A Message From the District Governor

That may involve a "membership growth event", inductions, an orientation plan for new members, and then some mentoring to help them get engaged with club meetings, service activities and fundraising events. If you need help with any of these activities, contact your Zone Chair or PDG Lisa Griffie (grifflion@yahoo.com) who is the District's Global Membership Coordinator and Global Membership Approach Champion. Assuming your club has decided or will decide to provide a reasonable contribution to LCIF, how will you handle that - through a donation from the

Club treasury, a fundraising event, or reaching out to members for their individual contributions. Please don't put it off.

In relation to the sixth of eight District goals, I ask you to think about both the services your club provides to those in need in your community, and the way these services should be reported on the LCI website using MYLION. Our motto is, of course, "We Serve". Is your club actually involved in service in your community, either by planting trees for the sake of our environment, or keeping our neighborhoods clean through programs like "Adopt a Highway", or conducting eye screening events for pre-school children, or feeding the hungry through local food pantries (etc.), or diabetes awareness events/screenings, or helping the families of children with disabilities obtain the home or community modifications to keep them safe? No club would be doing this whole range of service activities, but a club should be guided by the needs in their service area. Needs will and do change for a wide variety of reasons, whether it be a local industry going out of business and leaving workers unemployed, or a hurricane coming through, or a pandemic. Has your club paused to review local needs assessments, or done a local needs assessment recently? LCI has needs assessment tools available on their website. For assistance, contact your Zone Chair, or contact our Global Service Coordinator, PDG Steve Shipman (prsteveshipman@gmail.com).

It is then very important that your club reports the services provided, for at least two reasons. First, service reports provide tangible data of what we are doing to prospective partners of LCI to address large scale humanitarian needs related to hunger, the environment, vision, diabetes awareness or anything else. Secondly, our service data gives us the opportunity to tell the story of what we are doing in our local community. If a service project is not reported, it is not done. MYLION makes it fairly easy to report our services. If you have any questions about how and what to report, or have any difficulty using MYLION, contact your Zone Chair or PDG Steve Shipman.



I am writing this message having just attended the MD 14 Fall Symposium in Harrisburg. What a great opportunity to learn from many of our Multiple District and International Leaders and make new friends without having to travel very far. If you've never attended a Symposium, please consider attending the Spring Fling Symposium in February 2022.

November is Diabetes Awareness Month.

What is Diabetes, you ask? Glucose is an essential part of our everyday functions. Our bodies use it for energy, but that requires a hormone called insulin, which is produced by the pancreas. Insulin is like a taxi for blood

sugar—it takes glucose from blood and directs it to our cells, which finish the job by converting it to energy. When someone has diabetes, their body cannot produce or use insulin effectively, which leaves more glucose in their bloodstream. How common is diabetes you ask? Diabetes is one of the world's fastest growing chronic diseases. The statistics are actually very scary. In 1980 108 million people worldwide had diabetes, by 2014 that number rose to 422 million.

- An estimated 700 million adults worldwide will have Diabetes by 2045
- China has the highest case rate with 116 million followed by India with 77 million and USA with 34 million
- At 34 million that is nearly 11% of the US population
- There are 1.5 million new cases of Diabetes diagnosed in the US each year

What can we as Lions do? Consider having a diabetes awareness event in your area. Partner with a hospital or doctor to help educate. Perform diabetic screenings.. District Governor Dan is planning on having a Districtwide Strides event, sometime this Spring. Another perfect opportunity to connect with your Community

I know you've heard the old expression,. "When you stop learning, you die." I used to laugh at that, BUT the older I get, the more I understand how true this statement really is. Learning is such an important part of our life experience, and you have so many learning opportunities at your fingertips. Leader Dog Puppy Raiser Robbie Teal

A month has gone by and oh the trials and tribulations of raising a puppy. FLD Killian is now 3 months old, and as the expression goes, "Growing like a weed", which really should be changed to "Growing like a puppy." Killian was 12.2 pounds when I picked him up in September. He now weighs 24.2 pounds so he has doubled in size. It is not unusual for large breed puppies to gain 10 pounds a month, for their first few months. Killian's visit to the vet's seem to be a happy one as he stepped up on the scale without any coaxing. We have a training exercise called "Vet Exam" where we get the puppy accustomed to having their teeth, ears, and eyes looked at, as well as running our hands over their body, similar to how a veterinarian would examine him. I must have trained Killian well, as his tail wagged the whole time he was with the veterinarian. Even when she was administering his vaccine shots the tail was going full speed. This is the kind of behavior we stride to have our Future Leader Dogs exhibited.



Other training is moving along well. Killian showed name recognition the first week home as well as learning commands for sit, stay, down, heel, and go to your crate. We are working on forward, backward, going up and down steps gently, and left and right turns. House breaking is going well for a puppy his age and he sleeps between 6-7 hours a night before having to go out to "park". I take him everywhere that I think a visually impaired person would go, grocery store, restaurants, Doctor's office, work etc. If I go somewhere without him, everyone ask, "Where's Killian?" Before I take a Future Leader Dog anywhere, I always notify the business, talk to them about Leader Dogs and if needed, give the business a letter of introduction. Once the businesses know about me being a puppy raiser, there is no problem with bringing him along. For a restaurant, Killian is being taught to lie on his mat, under the table while I am seated. We encourage the puppies

to not seek out attention, and when people approach, I explain who and what Killian is and to please not to pet a working dog or one in training. Most people understand.

Doctor visits are always enjoyable. The patients and the staff in the office always seem to brighten up when a puppy walks in. Killian went to see my Chiropractor the other week. I stepped on the scale for a check on my weight and the office assistant began to laugh. Now, I never thought my weight was a laughing matter so I asked, "What's so funny?" She said, "Look behind you." I looked down and Killian was sitting behind me with his foot on the scales. Don't tell me that dogs don't have a sense of humor.

Decennial Report Q and A

ACTION REQUESTED BY: December 31, 2021

The records of the Department of State's Bureau of Corporations and Charitable Organizations (Bureau) indicate that your association has not made or amended any filing with the Bureau from January 1, 2012 to December 31, 2020. Pursuant to 54 Pa.C.S. §503, the association is required to file a Decennial Report of Continued Existence between January 1, 2021 and December 31, 2021. If the association fails to file a Decennial Report on or before December 31, 2021, it will no longer have exclusive use of its name. This means that, while the non-filing association continues to exist, its name becomes available for use by any other business registering in Pennsylvania.

Earlier this year, many Lions clubs received a post card from the Department of State reminding them to submit the Decennial Report by January 1, 2022. Several clubs have asked for clarification regarding the purpose of this report and whether or not they need to complete it. Here, to the best of our knowledge, is a brief Q&A to explain what we think we know about the Decennial Report.

Q: Why did my club receive this notice?

A: More than likely, at one time your club filed paperwork with the Bureau of Corporations and Charitable Organizations (the Bureau), which formally registered your club's name with the Bureau and put you in their database. That paperwork gave your club exclusive rights to the name you listed on the filing so no other group could use if for fundraising purposes in Pennsylvania.

Q What is the purpose of Decennial Report?

A: From what we can gather, the report is used to update the Bureau's database. They want to make sure the organizations in the database are still in existence and purge those that are not.

Q: What happens if our club doesn't file the Decennial Report?

A: If a report isn't filed, then there is the potential that another group could use your club's name for fundraising purposes.

Q: Is our Lions club required to be registered with the Bureau of Corporations and Charitable Organizations?

A: We can't give a definitive answer to that question. Depending on your club's circumstances and fundraising efforts, the answer could range from "yes" to "probably" to "maybe" to "no." We advise that you check with your club's bank and tax preparer to get an answer to that question.

Q: Wouldn't our club be covered as part of Lions Clubs International (LCI)?

A: LCI is not registered in Pennsylvania, and as such, they do not need to file a Decennial Report. However, LCI is the umbrella organization for all the multiple districts, sub-districts and clubs underneath them for IRS tax-exempt purposes.

PA Lions, however, are registered in Pennsylvania as an entity of Purely Public Charity and that registration covers most, if not all, activities of all the sub-districts and clubs under its umbrella. The PA Lions are registered in Pennsylvania as "Pennsylvania Lions Multiple District No. 14," and this dates back to its date of Incorporation of May 1, 1989.

This registration probably negates the need for some clubs to register independently with the state. Each club should, however, share this information with their bank and/or tax preparer and make an appropriate decision regarding either renewing their club's status with the Bureau through a Decennial Report or filing a new application with the Bureau.

Six members of the Apple City Leo Club along with an advisor and a parent recently joined other community volunteers to pick apples for The Gleaning Project of South Central PA. This is an annual project for the club, and member help glean produce throughout the summer months.
