Membership Growth Success!

As of August 20th, District 14-C has added 2 members and dropped 7 members for a net loss of 5 members since July 1, 2018. This continues a trend that we need to reverse. One of DG Lisa's priorities for this year is to reduce the number of members who are being dropped from membership for reasons other than death or relocation. The Global Action Team (GAT) will be studying data to identify clubs who are struggling to retain members and offer assistance to those clubs in order to help them grow their membership.

Of course, member recruitment is necessary in order to grow our clubs. Our Lions International President has challenged every club to recruit at least one new member each quarter of this Lions year. If our District 14-C clubs accept and realize that challenge, we will exceed DG Lisa's goal of new members by nearly 2.5 times.

DG Lisa would also like to see the percentage of female members in District 14-C increase. Last year, that percentage rose from 17% to 19%, but we are still far behind the Lions International average of 30%. If each of our clubs recruits at least 1 female member this year without losing any female members, the percentage of women members will increase to 23%.

TARA'S STORY

This story is about Tara G., who has Juvenile Batten disease or Neuronal Ceroid Lipofuscinosis (NCL),

is a family of rare diseases caused by autosomal recessive genetic mutations resulting in the body. According to the Batten Disease Website, "Children and adults with this rare neurodegenerative disorder have inherited genetic material from their parents that after some years, begin to impact their daily lives. When it does, families are often in shock when they experience their seemingly normal child changing (sometimes quickly) and without cause. Regardless of where your loved one is in the progression of Batten disease."

It all began in 2015, when Tara's vision started to fail. While the family did not have a diagnosis at that time, they decided to get Tara started on learning braille, as they were aware that her vision would diminish over time. In 2015, when she was seven and a half years old Tara and her mother Lisa traveled to Duke University for an experimental stem cell transplant and stayed there for approximately six months. Her mother spent the first eight weeks with her at the hospital and the remainder of the time at the Ronald McDonald House, right around the corner from the hospital.

Tara's dad is a farmer and her mother is a nurse. Unfortunately, Lisa's employer dropped her off her health insurance while she and Tara were in North Carolina, and the family had to be insured through Cobra, which cost them \$3000/month. They were lucky, in a way, the operation being experimental the Hospital paid for the approximately \$1.5 million for the operation. However, the family had cost of living expenses, as well as doctor bills after they returned home.

This is where the WCC (a group of seven area Lions Clubs comprised of Boiling Springs, Carlisle, Jacksonville, Mt. Holly Springs, Newville, Plainfield, and Shippensburg, PA) came into play. They arranged a benefit Golf Tournament and a Bake Sale to raise funds to help defray some of the medical expenses.

When Tara returned home, "her immune system was nonexistent", according to her mother. This meant that she could not go to school, could not play with other children, and was only able to go out when she went to doctor's appointments. The school system supplied tutors for her, but her mom said that it was tough going. When Tara was finally able to attend school again (it was winter) she was sick quite often and once even came down with pneumonia. Now ten years old and totally blind, she is starting fifth grade this week. Her parents want her to be mainstreamed as long as possible, because she knows the school, has friends there and is able to blossom. Tara's mother mentioned that the family has been talking about getting her a guide dog, but the discussion is in the beginning stages.

This year, the Plainfield, PA Lions Club gave Tara a stipend to attend Beacon Lodge, where she would stay for one week this summer. Her parents, Jeff and Lisa, were just a little bit skeptical, whether Tara would like to go and if she could stand being away from the family for a whole week, as she had never been away so far from home before.
