WV Lions Youth Camps and Exchange Program WV Lions Youth Camps and Exchange program is up and running for the 2019-20 Lion year. Scholarship Contest Rules and Scholarship applications have been sent to high schools throughout the state. News releases about the program have been sent to newspaper all across the state. Our scholarship contest started in September and will end on November 15, 2019. I am now reaching out to EVERY Lion to help me get the word out to students, family, friends, co-workers and church families about the wonderful opportunity that is being offered. This year we hope to be able to send out six students each with a \$1,400 travel scholarship.

Last summer we sent two students abroad and received two students from Japan, two from Germany and one from Italy. Four students from WV applied to travel and two dropped out of the program. I was disappointed that we had so few students applying for a scholarship when you consider how big our state is.

I am also asking each of you to consider being a host family or recommending a family that you think might be interested in hosting a youth for a 4-6-week period during the summer. I am seeking families where one of the parents is home with the student. It is not necessary to have children at home. We have had very successful hosting with families with no children as well as those with children.

In order for the Youth Camps & Exchange program to be successful there must be host families around the world that are willing to host a foreign student. You say you don't speak a foreign language. My experience has been that most of the students in the program speak English at varying levels. This is an opportunity for them to improve their English speaking and reading skills as well as culture sharing between you and the student.

Don't be afraid to encounter an experience that will forever enrich your life and enable you to make a new life-long friend. My wife and I have hosted six students over the last several years and we want you to be able to know the joy that we have known by hosting.

DISTRICT 29-C LIONS SPONSORS PEACE POSTER CONTEST

The Lions of District of 29-C sponsored Peace Poster Contests at four locations as part of a promotion of Lions Clubs International for the theme of "JOURNEY OF PEACE". The contest hopes to Inspire young people to showcase their talent and Create memories that will last a lifetime. Posters are evaluated on three criteria at each level of judging: originality, artistic merit and expression of the theme.

Emily Garrett, a 7th grade student at Braxton County Middle School is this year's District 29-C winner. Other entries were from: Trenton Brock, Green Bank Middle; Adaliah Faucett, Horace Mann Middle, and Destiny Hall, Oceana Middle School in Wyoming County.

These posters are among thousands of entries submitted worldwide in the 30th annual Lions International Peace Poster Contest. Out of 250 posters created by students District wide, the local winning entries best portrayed this year's theme. Lion Jim Slamick, Peace Poster Chairman, presented the winning students with Certificates of Achievement.

After reviewing the Peace Posters, District Governor Lion Gary Boyd said he was impressed by the expression and creativity of the students entries. "It is obvious that these young people have strong ideas about what peace means to them. I'm so proud that we were able to provide them with the opportunity to share their visions

The District's winning poster now advances to round two at the multiple district competition in West Virginia where it will compete against entries from many other schools or youth groups in the state. Emily Garrett's entry will face stiff competition through the district round and in three more rounds of the International contest. One international grand prizewinner will receive a trip to a special award ceremony with two family members at Lions Day with the United Nations. During the ceremony, the winning artist will receive an engraved plaque and a cash prize of US\$5,000.00. There will also be 23 merit winners that will receive a cash award of \$500 and a certificate of achievement. During the last 29 years, more than four million children from nearly 100 countries have participated in the contest.
