## A Message From the 1st Vice District Governor



Greetings Lions and Leos of District 14-C!

March has finally arrived and we are all anxious for some warmer days and Spring weather after two months of frigid temperatures. Lions Clubs International has put an extensive plan together this year for the training for Vice District Governors. As part of our training I was invited to go to St. Charles Illinois in February for a week of training at the Q center, which was hosted by Lions Club International. There were 785 First Vice District Governors representing approximately 200 countries in attendance. We were broken out into 31 groups for training, and my group had representatives from eleven different countries which made our group very diverse.

When it started snowing it took me back to my school days and it started snowing, all the student's attention was focused out the window. I saw the same experience with so many of the fellow Lions in my class that have never witnessed snow. Of course, some of us had to have a good time with this by stating this was good camping weather and you can only imagine the looks we received.

My biggest take away from the whole experience was interacting with Lions from around the world and knowing we are joined by a common bond as Lions and what we do. We had lively discussions in our group on how we approach items due to the different cultures and other factors, but at the end of the day we were as one under the Lions motto "We Serve". Some areas in the world are still witnessing rapid growth while others, like the USA, are struggling with membership. We in the USA experienced our growth a few decades ago, so now it is time to again communicate what Lions are all about in our communities and get a grassroots effort started at the Club level to get new members. Sometimes big numbers scare us, such as when we hear about getting to 1.5 million members in Lions internationally. Let's keep it simple by every club in District 14-C setting a goal to just get a few new members so you end up in a plus category at the end of the year. So my goals for next year is for all of us to have fun, keep it simple and add a few members to our existing totals. By doing these simple steps I am sure we will be surprised where we end up at the end of the year. I have the upmost confidence in all of you!

## **Paws for Thought**

#### By LD Puppy Raiser Robbie Teal

Here are some frequently asked questions on being a LD puppy raiser.

#### What do I need to start my application to raise a puppy?

We'll ask for some basic information about you, your household, your other pets (if applicable) and any previous experience you might have. One important thing to note is that if you do have other dogs in your home, you'll need to be able to show that they have current rabies, distemper and leptospirosis vaccines (all of which are commonly administered).

### What happens after I send in my application?

Once we get your application, we review everything and confirm your vet records. You can usually expect to hear back from us in about 1–2 weeks, but the wait time will often be shorter if your application is filled out completely and includes your vet records when you submit it.

## How do I get my puppy?

Once your application is complete and approved, we'll set up a date and time for you to come to our Rochester Hills, MI campus to pick up your puppy. You'll also need to bring your puppy back to campus once the time comes for turn-in for your puppy's official guide dog training.

## How long will I have the puppy?

Your puppy will be about 7–8 weeks old when you pick him up. Since we need to have a consistent number of dogs available for training for every guide dog class, you'll bring your Future Leader Dog back to our campus when the dog is 12–15 months old. All in all, the puppy will be with you for about a year.

#### Who pays for the puppy's vet care, food and toys?

For vet care, it depends on where you live. If you're close enough to Leader Dog to use our veterinary clinic, vet visits are free. If you live farther away, you are responsible to finding a vet for your puppy, paying for services and keeping us updated on your puppy's health. Puppy raisers generously support the Leader Dog mission by providing food and toys for their puppy. Check with you tax advisor as veterinary care, food and any travel associated with puppy raising may be tax deductible.

#### Do I need to take my puppy everywhere with me?

No. It's important for Future Leader Dogs to be familiarized with different environments, situations and people, but it's also important for your puppy to learn to be comfortable home alone. And sometimes you just need to get the grocery shopping done quickly. I take my FLD puppy most places. Restaurants, Doctors offices (except one Doctor's office because the Doctor is allergic to dogs), work, Borough Council meetings, Water Authority meetings, Church, and of course Grocery Store. However, I do let the puppy home, and crated occasionally to learn how to be calm when not with me.

#### Does my puppy have the same access rights as a service dog?

Future Leader Dogs are not service dogs yet and don't have automatic access rights to public places. Many businesses may be open to having your puppy visit, but it's always best to ask first. Also, it depends on state regulations. Some states, including Pennsylvania, recognize the importance of training a service dog. PAHR 43 gives service dogs in training the same rights and privileges as a Service dog.

### What happens when I return my puppy?

We set up a tentative return date for your puppy when you first receive him. When your dog is ready for formal guide dog training, you'll bring him back to our campus. You'll say goodbye, and the dog will get acquainted with our canine development center: home for the next four to six months while the dog is trained by one of our guide dog mobility instructors.

Saying goodbye is hard. Some puppy raisers choose to pick up another puppy when turning in their previous dog to ease the transition. Personally, I return the FLD puppy by myself because I cry most of the way home. But I keep the mindset that the puppy is not designated to be my pet, but to give someone their life and independence back.

Becoming a guide dog isn't right for every dog. If the dog you raised is "career changed," it may become a service or assistance dog in another field, you may adopt her, or we'll find a loving home (there's a long waiting list for our career changed dogs).

We keep you updated about your dog's progress through training, and if your dog is matched with a client, there will be an opportunity for you to meet your dog's new "forever person." This is the most exciting moment for most raisers since you can learn about the person whose life is changing for the better because of your dedicated work and effort.

Thank you for all you do.

Recently, I attended a zoom meeting about growth of Lions. One of the slides said "LIONS #1 service is to spread Lionism."

Initially, I took issue with this and thought in my mind for Lions # 1 service is to serve or to provide service. My thought process, was seeing how some organizations start out with a purpose but morph into self-promotion and lose sight of their mission. At the council meeting I shared my concern with another lion, that I did not agree with this phrase. They pointed out that this was a quote from Melvin Jones. They explained that the thought was by making more people aware of Lionism, we could grow our membership and thus do more service, changing more lives. Which is a key concept of mission 1.5. The lesson here is one I had shared in my DG visits but didn't follow myself.

Our initial perception of something may truly be different from the meaning someone else may have. In revisiting the point, by spreading Lionism there would an increased positive impact on the world, I recall the point that Lions Clubs are often the best kept secret in their communities, which we need to change by making people aware of the Lions Club and what it does, in other words by spreading Lionism.

Also, another take away is even an old lion like myself can change their viewpoint. At the recent MD-14 council meeting 2<sup>nd</sup> vice president of Lions International Mark Lyon suggested a modest goal of each club adding 3 members each year. Again, there is no single sure-fire solution that will guarantee success, but having a positive net membership grow each year would be a good step. Another part of the equation is to retain members. Are new members embraced, surveyed for their skills/talents and most important for new IDEAS. Does the sponsor serve as a mentor? Is there a club orientation? If your club can answer yes -you are well on your way to having a dynamic active club.

As you know, all funds from this event will go directly to the Foundation Fighting Blindness to use for the research and clinical trials for the cure and/or treatment of Retinal Degenerative Diseases such as Retinitis Pigmentosa (RP) and Macular Degeneration. As we and our families/friends get older, most of us either know someone who has the Macular Degeneration or perhaps have it ourselves. It cuts off the central vision so activities like reading or even watching tv become impossible. But there are now treatments for this disease – and your donations help finance the research that developed these cures.





Originally titled "Meat Bingo" because the prizes were actual cuts of beef, the event has changed to feature gift cards to local stores and butchers. The event raised almost \$3,000 for the club and is one of its biggest fundraisers of the year.

We had a total of 99 students creating and entering posters in the contest this year and that was 29 more entries than last year! These rooms will be provided to women needing assistance with a fresh start, and the club painted two rooms to make them more welcoming.



## We Serve!

## From the desk of PDG Dennis Cope, Global Service Team (GST) Coordinator

Why do we have Lions clubs? I think most of you would answer that question by saying something like, "To serve our communities," or "To help people in need." Indeed, the ultimate goal of every Lions club should be service. In District 14-C, I like to think our clubs do a good job of providing for needs in their communities that would otherwise go unaddressed. Over the years, I have seen numerous examples of how clubs, either individually or collectively, have responded to requests for assistance, sometimes in extraordinary ways. Just this past Fall, District 14-C clubs donated \$15,000 for hurricane relief in about two weeks - Extraordinary!!

Part of my duty as Global Service Team Coordinator is to remind and encourage clubs to report all the wonderful ways they serve to Lions International using the Lion Portal. This has proved to be an on-going challenge. Our District 14-C clubs have much to brag about, but there seems to be an unfortunate reluctance on the part of many clubs to follow through with reporting their club's activities. That responsibility falls mainly on Club Secretaries and Club Administrators. So while I like to think our clubs are doing a good job of serving their communities, that data reports in the Lion Portal do not provide evidence that this is true.

In preparation for this month's newsletter article, I compared data from July 2024 through February 2025 with the same period in the last two Lion Years. What I found was a steady decline in the percentage of clubs reporting activities, the number of activities reported and the number of people served.

Item	7/22-2/23	7/23-2/24	7/24-2/25
Percentage of Club Reporting Activities	94%	92%	72%
Number of Activities	1,254	1,160	748
Number of People Served	219,430	182,073	118,065

Are our District 14-C clubs really doing 500 fewer activities than 2 years ago and serving 100,000 fewer people? If that's the case, it's no wonder we have difficulty retaining members. People who join a service organization want to be engaged in activities where they can see the impact of the time and effort.

I hope that is not the case. My hunch is many of our clubs are not reporting all of their activities, and so far this year, 12 of our clubs have not reported any activities. If you are reading this article, please ask your Club Secretary if your club's activities are being reported in the Lion Portal. If the answer is, "No," ask what you can do to help correct this situation.

If you are a Club Secretary or Club Administrator who is having trouble navigating the Lion Portal, please contact me for assistance. I will be happy to guide you through the process, step by step, until you are comfortable with entering your club's activities. Let's make sure the data in Lion Portal confirms what we know to be true - that District 14-C Lions clubs are active, engaged and serving their communities.

With the chill of winter, the wind howling and snow flurries flying, one might wonder how Spring is so apparent at PA Lions Beacon Lodge Camp. The staff and Board of Directors are all in Spring mode!

Now is the time when all plugs are pulled to fill the Main Lodge and Children's Village with adults and children with special needs to enjoy a camping experience. Notice of the Project New Hope Retreats for PA disabled Veterans is being promoted as well. Spring work days are scheduled for April 4-6 and April 24 to 27, 2025.

The team of three Directors responsibilities are working well with progress being made. The part-time Marketing and fundraising Consultant has provided an excellent action plan and strategy for marketing/fundraising currently being implemented, beginning with the redesigning of the website and published information. Grant resources are being pursued.

There is a drive to increase attendance at our camping sessions for adults and children with special needs. The Programs Director, Kelly has reached out to nearly 300 past campers while recruiting first time campers. Several Camp Counselors are in place with others being pursued.

With increased campers, comes the need for increased sponsorships of \$1,000 per camper. No camper is turned away at Beacon Lodge, without sponsors we cover the expense. 
