## District Goals for the 2017-2018 Lions Year

Prior to becoming District Governor, the First Vice District Governor receives training, which includes a requirement to set goals for his/her year as Governor. These goals are set through consultation with the district's leadership team, which includes the District Governor, Vice-District Governors, Zone Chairs, and others. This year's district goals are as follows:

1. Collectively, clubs will recruit at least 101 new members in honor of LCI's 101st year of existence.

2. 8 clubs will sponsor Club Branches, and 2 Club Branches will attract enough new members to become chartered as a new club.

3. The percentage of women Lions in District 14-C will grow to 20%.

4. District 14-C will lose no more than 101 members (and hopefully a lot less)

5. 8 Lions will receive Guided Lion certification.

6. Every Club President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer will participate in an officer training course through LCI or Lions University

7. Every club will participate in a same-day district-wide service project.

This is an ambitious set of goals, which will require the commitment of the the district's leadership team and the enthusiastic support of our clubs. In order to encourage clubs and individuals to work toward achieving these goals, the District Governor has established a "challenge program" to recognize clubs and individuals who meet specific criteria. This program replaces the Points Contest that has been in existence for many years and allows all clubs to receive recognition for their efforts. #### New Club Development Workshop

District 14-C has taken advantage of a program offered by LCI and invited a New Club Development Specialist to come to our district. This program provides allows a person who specializes in developing new clubs to visit the district at no charge to the district. The New Club Development Specialist meets with interested volunteers and engages them in a process that leads to the development of a new Lions club. Along the way, the specialist shows how this process can be repeated in other communities so that the volunteers can continue to work towards establishing additional clubs after the specialist is gone.

PDG Ronnie Martin, from Texas Lions District 2-S4, will be the New Club development Specialist visiting our area. PDG Ronnie has had tremendous success over the past few years starting clubs around the country, including several clubs in Pennsylvania. PDG Ronnie will be here from September 10-15.

During the days our volunteer team will be out "pounding the pavement" during the day trying to recruit members in an attempt to re-establish a Lions club in Shrewsbury, York County. In the evenings, PDG Ronnie with be traveling to other parts of the district to meet with club and district leaders who have expressed an interest working to sponsor a new club.

We look forward to working with PDG Ronnie to meet our District goal of chartering two new Lions clubs by June 30, 2018.

### **Zones Reorganized as Our District Moves Forward**

While planning for the 2017 -2018 Lions year, it became apparent there was a need to reorganize our zone structure.

Two primary factors drove this need. One factor was that our district has lost several clubs since the last reorganization of the zone structure. This has resulted in a wide variance in both the number of clubs from one zone to another and also a wide variance in the number of Lions in each zone. The second factor was a lack of activity in some zones, as well as difficulty in securing Zone Chairs for these two zones.

With those factors in mind, the district's leadership team, with input from several PDGs, developed a reorganization plan. The plan eliminates 2 zones, moves 10 clubs into different zones and renames two existing zones. The plan achieves a better, although not perfect, balance in both the number of clubs and number of Lions in each zone. Each zone also has a good balance of stronger and struggling clubs, which should help with support of the struggling clubs and maintain a pool of potential Zone Chairs (and hopefully future District Governors) in each zone.



# Challenged to Help a Neighbor

Governor Dennis emailed club officers with a request for donations to help fund the purchase of specialized glasses for Dudley Stokes, a York County resident with macular degeneration.



In response to this request, PDG George Reisinger and the members of the Susquehanna Lions club issued a challenge "to all Lions clubs in our great District to donate \$100 to this worthy cause ...except to the York White Rose Lions club, who should donate \$200 because that's what the Susquehanna Lions gave." Dover Lions promptly topped that with a \$300 donation.

DG Dennis noted that the initial response of the clubs was impressive. The RedBasket website donations increased in the first few days by over \$1,000; the Susquehanna Lions and White Rose Lions, in addition to their club donations, have decided to donate the proceeds from their Revolution Game fundraiser to this cause; and several clubs have have already pledged donations, the largest being \$300 from the New Freedom Lioness club and the Dover Lions. So in just a few days, we have gotten Mr. Stokes' family \$2,500 closer to achieving their goal!

At our first cabinet meeting on August 19, DG Dennis plans to present a check to Mr. Stokes from the District 14-C and recognize all of the clubs that contributed to this project.

Once again, we continue to show our community that "Where there's a need, there's a Lion!"
