

Welcome to Fall - the leaves will soon be turning, but in the meantime, my yard is currently full of acorns. Did you know that acorns can be ground into a gluten-free flour for baking bread, pastries, and pancakes, or processed into a coarse-ground meal for grits and porridge? Acorn flour can be incorporated into pasta, stews, and curries, or used as a substitute for hominy in dishes like pozole and the flour can also be roasted and brewed into a coffee-like beverage. - If you get an email that looks questionable, don't respond to it, and do not click unknown links in emails.
  - Check the email address of the sender Scam artist will use the same information to try and trick you.
    - Carlislelionray@comcast.net real
    - carlislelionray@gmail.com fake/spam
  - Scammers will use the identity of those who are in the public's eye and every year the District Governors email address is spoofed. Spoofing is different than being hacked. Spoofing is when the email above for gmail.com is used but your home computer shows the name you know. Most people will read the first part and not recognize the difference between Gmail verses Comcast and will respond to the scam. Read the email and if in doubt, do not respond.
- o It most likely is spam or a hoax if:
  - You are asked to respond only by email
  - Request you send bitcoin or gift cards
  - Is an emergency needing your attention immediately
  - Sudden notification that you owe money or are in legal trouble that requires payment.
