Just yesterday, I learned that PDG Glenn Shellenberger, our Leader Dog Chairperson, was hit by a pickup truck as he was crossing the road with his snow blower and later died at the hospital. We are all saddened by these tremendous losses to our clubs and District and our deepest sympathies go out to their family members. Both of these gentlemen were great Lions and we will miss them terribly.

As we move to the second half of this Lions year, I would like us all to think about how we serve others. This is who we are and I ask that each and every one of you be passionate about serving others. During this past weekend's snowstorm, it became more evident than ever that we as Lions can serve in many capacities; regardless of our age. Our Cabinet Secretary, Bob Jacobs of the Spring Grove Lions, serves at a homeless shelter and has shared some posts on Facebook. After reading his posts it made me think; this is something all of us could do, regardless of our age. We have many homeless shelters and food pantries within out district - in fact, I had no idea how many we have! At so many of my club visits and meetings I've attended I keep hearing, we are all getting old what can we do, we need younger members.... Yes, we are an older group and yes we do need younger members to carry on our work; however, there are still things that any of us as Lions can do to serve - regardless of our age. My home club of New Oxford, just celebrated one of our oldest members 100th birthday in January - Lion Ralph Duncan has served for over 50 years in the Lions and he continues to serve even at his age. I ask that we all consider what we can do to make a difference in someone else's life. Maybe we could start a project in each of our counties to serve those in need of rides to doctors' visits, the grocery store, chemo treatments, etc. I'm sure that every club has members or knows of others who needs help in these areas. Those of us that are retired could service in this capacity and all it takes is a little time, caring and a driver's license which most of us have.

This brings me to our District Project - Vision Screening for Pre-school age children. I am so excited and have been learning so much from serving on this committee. I did not realize that there are so many children who have trouble in school and some cases, all they needed was an eye exam and glasses to make all the difference. Unfortunately, the agencies that are out there to do screenings do not have the time, resources or capacity to help everyone in need of screening. This is why I am so passionate about this project. Let the Lions be the ones to make the difference in a child's life early on. If we can help to prevent total blindness in 1 child or 100, we are doing something great and where there is a definite need! This project is geared toward screening pre-school age children up to 6 years of age. The District is applying for matching grant from LCI to help fund this project. In order for use to raise funds, we are holding a Mystery gift card bingo on March 13, 2016 at the New Oxford Fire Co (flyer included in this newsletter). We will be having 20 games of bingo with prizes of \$100 in the form of gift cards/certificates. We do not need to get \$100 gift cards; we are asking for any denomination of gift cards/certificates that we can make up the prizes to total \$100 per game. If everyone pitches in this will be a great success! Our Zone Chairs are out stomping the payment soliciting donations from local businesses and to get the community involved in our project. We are hoping that all the bingo gifts, door prizes and raffles are donated so that we do not have to take out of the proceeds to purchase anything. If anyone is interested in donating their time to help, provide a door prize, gift cards, gift certificates or a monetary donation (no matter how small) to this event, please contact either myself, 1VDG Kerry or 2VDG Dennis or your Zone Chairs. Donations are needed by February 19th so that we have time to purchase items that are still needed.

Stay healthy, safe, warm and remember that..... Together we can make a difference and "be a GAME CHANGER" - regardless of our age!

The second-place finisher will receive a MD 14 membership ribbon and medallion. Awards will be presented at the Friday luncheon held as part of the 2016 state convention in Reading.

CATEGORY 4

The Lion who brought the most new members in during the two-year period running from April 1, 2014 through March 31, 2016 will receive a waiver of their state per capita dues for the 2016-2017 Lions year.

CATEGORY 5

The Lions Club that has the highest percentage of new members for the year 2015/2016 will receive a waiver of three (3) State per capita dues for the 2016-2017 Lions year. **Please note:** charter members of newly-formed clubs are NOT eligible for this award.

Each club secretary shall be responsible for submitting information on behalf of the members of their club no later than April 15, 2016 to be eligible for the awards.

GALLAGHER EARNS FIRST-PLACE AWARD IN LIONS CLUBS' STATE PEACE POSTER CONTEST

HARRISBURG, Pa. — Nia Gallagher, an eighth-grade student at Wilson West Middle School in Wernersville, was recently selected as the Multiple District 14 winner of Lions Clubs International's annual Peace Poster Contest. The theme of the contest was "Share Peace."

In recognition of being selected as the MD-14 winner, Gallagher will receive a check for \$250 and a plaque and will be considered for the grand prize of \$5,000 presented to the winner of the Lions Clubs International contest. Merit awards of \$500 in cash will also be presented to 23 recipients.

Prior to winning the best-in-the-state honor, Gallagher was crowned as one of 16 district winners. Gallagher won the District 14-P contest that included entries from students 11 through 13 at schools located in Berks and Chester counties.

Gallagher's entry was sponsored by the Spring Township Lions Club based in Reading.

Mia Gill, a seventh-grade student at Norwin Middle School in North Huntingdon was named as the second-place finisher in the Multiple District 14 contest. Gill's entry was sponsored by the Stewartsville Lions Club in District 14-E (Westmoreland County).

The third-place finisher in the Pennsylvania competition was Brooke Yarnall, a sixth-grade student at Bedford Middle School in Bedford. Yarnall's entry was sponsored by the Bedford Lions Club in District 14-1 (Bedford, Blair, Fulton, Huntingdon and Mifflin counties).

Honorable mention recognition went to Maranda Dunn, an eighth-grade student at Seneca Valley Middle School in Cranberry Township (sponsored by Cranberry Township Area Lions Club, District 14-N) and Jacob Mead, a sixthgrade student at Arendtsville Elementary School in Biglerville (sponsored by Arendtsville Lions Club, District 14-C). 
