Let's Be Proud of What We Do!

Happy New Year! And in finishing up 2017 and looking forward to all our activities in 2018, I thought I'd take a moment to share with you what you've done. Oh, I know we all know of what our club has done for our community including providing eyeglasses, scholarships, hearing aids and more. But you've also done more than that and we should never lose sight of it. Like what?

Just look at some of the grants that have been provide through Lions Clubs International Foundation as recently as August 2017. And remember, this is just a few of the grants that totaled some \$4.3 million, in just one month.

\$34,000 went to purchase Low-Vision Aids for an orphanage in the Ukraine. \$31,500 purchased vision screening equipment in the Philippines. \$98,000 equipped a Lions Vision Clinic in Ecuador. Another \$10,000 was used to provide equipment for a similar clinic in Mexico.

\$30,000 was used by Wisconsin Lions to provide a Vision Mission to the Dominican Republic while \$22,726 purchase Vision Screening Equipment in

California while another \$22,611 was used to provide for Mobile Health Screening Equipment in the Golden State.

In Utah, \$99,600 set up a Mobile Vision Screening program and \$16,225 went to Belgium Lions to renovate and help equip a hospital in Kahemba, Democratic Republic of the Congo.

Meanwhile, in Oklahoma, \$50,000 was granted to equip a Mobile Health Screening unit and \$100,000 was spent in Mississippi to equip a Nature Trail for the Disabled.

A therapy pool at a Lions Camp for the Disabled received \$100,000 in Georgia, and another \$14,000 was used to equip a recreational program for the disabled in Wisconsin.

Florida Lions used \$47,000 to renovate the Lions Conklin Center for the Blind, while Lions in Lebanon used \$49,863 to establish a blood bank.

\$25,000 helped equip Abbotsford Regional

Hospital by British Columbia Lions, and Ontario, Canadian Lions used \$100,000 to equip the Dehli Community Health Centre and an additional \$69,816 to equip the Peterbrorough Regional Centre.

Meanwhile Quebec Lions used \$28,984 to renovate and equip a Food Bank, while the Republic of Korea Lions used \$304,000 to purchase thirty-five transportation vehicles for the disabled. The Korean Lions also used \$86,731 to establish Vocational Training for the Disabled as well as \$100,000 to

renovate Rehabilitation Facility for Disabled in Seoul.

And this is only a small part of the list of LCIF beneficiaries from August 2017. You can see the full list on our website. You can also see, that our many donations to LCIF goes to many parts of the world to help in many ways with many projects, large and small. And for that, we should be mighty proud of being a Lion.


