the map as leaders in your local community, and it's an important way to share success with other clubs in your district and around the world. A high percentage of clubs reporting service is a sign of a healthy district.

Reporting service allows you to become eligible for service awards. How do clubs and districts collectively benefit from reporting service?

Reporting shines a light on how and where local clubs are making a difference. This elevates the profile of Lions Clubs International as a global service club organization.

Service reports provide tangible evidence of our global engagement and impact to prospective partners of Lions Clubs International. These relationships strengthen the organization and yield benefits at the local level.

People want to participate in real, visible change. Service reporting allows clubs to continually engage communities, tell stories more effectively and ultimately grow their member base. How does reporting service benefit the people we serve?

Service data helps everyone understand the needs of communities around the world and how our Lions and Leos are serving those needs.

Because service activities are scalable, one small service project can become the next global initiative of the organization. But Lions Clubs International is not aware of such projects unless they are reported.

Service data enables Lions Clubs International to identify best practices that can be shared globally. » Measurement leads to insight. Setting higher goals each year mobilizes the organization toward growth.

Service reports show how Lions and Leos around the world are using funds from Lions Clubs International Foundation grants to serve their communities. This visibility encourages Lions and Leos to think creatively about their own projects and apply for LCIF grants themselves. Additional benefits » Reporting is the final step in completing a service project. If it's not reported, it's not done!

Reporting service is also useful for LCI to obtain funding from the Gates Foundation, Warren Buffet, Jimmy Carter Foundation, and others.

Reporting service is a lot like voting. You may think your report doesn't make a big difference, but the only way we'll be successful is if everyone does their small part.

Reporting is considered service in itself. The time clubs and districts spend reporting their service are considered volunteer hours, and can be reported in MyLion.

I wanted to let you know about a conversation I had a few months ago with a gentleman that was at the local VFW with a group of friends that I know. Now I enjoy going to the VFW every Wednesday night for trivia. It is my guilty pleasure. This gentleman, let's call him Mark, was from out of state, and sitting beside me talking to his friend (let's call him Roy) across the table from me. Now, I don't know these two young men (somewhere in their late 30's) but as I said, they were at our table with some of my other friends. Mark stated to Roy that he missed his dog, as they were here visiting their relatives over the holidays and the dog was kenneled at home. Here's how the conversation started.

Mark, to Roy: I miss my dog. When we get home, I'm going on the internet and get papers and a harness that says my dog is a service dog. Then I can take him anywhere with me.

Now anyone who knows me knows, 1) I cannot stand people who have "fake service" dogs, and 2) I'm not bashful about expressing myself when it comes to Service Dogs and people abusing the term. So the rest of the conversation went like this.

Me: So what medical condition do you have that requires you to have a Service Dog. Mark: None

Me: And what Service will this dog perform?

Mark: Huh?

Me: You know that a real Service Dog provides a service to the individual that is in need. Example; Guide Dogs for Blind People, or in my case, Leader Dogs for the Blind.

Mark: I don't have any "service" I need performed; I just want to take my dog everywhere.

Me: What kind of specialized training has been provided for your dog?

Mark: Well, I trained him to sit, lay down, and he listens to me pretty well.

Me: (rolling my eyes); Let me introduce myself. I'm Robbie Teal and I'm a Puppy Raiser for Leader Dog for the Blind. I get a puppy when it is about 8 weeks old and do specific training and socialization with the puppy until it is 14 months old when the puppy goes back for its final training before it goes on to a Blind Person. People who want to abuse the system with "fake" service dogs really have no clue as to how they rock the system, and can make it difficult for those that train true Service Dogs. There are laws in place to help protect both true Service Dogs and Service Dogs in training, but if you don't have a medical reason to have a well-trained, true Service Dog, then you are just abusing the system and your dog, with the possibility of putting your dog into a situation that he is not trained to handle. Think about that the next time you are tempted to buy fake papers off the internet.



At this point, Mark turned away from me and mumbled something I didn't hear, but his friend Roy looked at Mark and said, "She is absolutely right. You have no medical need for a Service Dog and you don't need to drag your dog everywhere just because you miss your dog." I was kind of shocked to hear his friend say that, but glad he did.

Later that night as we were leaving, I did apologize for my outburst to my friends that were still at table which were not aware of what had happen. To my surprise and delight, every one of my friends said I did the right thing. I like to think I did.



New Freedom "Gives From the Heart"

On February 15, 2024, New Freedom participated in the club-sponsored Give From the Heart Program. The club donates \$100 to each of the 4th grade classes at Friendship Elementary, Shrewsbury Elementary, and Southern Elementary (this year they were able to donate \$200 to each class). The students research local non-profit organizations, present to their classmates why their organization should receive the funds, and then the class votes on which organization to donate to. 

The A B C's of LCIF

IPDG Keith Shoff, LCIF District 14-C Coordinator

This is the eighth edition of "The A B C's of LCIF. So what did we learn so far?

- The Foundation has been in existence for over 55 years and has awarded more than 1.1 billion U.S. dollars in grants!
- LCIF is the charitable arm of LCI, designed to assist Lions with humanitarian projects.
- Our global causes include vision, youth, disaster relief, humanitarian efforts, diabetes, childhood cancer, hunger, and the environment.
- LCIF grants are funded by donations from Lions clubs and individual members worldwide.
- There are basically 9 distinct types of Grants
- LCIF does not receive any portion of Lions membership dues. 100% of your financial gift goes to grants and program expenses, not Administration.
- Administrative costs are handled through the returns on investment income.
- Donors can invest with confidence. LCIF consistently receives a 4-star rating from <u>Charity Navigator</u> and was also <u>named the #1 NGO</u> to partner with for these reasons by Financial Times.
- Grants: check out the LCIF Grant Toolbox @ <u>https://www.lionsclubs.org/en/lcif-grants-toolkit</u>
- No matter where across the globe, disasters strike, Lions are there when recovery funds are needed.
- For funds to be presented to a specific area, there must be a Lions Club (or Clubs) located in that area; they then become the distribution center for all Foundation funds
- Matching Grants are for large-scale humanitarian projects which will serve a large population.
- Childhood Cancer Grants do not fund medical care directly but are used to acquire equipment or improve facilities.
- Diabetes Grants focus on large-scale prevention, management, awareness, and screening projects designed to improve the public health of a community.
- Hunger Grants are designed to support school-based feeding programs, food banks, feeding centers, and similar facilities that provide food to people when they need it most.
- SightFirst Comprehensive Eye Care grants were developed to improve eye care systems to fight blindness and vision loss, and to assist people who are blind and visually impaired in underserved communities.
- SightFirst Research grants provide funds to support public health research initiatives that evaluate and directly influence the operation of the SightFirst program.

The A B C's of LCIF con't

This month, the grant type we'll discuss is: District and Club Community grants

The DCG program is an opportunity for clubs and districts to utilize some of the funding they donate to Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). For clubs and districts that qualify, they are eligible to apply for a grant equal to 15% of their total contributions (excluding disaster donations) in that year. DCG funds can be used to support specific humanitarian activities and highlight Lions in communities they serve. Grant funds are not eligible to pay membership dues or establish a reserve fund.

Clubs qualify by donating a minimum of US\$5,000 to LCIF within one fiscal year. The eligible club funds are 15% of the donations attributed to club members or the club itself. Districts qualify by donating a minimum of US\$10,000 to LCIF within one fiscal year. The eligible district funds are 15% of the donations attributed to the district itself, plus the donations from its clubs that do not reach a US\$5,000 minimum, plus any funds the eligible clubs transfer to the district. Eligible donation amounts are for donations made directly to LCIF's Empowering Service fund, only; this does not include donations to the club itself or district itself, restricted LCIF donations, or donations designated to LCIF's Disaster Relief fund.

Current update on where we currently stand with our donations:

DG Marty has set a District goal of \$35,000. As of Wednesday 14 Feb., District 14-C stands in 1st place within the Multiple District with \$19,505 being donated. So at 8 months into our Lions year, we are @ 55.73% of DG Marty's goal (a little behind, should be closer to \$23,500).

Just a reminder - you can participate. It's actually quite simple!

Please consider a donation to your Foundation. Checks should be made out to "**LCIF**" in whatever amount you wish to donate. On the memo line write either "Empowering Service Fund **or** Disaster Relief Fund. You can personally send the check to LCIF, but better yet, let me send it in and I will see to it that you get any and all recognition for your donation.

We Serve!

From the desk of PDG Dennis Cope, Global Service Team (GST) Coordinator

Several years ago, Lions International established the global service causes initiative. The goal was, and continues to be, to bring increased awareness to needs related to these areas and encourage clubs to participate in activities that will help address these needs. It is my hope that each club will set a long-term goal to engage in at least one service activity related to each global cause each year. To help facilitate that goal, I try to provide clubs with service ideas and opportunities. For example, each month the newsletter contains a service project idea for vision, hunger, diabetes, childhood cancer and environment.

This year, International President Patti Hill and District Governor Marty have encouraged all clubs to embrace an environment-related service project. They are challenging us to engage in a service project that will help protect the environment and create healthier community and a more sustainable world. This past August, DG Marty opened the door to a partnership with Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay. Since then, Environment Chair Jodi Heffner and I have been working with Alliance staff to explore ways Lions could support the work of the Alliance. Our goal is to establish a strong working relationship between Lions and the Alliance that will provide ongoing opportunities for District 14-C clubs to support the work of the Alliance.

Ideally, Lions will become regular partners with the Alliance and provide in-kind support at many of their events. That support might include ...

- Volunteer recruitment;
- Assisting with set-up and clean-up;
- Providing beverages and snacks for volunteers during events; and
- Identifying potential sites for tree-plantings and waterway clean-ups.

Last year, half of our District 14-C Lions clubs reported an environment-related service activity. This partnership with the Alliance is an opportunity for clubs that do not currently have an environment-related service project to expand their club's service to include another global cause.

To that end, we are encouraging clubs in and near Abbottstown, Gettysburg and Glen Rock to become involved in tree-plantings sponsored by the Alliance this Spring. Lion Jodi and I will be attending Zone Advisory Meetings in these areas to discuss specific ideas, share information and make plans for Lion involvement. The dates and times for the tree-plantings in these areas are listed on a handout included in this newsletter.
