Lions Protocol

What is Protocol? In short, it is a code of correct etiquette or manners. Why is it important? It helps a presiding officer or committee maintain decorum and respect during a meeting. Supplementing protocol is another great tool: Robert's Rule of Order, which governs the conduct of business meetings as ideas and suggestions move along a path to becoming the policy of the governing body. Every presiding officer at every meeting should develop a solid working knowledge of **Robert's Rules of Order**.

For now, I want to focus on proper protocol when the district governor is visiting your club since many of you are scheduling district governor visits at this time. Here are some practical tips to help you:

- 1. **Do not have any other business during the district governor's visit**. At this meeting the district governor is the program.
- 2. Have a member, preferably a past president, meet the district governor and host the district governor until dinner, making sure that the district governor has an opportunity to meet as many club members as possible.
- 3. Be sure the district governor is seated at the head table next to the club president, and that it is determined in advance who will formally introduce the district governor, i.e. zone chairperson, vice district governor, cabinet secretary, etc. If accompanied by a spouse, the spouse joins the district governor at the head table, but never on the end!
- 4. The district governor should never be introduced at any time other than when they are ready to speak.
- 5. When the district governor is introduced, those present should stand and applaud.
- 6. District officers are usually treated as guests of the club.
- 7. It is never considered good taste to interrupt and fine the district governor.
- 8. The district governor often would like to meet briefly with club board of directors so allow time for that if requested, and feel free to discuss club problems or issues with the district governor or district leadership team members present.

Until next time, thank you for your leadership and service! Remember, according to the overwhelming majority of former Lions who gave exit interviews, long, boring, and unproductive meetings are the top reasons they left. You have an opportunity to change that through observing proper protocol and adhering to Robert's Rules of Order in conducting your club's business!

One very important leadership learning opportunity for all Lions at every level is the UDA/Canada Leadership Forum, which is held this year on September 20-22, 2018 in Columbus, Ohio. This is the closest it has ever been for most of us in West Virginia so I am hoping that many West Virginia Lions will attend. This year's theme is "Building Teams Through Leadership." I urge every Lion to register and attend the Forum! Registration forms can be obtained from your district governor, district GLT coordinator, or you can find more information or register on-line at lionsforum.org, or registrar@lionsforum.org, or call 605-723-4007. The Forum is just that: four banquet meals with four dynamic, motivation speakers and over 100 seminars on various topics of Lionism and leadership covering virtually every subject that club, district, and multiple district leaders need. I do hope that I will see you there!

Another great resource for helping leaders and aspiring leaders to gain knowledge and information is the Lions Learning Center, which can be found as a link off the LCI web site under leadership resources. This on-line portal allows the user to create a user name and password then work at self-paced study through many leadership topics, such as Team Building, Motivating Your Team, Conflict Resolution, Effective Listening, and many more. I encourage you to take a look at the site, register, and begin to discover what's available to you from the comfort of your home or office.

One of the goals that I have asked the district governors and the district GLTs to share with me this year is to identify ten Lions in each district as potential club and district leaders and to ensure that they are assigned mentors and trained for leadership roles. Often this is just a matter of sharing information with them and encouraging them to attend events where they can learn new things about Lionism that will give them the confidence to step out of their comfort zone and take a leadership role. This is vital for the longevity of our clubs and our districts. We need different leaders with different skill sets if we are going to see and reach Beyond the Horizon. Clay Lions member Don Jarvis has led quite a life during his 90 plus years. And he still is such an active nonagenarian that younger folk may have difficulty keeping up with him.

He has been a blacksmith, a Captain and a US Navy Pilot on an aircraft carrier (was shot down, injured his shoulder, and rescued from the ocean by an Air Force pilot). He has flown spy planes, attended presidential briefings, and been a flight instructor. He has won an amateur car race. He ran a Clay County water public service district and orchestrated a way to substitute the collateral for its debt so that it could combine with another public service district. He has served as president of the Cattlemen's Association (raised Black Angus) and was a yearly fixture at the State Fair. And he has served as a construction contract manager for public projects.

He still attends Lions Club meetings and District Governor Cabinet Meetings, not to mention District and State Conventions. He is a Trustee for the Clay Lions Scholarship Fund. He is trying to start other Lions Leo Clubs. He serves on the local Conservation District Board and keeps up with the Legislature. He is President of the

Clay County Parks and Recreation. He yearly spends many hours getting the Pool ready and just personally bought playground equipment for the Park. He is a Beekeeper, Landlord, and cuts his own hay (a "one-man operation"). And he washes the undercarriage of his truck by parking in a creek.

But with all that he has done, and still does, the one thing that stands out is his commitment to making sure that children have good vision for school. In the last couple years as Lions Zone 7 Chairman, he ensured that the Lions, together with the School Nurses, eye-screened the students in Clay and Braxton counties (pre-K, elementary, middle & high schools). In fact, all the Zone 7 clubs (Burnsville, Clay, Flatwoods-Heaters, Gassaway and Sutton) helped screen the Braxton High School students last March and Lion Don was there with a coffee cup in his hand. Lion Don has purchased two PlusOptix mobile eye screeners for the Clay Lions Club through the West Virginia Lions Sight Foundation. Each costs about \$6,000. Those machines can tell whether a person needs to see an optometrist. And it is great for pre-school youngsters who may have difficulty with normal eye-screening charts.

Lion Don's interest in children eye screening began with his own children. Even though he has (and still has) excellent eye sight (he was a navy pilot), the school called him and his wife to take their children to an optometrist. And was Lion Don surprised when his daughter told him what she could see when she got her eyeglasses!

Lion Don and his wife, Keyota (Lion's Vice District Governor) live on a farm in Maysel. But they are often crisscrossing our State for Lions and other reasons. And Lion Don says that he takes no prescription medication, which is pretty good for being over 90 years old.

GUDRUN YNGVADOTTIR INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT

Gudrun Yngvadottir, from Gardabaer, Iceland, was elected to serve as international president of Lions Clubs International at the association's 101st International Convention, held in Las Vegas, Nevada, USA, June 29 through July 3, 2018.

International President Yngvadottir is a biomedical scientist and has worked in research, education and management. Since 1990 she has worked at the University of Iceland as Vice Director at the Institute of Continuing Education.

A member of the Gardabaejar Eik Lions Club since 1992, President Yngvadottir has held many offices within the association, including district governor council chairperson. She has dedicated her service to children and youth, membership and leadership development, health and wellness, including vision and diabetes, environmental projects and Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF).

President Yngvadottir served as international director 2010-2012 on the Leadership Committee, as chairperson the second year; 2011-2013 on the Women's Task Force; 2012-2013 she was a board appointee on the District and Club Service Committee; and 2013-2014 on LCIF Governance Ad Hoc Committee.

In recognition of her service, she has received numerous awards including the Kjarans Medal, the highest award of Icelandic Lions; the Lions Crystal, the highest award of Norwegian Lions; several Membership and Extension Awards; eleven International President's Awards; and the Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest Lions Clubs International award. She is also a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow.

In addition to her Lions activities, President Yngvadottir is active in numerous professional and community organizations, including the Icelandic Association of Biomedical Scientists and has been its representative for cooperation between Scandinavian and European scientists.

President Yngvadottir and her husband, Dr. Jon Bjarni Thorsteinsson, a past international director and a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow, have one son, one daughter and six grandchildren.
