

By now, your officer elections should be complete. If you have not already done so, please report next year's officers via MyLCI a.s.a.p.

MEMBERSHIP GOALS PROGRESS REPORT

Our membership numbers as of May 22nd show some encouraging improvement over last month's numbers. While we are still not showing a net increase, the deficit has been cut from -14 last month to -7 this month. We have recruited 96 new members, just 5 members short of our goal of 101 new members. However, due to the number of drops we need to recruit more new members than that to end the year with a net increase.

Also, for the first time this year, our percentage of female members has risen broken the 19% figure. We need just 13 women to join between now and

June 30th to meet our goal of 20%. 13 new female members would not only get us to our goal of 20% female membership, it would also help us achieve net membership growth for the year.

As was stated in last month's report, we need not only a strong push to recruit new members, we must work hard to avoid any more dropped members. Clearly, you have been working hard to help your club end the year "+1" for the year and help the District end the year with a net increase in membership. Please continue the push, and thank you for your on-going recruitment efforts.

MEMBERSHIP CAMPAIGN REMINDER

Our membership campaign for 2017-2018 yielded a mixed bag of results. Some goals were achieved, and others were not. Unfortunately, the net result is our District membership dropped from 1,301 July 1, 2017 to 1,281 on June 30, 2018.

On the bright side, we exceeded our goal of recruiting 101 new members. Our clubs that were in place on July 1, 2017, recruited 105 new members over the course of the year. We also started a new club, the Shrewsbury Area Centennial Lions Club, which accounted for 16 additional members in the end-of-year count. That gave us a total of 121 new members for this year.



Another goal was to increase the percentage of women members in our District. We started the year at 17% and moved that number to over 19%, just shy of our goal of 20%.

While we were fortunate and grateful to start 1 new club, we did not establish any Club Branches. Our goal was to have at least 1 club in each zone establish a Club Branch with the hope that branch could grow into an independent club.

Finally, dropped members appears to be the primary reason we did not achieve net membership growth for the year. Our goal was to keep this number to 100 or less. In the end, we had 141 dropped members reported this year.

The District Membership Team (GMT) appreciates the efforts of all our clubs and members who recruited new members, and we will be working during the coming year to find ways to capitalize on our successes and overcome our weaknesses.

Also, please note that clubs that ended last year with positive membership growth will be listed in next month's newsletter and recognized at the August Cabinet Meeting.

The first activity for the WCC Project Fund in 2018 was the installation of a chair lift for Logan H. Logan has Neurofibromatosis Type 1, which is a condition characterized in skin coloring (pigmentation) and the growth of tumors along nerves in the skin, brain, and other parts of the body.

The signs and symptoms of this condition vary widely among affected people. Beginning in early childhood, almost all people with neurofibromatosis type 1 have multiple café-aulait spots, which are flat patches on the skin that are darker than the surrounding area. These spots increase in size and number as the individual grows older. Freckles in the underarms and groin typically develop later in childhood. Additional signs and symptoms of

neurofibromatosis type 1 include high blood pressure (hypertension), short stature, an unusually large head (macrocephaly), and skeletal abnormalities such as an abnormal curvature of the spine (scoliosis). Although most people with neurofibromatosis type 1 have normal intelligence, learning disabilities and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) occur frequently in affected individuals. Logan's mother, Mrs. H., suggested that Logan would benefit greatly from a chair lift as it is difficult for him to negotiate the stairs. The lift was installed on June 13, 2018 by Acorn Stairlifts.
