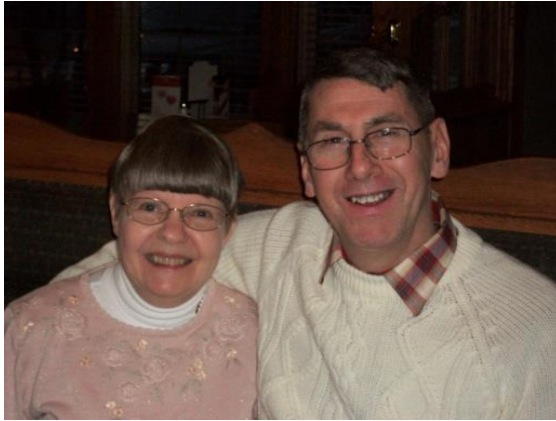
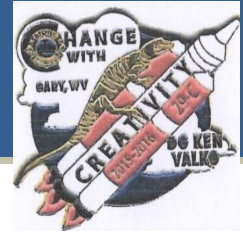

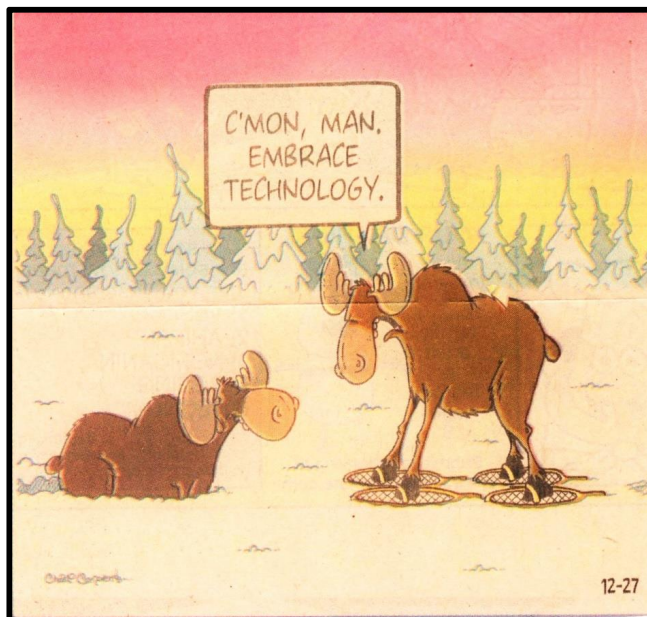
Yes, winter has given us some time to think and plan

A Message from the LCI Membership Task Force

This year has been an exciting time to serve on the LCI Board. Not only are we anticipating a grand gala to celebrate 100 years of service; but also, the Directors of North America have unified in a common message, which we have been sharing at each of our visits. While Lions have always lead with service, the impact that we have by adding additional hands is being highlighted. A new club will serve over 1000 people in the first year of existence. However, a club that has a negative membership trend experiences a steady decline in the number of people served. Hence, the power of One new club, One new Lion or One Lion retained must be explained.

Having completed a preliminary test of the material, which was rolled out in January, 2016, we met to review our progress toward reversing a 40 year negative trend in membership. The overall reviews were positive. The reaction that has been most revealing is that most clubs have not held an organized "Membership Growth Event" on a regular basis. Hence, we as leaders must take the time to explain that an organized event which results in 3 new members translates into 150 children or adults with vision needs served; 150 youth served; or 150 hungry people fed. We make a difference.

The second phase of the "North American Director's Membership Initiative" is to seek the support of the Past Directors. As you make official visits, please take the time to mention the benchmarks outlined in the "Talking Points", which have been developed in cooperation with LCI Staff and the GMT:

Each Lion has the opportunity to participate in a hands-on project 4 times per year.

Each club ends the year with a net membership gain of +1 or more.

Each district charts one new club of 20+ members annually.

We believe that these three benchmarks will reverse our negative membership trend, while enhancing retention.

Further, as a leader within our association, may I ask, on behalf of the North American Directors Membership Task Force, that you use your influence within your Multiple District to insure that this year, you end with each district chartering at least one new club.

Please know that your assistance is much appreciated. In fact, the members sponsored, because of your extra effort, may be the very one who identifies a child with a fatal eye condition, helps a diabetic child to learn to take care of himself or even develops a program to increase food productivity and eliminates world hunger.

Thank you in advance for your willingness to join us in a common message which highlights the theme, "Invite for Impact".

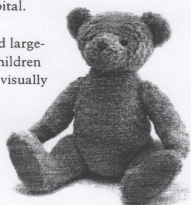

LIONS CHILDREN FIRST

25 PROJECT IDEAS TO SERVE CHILDREN

1. Organize a monthly food drive and donate collections to the food pantry.
2. Provide meals at a homeless shelter.
3. Assist with a school lunch program.
4. Make hygiene kits for children at homeless shelters.
5. Collect children's clothing and shoes for a shelter for battered women and children.
6. Collect suitcases or backpacks for orphaned children; fill with school supplies.
7. Work with healthcare professionals to provide free immunizations.
8. Work with healthcare professionals to provide health screenings or free clinics to provide physical, dental, hearing exams; and follow up with assistance, if necessary (professional referrals, assistive devices).
9. Assist at children's camps focusing on diabetes, blindness, deafness or hearing loss, and other camps serving children with special needs.
10. Make baby supply kits for newborns in need.
11. Collect safe soft toys (no small, removable parts) and/or coloring books for a children's hospice or children's hospital.
12. Supply Braille and large-print books for children who are blind or visually impaired.



PLANNING SERVICE PROJECTS

The Lions publication, *Community Needs Assessment* (MK-9), can help Leos organize a community service project and is available on the Lions Web site in the Member Center section. When organizing a project, Leo clubs should:

Identify a community need. A good place to start may be a food or clothing drive. Or, consider if the community needs a new playground, nature trail or recycling center.

Contact other community organizations. Verify that other organizations or government agencies are not currently undertaking this project or planning to do so in the near future.

Calculate costs. Assess the current financial and membership resources within the club. If needed, consider creating a joint project with another Leo club or with the sponsoring Lions club.

Complete the details. Establish a timeline.

Obtain permission from the school and legal clearance/permits from local authorities, if necessary. Obtain all necessary supplies.

Publicize the project. Inform the media about the project. Place large signs throughout the area, if appropriate. See page 21 of this handbook for an explanation of Leo emblem use.

PROJECT IDEAS

Social service

- Visit children in an orphanage or the pediatrics ward of a hospital.
- Collect and distribute food and clothing for those in need.
- Help a senior citizen with household chores.

Environment

- Plant tree seedlings.
- Organize a roadside or beach clean-up campaign.
- Adopt an endangered species.
- Teach the community about the benefits of "going green."

Literacy and culture

- Collect school supplies for students in need.
- Donate books to a local library.
- Organize a talent show.

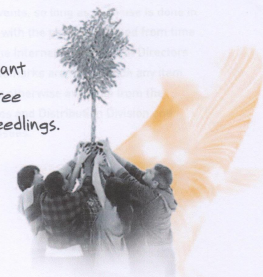
Health services

- Distribute information about HIV/AIDS.
- Assist health care professionals during vision, hearing or diabetes screenings.
- Collect and distribute eyeglasses.
- Distribute information about diabetes prevention.

International service projects

- Participate in the International Club Twinning Program.
- Host a party for Lions International youth exchangees.
- Organize a shoe recycling project and donate the shoes to countries in need.

WVU Eye Institute & Lions Outreach

Kids Insight, a joint project of the Saint Lucia Blind Welfare Association (SLBWA), the Lions Clubs of St. Lucia, and the West Virginia Eye Institute addresses the vision needs of children in St. Lucia with blinding eye conditions. *Kids Insight* offers a comprehensive approach to pediatric eye problems, including surgical, medical, educational, and rehabilitation needs. Every year since 2003, a committed team from West Virginia, USA has volunteered their time and expertise to help our children. The work completed during their visits is the result of year-long planning and organization from St. Lucia and West Virginia Eye Institute. In December 2015, five clinics held by the *Kids Insight* team examined 149 adults and children, and completed over 40 surgeries.

In Memorium

Robert Fred Radabaugh, 85, of Elkview and a member of the Elk Lions Club, passed away Wednesday Feb. 17, 2016 at Ruby Memorial Hospital. Fred served from 1953 to 1955 in the U.S. Army. Fred was a teacher, principal and central office administrator for Kanawha County Schools from 1956 to 1984. He was elected to the Kanawha County Board of Education in 1986 and served as president from 1990 to 1992. Fred was the executive director of the West Virginia Association of School Administrators from 1993 to 2002. He held offices in the Elk Lions Club and the Optimist Club of West Charleston.

Johnny T. Mallamaci, 91, of Welch passed away February 1, 2016. He was a member of the Lions for 50 years. Graduated from Welch High School, he volunteered for the military and flew 26 missions over Europe as a Turret Gunner and Radio Operator. He was awarded several honors for his military service. After his war time service, 45 years were devoted to the postal service as a Postman. Much of his time was given to coaching Little League baseball, officiating football and basketball, golf and bowling. Mallamaci loved his church, St Peter's Catholic Church, and the Mighty Welch Lions Club. Most of all, He loved God, family and friends.
