So, we are in the thick of the football season. Men are happy and many women can't wait until February. So what? Why would I talk about football (I happen to love it) in a Lions newsletter? Well...

There are similarities between Lions and college and pro football. Prove it, you say.

Football players have **training camp**. During that time, they learn that it's not about the individual, but the TEAM. If a player shows up thinking "It's all about me," they might as well do a U-turn and go home.

What do they learn at **training camp**?

- The players have an opportunity to display what they are good at. They need to be qualified.
- They learn to communicate.
- They are required to follow the needs and wishes of the coaches.
- They must follow the instructions of the quarterback or the defensive captain.
- There is a demand to be disciplined and contribute to the team.

So do Lions attend a training camp? Well, Lions call it **Training Sessions**. Again, it is about the team. Training is available at all levels. Some is online through the Learning Center or through Lions University. A Club committee chair can guide members of that committee of their duties and opportunities. Members who are willing to become Club officers, can receive training through e-training or District Zoom Training.

At the Zone Leader level, training comes through the District Cabinet Meetings, the Global Action Team zoom meetings and through the mentoring being provided by the Past District Governors. As we shadow these PDGs, we begin to absorb their knowledge and experiences.

For those who accept the challenge of the District Governor chairs, there is more extensive training. In October, I had the opportunity to attend my second State Council meeting and training session. State policies and procedures are discussed, changed, or updated at these meetings. The District Governor and State Administrators set in a U-shaped format for these meetings. Any Lion can attend. Vice District Governors set up front with the other Lions in the audience.

<u>Disaster Preparedness</u> – plan and prepare for future disaster <u>Emergency Assistance</u> – immediate assistance after a disaster <u>Community Recovery</u> – support for short-term cleanup and repair efforts

Major Catastrophe – larger scale assistance for long-term projects

The DRP affords clubs the opportunity to work with community leadership, private businguity, and others to prepare for and respond to the unforeseen disasters and events. So why not use the DRP by getting involved with an already established local program or coordinate and begin a new program based on one of the monthly focuses. Did you know?

Nearly half of holiday decoration fires happen because decorations are placed too close to a heat source.

It's fun to decorate for the winter holidays, but holiday decorations can increase your risk for a home fire. As you deck the halls this season, be fire smart

- Inspect holiday lights each year before you put them up. Throw away light strands with frayed or pinched wires. Click for more on holiday safety.


Stewartstown Hangs Township Christmas Lights





We Serve!

From the desk of PDG Dennis Cope, Global Service Team (GST) Coordinator

VISIBILITY. What is visibility, and how does it pertain to our clubs? One definition, according to my computer, is, "The state of being able to see or be seen." What is your club's visibility in your community? Do folks in your town see you and your fellow club members doing good work in your community? Do they recognize the Lions logo? Do they associate you with that logo? Do they know what your club does for the community?

Visibility is a powerful way to engage and attract potential members to your club. If people in your community don't know your club exists, don't see your club in the community, and don't know what it is doing, what is going to get their attention and get them curious enough to consider joining your club?

I want to strongly encourage every club in District 14 C to evaluate their *visibility* in their community. Take time to physically list when and where people see your club in action, serving your community. How may occasions during a year is your club *seen?* How many hours? How many people have the opportunity to *see* what your club is doing? For many clubs, perhaps most clubs, this is going to be an *eye-opening* exercise - pun intended! Regardless of where your club currently stands, I encourage you to seek ways to increase your club's *visibility*.

It is my strong conviction that the way to increase visibility is to find more opportunities that will allow the community to see you and your club members actively serving your community. This does not have to cost a lot of money, so don't let funding be a barrier to service. Start by looking for volunteer opportunities.

At least once each week, I see an article in the newspaper asking for volunteers to assist with one thing or another. Think about ways you volunteer individually and ask yourself, "Is this something we could do as a club project?" Think about other non-profit organizations that focus on causes that align with Lions and LCIF global causes: vision, hunger, environment, diabetes, childhood cancer, youth, humanitarian assistance, and disaster relief. Ask yourself, "Do any of these organizations sponsor programs or events that need volunteer assistance?" Remember, volunteering costs you and your club members nothing but time. You don't need to hold a fundraiser to volunteer your time.

The holiday season offers many volunteer opportunities. Here are just a few examples that your club could adopt as service projects, which will increase your club's *visibility* in the community:





The American Cancer Society is seeking volunteers to drive cancer patients to treatment appointments. Access to timely, high-quality treatment can often be a cancer patient's largest roadblock to survival. Many patients must schedule daily or weekly appointments for several months, keeping friends and family from being able to provide all the support needed. The American Cancer Society's *Road To Recovery* program fills this gap by offering free rides to patients. Volunteer drivers are urgently needed in **Adams, Cumberland**, and Franklin Counties!

This is an excellent way for Lions Club Members and Clubs to support our Global Service Initiative related to Pediatric Cancer and Humanitarian Service to any person dealing with cancer. Clubs could adopt this program as a project and set a travel reimburse rate for members who transport patients to or from appointments.

Individuals who sign up to volunteer complete a brief survey. They must also provide a criminal background clearance and a DMV history record. Once registered as a driver, volunteers will receive notice when a patient needs transportation. The volunteer may either accept or decline the opportunity as their schedule allows.

Road To Recovery Safety Guidelines



VOLUNTEER DRIVER & PASSENGER



PATIENT PROTECTION Masks are required. Wear a proper fitting, at least 2 ply, mask that covers the mouth and nose during the ride. Bandanas and buffs are not acceptable.



PHYSICAL DISTANCING Physical distancing– six foot rule, while outside of the vehicle. Rider sits in the back row behind the passenger seat whenever possible. One passenger at a time, no extra passengers, one caregiver if medically necessary. Avoid using recirculated air and if possible, open the windows to improve airflow.



COVID-19 VACCINE All volunteers are required to certify they are up to date with COVID-19 vaccinations and will continue to stay up to date.



NO SYMPTOMS Participating in the program is not allowed if experiencing COVID-19 symptoms or were in close contact with anyone who has COVID-19 or symptoms. Exposed participant will pause program engagement for 14 days after last date of contact and until they are symptom free, even if testing negative for COVID-19. Program participants that become symptomatic or test positive need to alert ACS as soon as possible.




FREQUENTLY TOUCHED SURFACES Use tissues or paper towels for frequently touched surfaces like door handles, windows, seatbelts, etc. to reduce contact. Surfaces to be wiped down with EPA approved disinfectant before and after ride. Passenger handles own items during pick up and drop off, including any items (oxygen tanks, walkers, canes, etc.) in and out of the vehicle.

As we resume Road To Recovery, the safety of our volunteer drivers and constituents is and always has been, our top priority. This may require new and changing processes and procedures based on the scientific knowledge and advice of experts in oncology, infection control and the CDC.
