MESSAGE FROM THE DISTRICT GOVERNOR

I am fired up with renewed enthusiasm after a great weekend of Leadership training with over 1,800 lions from the U.S. and Canada in attendance. What an excellent sharing experience this was! There were so many great motivational speakers and Lions sharing their

club service project and fundraising ideas. Even more awesome was the Ohio State School for the Blind marching band. Imagine being blind and learning to play an instrument - those kids were fantastic and so enthusiastic and inspirational.

We are a TEAM. I cannot sail this ship without all of you- we would get nowhere fast! One person cannot make the necessary changes to RETAIN and GROW our membership. Sailing takes Teamwork! Our clubs are our TEAMS and they cannot function without our

club members. What drives our membership? Great Leaders, Great Service Projects and the Power of ASK 1 - asking potential new members what they would like see changed in their communities and inviting them to join while we get it done.

We need to GROW! Growth is achieved through membership recruitment, as well as membership satisfaction. In order for clubs to grow we must first look at our clubs. Is your club inviting and welcoming, do you respond positively to new ideas that are brought up, are you stuck in your traditions? Sometimes in order to move forward it is necessary to change. Traditions are great; however we must be prepared for the winds of change. The world is changing. In order to get younger people in our clubs we may need to be more flexible. No one likes change but without it everything remains the same. Has your club considered accepting credit cards for payment of dues? Young people do not carry cash and they write very few checks, everything is done on line or via credit card. Credit cards may also increase your profits at a fundraiser, especially if there are no ATM's close to your location. Checkout Square.com or other card reader apps that allow you to accept cards via your smart phone. This may also help with dues collection - payment via credit card may be the answer to non payment of dues issues. Just remember that you need to include a few extra dollars for members

that choose to use the credit card payment method to offset the fees charged for the service. Another idea for a positive change within clubs is to do away with the "Head" table. Try allowing the officers to sit in different locations during meetings. Many people fear leadership positions because they do not want to sit up front. This may get more people to step up and be President, Secretary or Treasurer. It may also be more enticing to potential new members.

To ensure the Lions can continue to serve our local communities for another hundred years, you need to consider the club experience and expectations of belonging to your club. If members feel their time is well spent and they are able to build friendships within the club then they will most likely remain with your club for a long time. Don't forget to have some educational and interesting programs throughout the year. We have many people within our District that have been helped by the Lions and would love to share their stories. Try inviting a neighboring club to a program, hold a white elephant event or maybe for Lions Jeopardy; having Fun and getting to know other Lions within your Zone and the District is a very gratifying experience. In order to get younger members you may want to consider a cub program within your meetings for people with small children. Some clubs offer a coloring table or other fun ideas to keep kids entertained while the meeting

is going on with the adults. Include these kids in your service projects, everyone loves children and what a better way to help build their future by including them in community service at young age! What an impact this could have! Think about it!

You may not agree with my suggestions above; however, according to Lions nationwide these are some of the things that are reducing membership drops and increasing member satisfaction. Start the dialogue within your club as to what can be done to make your club more inviting to new members.

In closing, your District Governor Team is here to help the clubs of this district to thrive and grow. If you club is struggling and you want some ideas and help to get things like developing a membership growth plan or planning a new member recruitment night we are here to HELP!!! Just ASK. LCIF DISASTER RELIEF UPDATE FROM PDG KERRY

If you have been a member of Lions Clubs for any amount of time, you are aware that one of the priorities of Lions Clubs International Foundation is Disaster Relief. A member of my family has now experienced the impact LCIF can have on communities.

2 weeks ago Hurricane Florence blew into my sister's community of New Bern, North Carolina. Fortunately, she lives in a development on higher ground so even though she did have property damage, she did not have any flooding. I have seen pictures of downtown New Bern which some areas were ravaged by 12 feet of water after the Neuse River overflowed its banks. Just imagine the 1st floor of your home under water, and having a boat float into the side of your house! Over 4,500 homes were damaged.

LCIF moved into action immediately by granting \$100,000 to the Lions Clubs in the areas affected by Hurricane Florence to provide for basic immediate needs including food, water, clothing and medicine. Also, I thank the clubs in our District 14-C that also made recent donations to LCIF earmarked to give assistance in this natural disaster.

MESSAGE FROM STEVE SHIPMAN



Have you thought about our Lions logo lately? It shows two lion heads looking in two different directions, one we have been told viewing our past accomplishments and the other our future opportunities for service. A speaker at the USA/Canada Forum last month suggested a different interpretation. What if the one lion head is looking at all the fantastic service our individual club accomplishes, while the other is looking at how much more service we achieve by being united with clubs all around the world through Lions Clubs International?

Just as one example, our Lions Clubs International Foundation designated \$100,000 to go directly to those in the Carolinas impacted by flooding from Hurricane Florence, and this is just the beginning. The money will be used by local Lions Clubs to help victims in their communities. How many of our clubs have \$100,000 to donate to this cause?

Which gets to my point. For most of us, our connection with these much larger contributions of Lions Clubs International (LCI) is through District 14-C, comprised of our clubs in Adams, York, and Cumberland Counties. And specifically, we learn to look at the bigger dimension of Lions through the annual visit of our District Governor to each of our clubs.

While most of our clubs welcome and appreciate the visit of the District Governor, I have been concerned about several times where this opportunity to grow our connection with LCI is squandered, and the Governor's presentation is not given the emphasis it deserves.

I hope we all know to stand at the beginning and end of the District Governor's presentation, not only to show appreciation to the work the Governor is doing, but to honor what the Governor represents as the symbol of LCI in our local club.

These visits are all scheduled and confirmed months in advance, and it is not easy for the Governor to make it to all the clubs. This is why you are asked to let the Governor be the program, and not to try to squeeze their presentation in with other speakers and programs. It is also why you are asked to conduct routine club business at another time, and to let the Governor meet with your board and interested members to discuss the health of your club.

I have been a Lion for more than a third of a century, and I have heard many presentations from District Governors. I can say confidently that our Governors today are far better prepared by LCI for their job, including public speaking, than many have been in the past. We have had outstanding Lions serving well in this position for our entire century; I only can imagine how they could have been even more effective if offered the training and resources LCI provides today.

So, please, let the visit of your District Governor be the big deal it should be. Honor the Governor's schedule unless it is absolutely necessary to change the agreed-upon date. Avoid distractions in the meeting that take away from the Governor's presentation.

Help your members look outward, beyond even the fine community service your club does. Together we are able to achieve far more than we can separately. Celebrate this, and respect your Governor when she or he visits your club.

We met at the Stewartstown Presbyterian Church at 8:30 AM for breakfast that was provided by Lion President Marty. We then drove to Lion Bobs and proceeded to cut and split logs into firewood. Many Lions were there to help Lion Jake provided his log splitter. Lion Gary, Dave, and Bill provided chain saws. Bill Amberman, Ken Anderson, Duane Hyson, Tom Jones, Dave Martinez, Richard maters, Gary Schwinn, Joe Shanabrough, and Bob Skalski are the Lions that provided the manpower to get this project done. By 12:00PM there was enough firewood prepared to last Lion Bob thru the winter. Lion Bob's wife provided everyone with pizza for lunch.

BAKE SALE

The WCC is a group of seven District 14C area Lions Clubs (Boiling Springs, Carlisle, Jacksonville, Mt Holly Springs, Newville, Plainfield, Shippensburg), who have banded together as a more or less loosely organized working group to find people who are in need of monetary or other help in our area. Each of these clubs is rather small and they have found that there's power in combining their efforts.

WCC's first project of 2018 was the Third Annual Lions Clubs Golf Outing, on Saturday, June 23 at Eagle's Crossing Golf Club in Carlisle, PA. The outing was sponsored by forty individual donors and local businesses and raised \$6000. These monies along with the \$1500 proceeds from this year's Bake Sale, held on September 1 were used in part to install a chairlift for Logan H., a Carlisle High School Senior who has a diagnosis of Neurofibromatosis Type 1. This is a condition characterized in skin coloring (pigmentation) and the growth of tumors along

nerves in the skin, brain, and other parts of the body. Signs and symptoms of this condition vary widely among affected people. Beginning in early childhood, almost all people with neurofibromatosis type 1 have multiple café-au-lait spots, which are flat patches on the skin that are darker than the surrounding area. These spots increase in size and number as the individual grows older. Freckles in the underarms and groin typically develop later in childhood.

The group's next big fund raising project is the Yard Sale to be held on October 5 & 6 at the Newville, PA Lions Fairgrounds with proceeds dedicated to Logan B. in Mt. Holly Springs. Logan has a form of autism that makes him prone to behavior that has caused harm to himself and his home. Some work has already been completed and we hope to finish fairly soon. Any leftover monies are dedicated to future applicants. We hope to see many of you there!

As of September 25th, \$3726.85 has been donated for our campaign “Lions Care for the Kids.” Our goal is \$100,000 of which about 65 – 70% will go for research into the causes, prevention and cures of childhood cancers so that no family has to ever hear the words “Your child has Cancer.” Our campaign is not asking a huge sum of money from each of our members, just \$5.25 per member.
