A Message From the District Governor



In my message last month, I began discussing District 14 C's 2021-2022 eight goals, with a focus on the four membership goals. I did this because our membership throughout the District continues to decrease and because I believe that many of our clubs are stretched so thin that our club service, membership support and recruitment, and leadership responsibilities fall on too few people, making it impossible for them to do their best at any one thing. Club leaders, we must continue our efforts to ensure that we are doing whatever is necessary to retain the members we have, including providing training and support so they can grow as Lions, and we must continue to look for strong potential new members among our friends and family and in our communities who will provide more hands, minds and hearts to do the Lions' work. I was gratified for the second month in a row to have the opportunity to

induct two new Lions, this time in the Stewartstown Lions Club.

Moving on from the membership goals, I want to focus this month on our LCIF goal for 2021-2022. On page 6 of our District Directory, the sixth goal states that "at least 85% of our clubs in District 14C will make donations to LCIF and that the total 2021-2022 donations will exceed those reported by the District in the previous year". Since we wrote that, I think we are selling ourselves short. I think we can get 100% participation from our 44 Lions Clubs. LCIF is the service arm of Lions Clubs International. Beyond the needs met by Lions Clubs in their communities, LCIF supports clubs to address large humanitarian needs, some caused by disasters such as hurricanes, fires, the pandemic and more. When a hurricane ravages Houston or Florida or New Jersey or places all over the world, LCIF responds quickly to provide grant funds of up to \$100,000 to local Lions Clubs that have plans to provide services and supplies for those in need. These are funds that come directly from our donations, 100% of which go toward these needed services. That is why LCIF is consistently rated so highly by Charity Navigator.

A Message From the District Governor con't

I encourage you to plan donations to LCIF every year, but this year is especially timely because it is the last year of Campaign 100 which was established to address an expanded list of global causes for LCIF. As stated in a recent LCIF FAQs publication – "Just as LCIF responds to the needs of communities recovering in the aftermath of natural disasters, LCIF is supporting communities severely impacted by Covid-19". It goes on to say that LCIF has provided over 190 grants and \$3,500,000 to support these communities (some here in Pennsylvania).



How can your club help? There are many ways, such as - making a gift from the club treasury or encouraging 100%-member support (at whatever level), or holding a fundraising event for LCIF, or inviting support from local businesses, or just putting some money in the boxes (provided by LCIF Coordinator and PDG Kerry McKnight) at regular onsite club meetings.

If your club wants to assist LCIF in a really big way, you can do it as a "Model Club". And, of course, all your donations count toward Melvin Jones Fellowships. If you have questions about any of this, I encourage you to contact PDG Kerry. He will respond to your contact and answer your questions, and if he can fit it into his increasingly busy schedule, he will come to a club meeting and talk about LCIF and Campaign 100.

We need <u>all-hands-on-deck</u>. Have a wonderful October, including the fun around Halloween.

Jessica encouraged attendees, even when met with resistance and negativity, to "think outside the shoe" which she developed while learning to tie her shoe laces. When addressing the pervasive challenges leaders face, we must first overcome our own fears and negativity. The SHOE acronym is how Cox labels that negativity that can hold us back. Those things are:

- Self-limited beliefs
- Habits
- Over complication
- Excuses



- 4. Develop a list of strategies to promote Lions Clubs and services in their communities with a roll-out to the clubs by the end of the first quarter.

Leader Dog Puppy Raiser Robbie Teal

The drive was long. My back stiff and sore from sleeping on a hotel bed that I am not used to, and the coffee was cold. But all that faded away from my mind when I saw this little bundle of fur. Just shy of 8 weeks old and with beautiful trusting brown eyes that say "teach me, I am a good dog and I want to learn." This is the beginning of our new adventure together with raising a Future Leader Dog for the Blind. Join us on our adventure raising a Future Leader Dog.

Killian is an 8 week old ¾ Golden Retriever and ¼ Yellow Lab puppy. He is the third Leader Dog that I will be training. He will be with me for one year, and then he goes back to Leader Dogs for his final training. Puppies in training are designated as FLD (Future Leader Dog) whereas the working dogs have the designation of LD (Leader Dog). Out of approximately 400 puppies raised each year only 200 make it as a Leader Dog. The puppies that don't make the grade are called CC for Career Changed. Career Changed dogs can be assigned other important work such as Therapy Dogs, Court Dogs, Bomb or Drug Sniffing Dogs or they can return to their Puppy Raisers and just be a well-loved pet.

Killian and I had a 9 hour drive ahead of us. So the training began immediately with positioning in the vehicle on the way home. Leader Dogs are trained to ride on the floor on the passenger side between the owner's legs. With the help of my Grandson, Killian settled down for most of the trip between his



feet for the drive home. Of course since Killian is only 8 weeks old precautions were taken with puppy pads on the floor, just in case of accidents. I have found that stopping every 2 - 21/2 hours prevents that from happening. This is continued at home for the first week or two. Time is added every week until the puppy, and you, can sleep the whole night without an accident. Killian is also introduced to his leash and lots of treats to encourage walking with his leash. We use Kibble as the general treat, but to really get the puppy's attention, I use freeze dried chicken breast.

Arriving home, the first thing I do is introducing Killian to his fenced in back yard. I love seeing the puppy's reaction when they see the large back yard and are free to run and "Park". Leader Dogs are taught the word "Park" to let them know they are allowed to relieve themselves. The vest or scarf must be removed first for the puppy to be allowed to go to the area for doing their business. I stand near the puppy when he goes, and tell him "park" and then tell him "yes" cheer and treat when this is achieved. My neighbors have gotten use to me cheering on the dog's bathroom habit during training. It is important for the puppies to learn that bathroom breaks can only be done when the command is giving and when not wearing their uniform (jacket or scarf).

Puppy proofing the house is also important. Until they reach a certain age and training, access it limited in the house, by the use of doors and pet gates, to prevent finding inappropriate things to chew. Such as my favorite sneakers. In the first few days home, the puppy is busy exploring and learning his environment. But keep a lookout for training opportunities as they present themselves. Setting time each day to work on training is great, but I like to use everyday activities for training purposes.

I hope you will enjoy the next year in the life of a puppy raiser. There will be rewards and challenges, good days and bad. But it will never be boring.



The silhouette depiction of those who perform service for others was a very unique method of Dakota's creation. Dakota was one of 23 merit winners from last year's contest in which the theme was "Peace Through Service."

about participating in the Peace Poster Contest. I have a few Peace Poster Kits and I will deliver one to you, if needed. The winning poster must be sent to the District Governor by November 15th. So, if you act now, there will be ample time for the children to complete their posters. The theme for 2021/2022 is "**We Are All Connected**."

The important information for you to know includes the following:

- The Peace Poster Contest is open to children ages 11-13 as of November 15.
- Each poster is judged on originality, artistic merit, and expression of the theme.
- Posters advance through several judging levels: local, district, multiple district, and international.
- At the international level, judges from the art, peace, youth, education and media communities select one grand prize winner and 23 merit award winners.
- One international grand prize winner will receive \$5,000 and a trip to a special award ceremony at the International Convention. Each of the 23 merit award winners will receive a cash award of \$500 and a certificate of achievement.



Tax Obligations

Lions: Please remember that all Lions clubs, districts and multiple districts that have annual gross receipts of less than US\$50,000 and do not have to file Forms 990 or 990-EZ must file the e-Postcard (also known as 990-N). If your Lions club, district or multiple district has a foundation, which is a separate legal entity, the appropriate form will need to be filed as well.

All filers must register at IRS.gov prior to filing their next Form 990-N. This is a one-time registration if the designated Lion files annually. If the designee changes from a prior year, the new designee must register with the IRS.

Please refer to the following chart regarding annual filing requirements:

The e-Postcard is due by the 15th day of the fifth month after the close of your tax year. Lions clubs operate on a fiscal year, July 1-June 30, and the e-Postcard is due by <u>November 15</u> each year. Please note that an organization cannot request an extension for filing the Form 990-N.

If you do not file, you risk losing your tax-exempt status. Any Lions club that fails to meet its annual reporting requirement for three consecutive years will automatically lose its tax exempt status. A club may <u>apply</u> for reinstatement of its tax exemption even if it originally fell under a group exemption.

Every club and/or district (single, sub- and multiple) must have an employer identification number (EIN), even if it will not have employees. The EIN is a unique number that identifies the organization to the Internal Revenue Service. To apply for an EIN, you should obtain a Form SS-4 and its instructions from the IRS. You may also apply for an EIN online, by telephone (1-800-829-4933) or by fax (fax number at the location accepting applications from your state). It is important that clubs and districts use the correct EIN for their annual filing.
