Stay present: Practice mindfulness to stay grounded when feeling anxious or overwhelmed.

Manage finances: Plan your holiday spending in advance to reduce financial stress. **Seek support:** Talk to friends or family about how you're feeling. If you are experiencing severe emotional or psychological struggles, contact a mental health professional.

Help is available: In a mental health crisis, you can call or text the <u>988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline</u> (in the US and Canada).

Holidays are a time for fun, family, and sharing, and a time to be thankful for our blessings. As Lions we are here to help others but need to ensure we take care of our own physical and mental health.

- Every member has access to the LCI Learning Center.
- Every member has access to Lions University. You don't have to pursue a degree.

Achievement

- After working on Membership, Leadership, and Training, review what has been accomplished, then apply it.
- SWAT analysis:
 - 1. Strengths
 - 2. Weaknesses
 - 3. Opportunities
 - 4. Threats

Motivation

- This is at the center of the other four.
- No one is attracted to boring.
- Share your stories and accomplishments. It's okay to brag if done properly.
- Share your passion; it becomes infectious.

Each day we are inundated with phone calls, advertising, and information trying to sell or get something from you and your club. How do we tell the difference between real, spam, and Al. Here are some tricks to possibly help you through this inundation of hackers and swindlers trying to get your information and money.

Did you get the email from DG Doug?

I hope this email finds you well. I am reaching out to inquire about your availability to address a sensitive and urgent matter that requires your attention. Due to my current workload, I would appreciate it if we could communicate via email only, without phone calls. Your prompt response is greatly appreciated, as the matter requires timely action.

Emails can be tricky and if you have any doubt or concern, then don't respond. Things like, "urgent matter", "Timely action" and "no telephone calls" are clues that it is spam.

Telephone calls received can be tricky and may even have a legitimate number show up, but when you say hello if you hear a beep, click, or ding, the odds are it is spam and they have spoofed the legitimate number. If they say they are law enforcement, debt collector, or other government representative on an urgent matter, it is a robocall trying to take your information and hard-earned money. Don't reply, *just hang up*. If you are concerned it may be an actual legitimate telephone call, then look the number up and contact the bank or company directly. Never click a link or call the number in the email, text or telephone call.

When shopping online, only use secure sites that start with https://, the 's' stands for secure. Learn more online tips at: Holiday Online Safety tip sheets.pdf

Me: Wellspan's policy does not override state law.


Mike: Well what is Leader Dog anyway? I never heard of them.


Dover Learns Local History


York Springs Gets the Scoop on Recycling Eyeglasses

The ABCs of LCIF

Hello again from LCIF Central (District 14C)

Did you know that LCIF has a "volunteer structure" from the International level down to and including the local Clubs ?? Well here it is:

"Club LCIF Coordinators

All clubs are asked to appoint a club LCIF coordinator, which is a one-year position. Individuals serving in this role are asked to educate fellow club members on the impact of LCIF grants and key initiatives of the

foundation. Club LCIF coordinators are also asked to encourage donations from both the club and individual members. Clubs are asked to appoint the most qualified member to serve in this position. The immediate past club president is asked to serve in this position if no other member is appointed."

Some of our 14C Clubs do have a club LCIF coordinator but not all ... I would ask you to check with your Club President to verify "IF" your Club does and in the case that it doesn't ... Please encourage the Club to appoint one and send me the information so I can keep our LCIF files up to date.

Currently District 14C donations stand at **\$8398.00** with the LCIF goal for us being \$39,584. We are a little behind but getting close to where we should be for this time in the Lions year - GOOD JOB Lions!!!!

I'm quite sure you realize that the Lion journey is different for each of us, but one thing is the same: being a Lion changes you. As you serve, and you see how you are improving the lives of others, but you're also discovering your own potential. Every act of service shows you the power you have to make a difference. Every role, every project, every donation, every effort teaches you leadership, compassion, and growth. Each of us has something valuable to offer and Lions help bring that out. Our Foundation makes it possible to touch lives to the extent that would not be possible for the largest District let alone for us as individual Lions. That's why giving to our Foundation is such an important part of being a Lion.

REMEMBER - When making a donation to your Foundation, checks should be made out to "**LCIF**" in whatever amount you wish to donate. You can personally send the check to LCIF, but better yet, let me send it in and I will see to it that you get any and all recognition for your donation. District Disaster Relief Program

December is Holiday Fire Safety – Decorating homes and businesses is a long-standing tradition around the holiday season. Unfortunately, these same decorations may increase your chances of a fire.

Winter Holiday Fire Facts

- U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated average of 832 home structure fires per year that began with decorations, excluding Christmas trees. These fires caused an annual average of 3 civilian fire deaths, 28 civilian fire injuries and \$17 million in direct property damage.
- Electrical distribution or lighting equipment was involved in more than two in five (43%) home Christmas tree fires.
- Nearly one in four (24%) Christmas tree fires were started by lamps or bulbs. Twelve percent were started by candles.
- Roughly two of every five (42%) home Christmas tree fires started in the living room.
- Candle fires peak in December and January with 12 percent of candle fires occurring in December and 10 percent of candle fires occurring in January.
- Thanksgiving is the peak day for home cooking fires, followed by Christmas Day and Christmas Eve.
- Year round, one-third (33%) of home decoration fires were started by candles. This jumped to half in December when candles started 50% of such fires. Cooking started one-fifth (20%) of decoration fires.
