District Governor John Griffie stated that the Roll Call of the Cabinet and all other attendees will be accomplished by the registration and sign in sheets. Protocol was established.

PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE - explained by PDG P. Fred Trump. Addition of 2nd Vice Governor as a voting member was approved on a motion of Zone Chair CR Lloyd, seconded by Zone Chair Clair Starner. Motion carried.

MINUTES - The minutes of the August 15, 2015, Cabinet meeting were approved on a motion by Cabinet Secretary Bob Jacobs, seconded by Zone Chair CR Lloyd. Motion Carried.

FINANCIAL REPORT - The financial report, as of November 21, was presented by PDG George Reisinger. See attached copy of report. Motion to receive the Financial Report was made by 2nd Vice Governor Dennis Cope, seconded by Zone Chair Doug Nace. Motion carried.

DISTRICT GOVERNOR REMARKS - District Governor John welcomed all Lions, Lionesses, and guests to the Cabinet meeting. District 14-C is a busy district. DG John expressed appreciation for the hospitality he has been receiving on his club visitation. We are still looking for new members throughout the district. DG John said that his year is going by quickly.

2nd VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR REMARKS - 2nd VDG Dennis said that he has been enjoying the club visitations with DG John and L" VDG Kerry. For Lions interested in moving into district leadership positions, we aware that there are plenty of people available and willing to help you learn what district leadership is all about. Special Olympics of York County is looking for volunteers with their Polar Bear Plunge on Saturday, February 6, 2016, in Wrightsville. Contact your Zone Chair or Lion Becky Krout or PDG Noah Krout, if interested in helping. 2nd VDG Dennis also encouraged Club Secretaries to use the MyLCI Signature Service function to complete their activities reports.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

LCIF - PDG Noah Krout encouraged Lions, Lionesses, and guests to participate in the basket raffle. LCIF is doing well. PDG Noah has a program available to local clubs telling the LCIF story. The district has received 4 grants totaling \$135,000.00 from LCIF.

BEACON TODGE - PDG Larry Bare announced a new project in conjunction with Beacon Lodge - Project New Hope, helping PA disabled veterans and their families. Project New Hope is NOT related to the Wounded Warriors project. There were 2 camping sessions for Project New Hope in 2015. There are three sessions scheduled for 2016. Work weekend is scheduled for April 8-10, 2016. More information will be forthcoming in the district newsletter as the information becomes available. Beacon Lodge's wish list will also be coming in a future district newsletter.

BEACON LODGE 500 CLUB - Lion Louanna Bare reported that request cards for Beacon Lodge 500 Club were mailed in early September. To date Lion Louanna has received checks from 27 Lions Clubs and 5 Lioness Clubs totaling \$4,310.00. The proceeds from Beacon Lodge 500 Club goes to offset the maintenance of Beacon Lodge.

HEARING RESEARCH/HEARING AID Project - Report was presented by Lion Ray Rosnick. The board of directors of the PA Lions Hearing Research Foundation, at their May 15, 2015 meeting made 3 research grants totaling \$60,000.00. On Friday, July 31, the directors hosted the 1st VDGs from all PA districts to a dinner and to acquaint the 1st VDGs with the Foundation's programs and to answer any questions. At the board's October 31, 2015 meeting, recognition of the top contributing districts was made. District 14-C was number 2 in support of the Foundation, contributing \$7,250.00. Friday, July 24, 2015, was the annual Lions Night with the Senators. There were 31 picnic and 21 games only tickets sold for a total contribution of 5104 being made to the Foundation. In addition, the New Freedom Lioness Club did not attend the game but made a \$100.00 donation. Lion Ray also gave an update on the District 14-C Hearing Aid Program. Several years before her retirement, District 14-C had presented Wanda Riley, provider for the District Hearing Aid Program from October, 1995 through December 1, 2008, with a plaque for her services. Lion Rosnick stated that he felt it only fitting that the District should extend the same courtesy to our current provider. Lion Rosnick asked the District leadership to take appropriate action with this request. 2nd VDG Dennis Cope made a motion to give a plaque to our current provider before the end of the current year, seconded by Lion Lisa Griffie (New Oxford Lions Club). Motion carried.

EYEGGLASS RECYCLING - The report was presented by Lion Gene Kilgore. The Used Eyeglass Program has seen an increase of glasses brought in from District 14-C over the past 3 years. The recycling center in Arlington, VA has not been able to fill the orders for eyeglasses that they have received. Lion Kilgore reported that he recently delivered 10,842 pairs of eyeglasses to the Arlington recycling center. Lion Kilgore reminded the audience that lenses not in frames, contact lenses, and sunglasses cannot be used.

DISTRICT PROJECT PRESENTATION - PDG Shirley Starnier, Presenter - PDG Starnier introduced the "Lions Kindsight USA - Saving Kids Sight" Project. This is a nationwide program to safeguard the vision of children from 6 months to 6 years of age. IPP Joe Preston has challenged Lions to screen 25 million children by June, 2018, the end of the 100th year anniversary of Lions International. Screening is not the entire program. The data or information secured at a screening may warrant a referral to a professional eye care specialist and a follow-up program with a once a year screening repeated. Education experts say that 80% of learning is visual, yet most young children don't get their vision screened until they have problems learning or paying attention in school. Where is District 14-C with this project? Since August, the committee has met with 2 agencies in our district to establish rapport and to generate dialogue with the directors. We have secured a list of all licensed daycare centers, but there are other sites, such as home schoolers, who are not being screened. The project is very much in the planning stage within the district. 2nd VDG Dennis has developed a SMART (Specific, Measureable, Action, Realistic, Time-bound) Plan of Action for the project. The committee envisions every club in the district being involved in the screening process, having 3-5 members of each club trained to meet the needs to the children in their area.

GMT - SMART GOALS PRESENTATION - ZC CR Lloyd Presenter. New Freedom has a new Leo Club with approximately 30 students - through Susquehannock High School. The GMT Committee meets the second Saturday of each month at 8:30 at the Cross Keys Diner. All Zone Chairs are members of the GMT committee and should attend the meeting. All other Lions are invited to attend. ZC Lloyd said that he made visits to 2 clubs to talk about the GMT committee. 2nd VDG Dennis Cope made a PowerPoint presentation for the GMT. Four points to remember: 1-) Retain, 2) Recruit, 3) Orient, 4) Promote.

A motion to place Lion Kerry McKnight in nomination for District Governor, 2016-17, was made by Lion Steve Grothey, President of New Freedom Lions Club, seconded by Lion Glenn Roenigle, 2nd VP New Freedom Lions Club. Motion carried.

FIRST VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR NOMINATIONS - A letter of intent from 2nd VDG Dennis Cope was presented. In the letter, VDG Dennis expressed his intention to run for the position of 1st VDG for District 14-C for Lions year 2016-17. The formal nomination will take place at the February Cabinet Meeting.

SECOND VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR NOMINATIONS - No nominations for the 2nd Vice Governor were available. DG John Griffie said that we need a nominee by the February Cabinet Meeting.

MYSTERY BINGO FOR DISTRICT PROJECT - Set for Sunday, March 13, at the New Oxford Fire Co. Details to follow in District newsletter.

PA NORTHEAST EYE BANK - BOARD - DG Griffie stated that there are 3 openings on the board. Anyone interested in serving should contact DG Griffie. PDG Hugh Gallagher expressed interest in serving as one of the Board members.

CENTENNIAL CHALLENGE COORDINATOR - DG John Griffie announced that the position has been filled.

CATEGORY 4

The Lion who brought the most new members in during the two-year period running from April 1, 2014 through March 31, 2016 will receive a waiver of their state per capita dues for the 2016-2017 Lions year.

CATEGORY 5

The Lions Club that has the highest percentage of new members for the year 2015/2016 will receive a waiver of three (3) State per capita dues for the 2016-2017 Lions year. **Please note:** charter members of newly-formed clubs are NOT eligible for this award.

Each club secretary shall be responsible for submitting information on behalf of the members of their club no later than April 15, 2016 to be eligible for the awards.
