<u>KANAWHA CITY LIONS</u> <u>SPONSORS PEACE POSTER</u> <u>CONTEST</u>

The Kanawha City Lions sponsored a Peace Poster Contest at Horace Mann Middle School as part of a promotion of Lions Clubs International for the theme of "Kindness Matters".

Angela Magee, a 6th grade student at Horace Mann Mann School won 1st place and was awarded a prize of \$100.00. In second place, Jessi Lin was awarded \$50.00 and in third place, Maggie Rose was awarded \$25.00

These posters are among thousands of entries submitted worldwide in the 29th annual Lions International Peace Poster Contest. Out of 200 posters created by students at Horace Mann, the winners' entries best portrayed this year's theme. Lion Jim Slamick, Peace Poster Chairman, presented the winning students with Certificates of Achievement.

After reviewing the Peace Posters, Lions Club President Shirley Denham said she was impressed by the expression and creativity of the students' entries.

"It is obvious that these young people have strong ideas about what peace means to them. I'm so proud that we were able to provide them with the opportunity to share their visions." Mary Gilkerson, Art Teacher at Horace Mann Middle School was very pleased by the students' hard work and expressions.

The local winners' posters will now advance to round two at the district competition in the Kanawha Valley where their posters will compete against entries from many other schools



in the area. Their entries will face stiff competition through the district round, and in three more rounds of the International contest. One international grand prize winner will receive a trip to a special award ceremony, with two family members, at Lions Day with the United Nations. During the ceremony, the winning artist will receive an engraved plaque and a cash prize of US\$5,000.00. There will also be 23 merit winners that will receive a cash award of \$500 and a certificate of achievement. During the last 27 years, more than four million children from nearly 100 countries have participated in the contest.

My exchange program in the USA

Ladies and Gentlemen, and dear Lions Club Team,

Thank you again for this great exchange program, I had a great time in the USA.

I lived with a host family. To this host family belonged Henry and Lorrie Krautwurst and of course their dog Elvis. From day one, the three of us were very sympathetic. I could trust Elvis to feed him every morning and evening. For this he had to make room on his waiting carpet until I told him: "go get it".

This brought me the family and so I quickly won Elvis his trust. Every morning there was a great American breakfast and for lunch or dinner we mostly dined in many different restaurants.

I experienced many new things. For example, Henry and Lorrie talked to anyone who came across him. Whether in the supermarket or another driver who stands next to one at the traffic light. Which was really funny at first. They explained to me that they were completely different than here in Germany. It was something different but over time I really enjoyed talking to other people just like that. Incidentally, my English skills also totally improved.

But let's come to a few experiences. I was in a huge chicken factory where I was not allowed to see everything but it was really interesting how it all happens in the USA. We got Chicken for a party on the 4th of July. At this party, I helped sell food, saw an auction, and met lots of new people. I saw a huge fireworks since July 4th is a holiday in the USA. I could never have imagined how big the fireworks were. Quite different than in Germany.

Henry also showed me West Virginia, but we drove through the West Virginia wilderness with his small ATV (which was open and had no doors or windows). Elvis was always there and sat in my lap.









Every Friday we went to "Story Time". Here you have children a little joy. They danced and sang with them, read them a book, and at the end they even got a little something to eat, such as the ice cream banana split. Where the Lions Club is very generous and even paid the children a cuddly toy, which was shown in a book. I had not seen so many happy children for a long time. I was also in Washington D.C. There I was at the White House, in an art museum and in some museums about Abraham Lincoln. It was really interesting to hear so much about American history.

Every Sunday we went to church in the morning and this was very exciting to see how it all happens in the US. After each service, there was a kind of feast. Everyone brought something to eat with and there was a huge buffet.

The family and I used to go out with Elvis very often, where I also saw some amazing things in nature. I met another very great person named Danielle. We got along so well and even now write regularly at What's app. Among them I met other exchange students named Vincent, Baptiste and Bree. The guys came from France. I was mountain rafting and sip-lining with her and the other exchange students.

With my host family and the exchange student Bree we drove also to a riding rental where we rode with horses up to Seneca Rocks. Later we even had to climb what Bree and I had a lot of fun. Since the family knew how much I loved nature, we were also on other mountains.

I was at various Lions club events and even saw a real baseball game. It was such a great time otherwise you cannot describe it. Henry and Lorrie have tried to fulfill every wish I had. No matter if I wanted to go to Starbucks, the Hard Rock Cafe or go shopping in the mall for 5 hours. The two were really so awesome that there are no words.

I wish everyone that he lands with these great people. I hope I could get some insight with my report and convey my experiences as far as possible. I was really happy about it.

Beth Slade is the Director of Lions Engagement for Leader Dogs for the Blind, in Rochester Hills, Michigan. Beth has been with Leader Dogs for the Blind for five years, and in her current position focuses on the legacy of Lions involvement with Leader Dog, which was founded by local Michigan Lions in 1939. Beth will also present a seminar entitled "Harness the power of leadership."

BethAnn Telford, a Pennsylvania native and current resident of Virginia, is an endurance athlete and brain cancer survivor and has dedicated herself to raising awareness of brain cancer and to finding a cure. She is an inspirational speaker and has been featured in many articles, books, news stories and a Discovery program documentary. In addition to completing multiple marathons and Ironman competitions, she competed in the World Marathon Challenge in 2017, which consists of running 7 marathons, in 7 days on 7 continents. BethAnn is also an honorary Lion!

Past International Director Joyce Middleton of Bridgewater, Massachusetts completed a two-year term on the international board in 2018. PID Middleton and her husband Lion Martin are Progressive Melvin Jones Fellows and their son and daughter are also Lions. PID Joyce is now serving as Constitutional Area One Chairperson for the New Voices Initiative, a new program created by International President Gudrun Bjort Yngvadottir.
