Exibition Coal Mine Tour for Lions District 29-C Fall Conference November 5, 2016, 2pm

The Beckley Exhibition Coal Mine and the Youth Museum have been a favorite destination for families and groups for years – and this season is no exception.

Executive Director Leslie Baker says, "The Exhibition Coal Mine and the Youth Museum's focus has always been on families and groups. Our hands-on exhibitions and underground coal mining tour offer wonderful opportunities for groups to interact, share, and learn something new about a their unique coal heritage."

As the focal point of the City's lovely New River Park, the complex draws thousands of people to the area annually. The unique underground mine and museum, the recreated coal camp, the Youth Museum and the Mountain Homestead are surrounded by inviting lawns, colorful flowers, picnic areas, an imposing coal miner statue and a whimsical 20 ft. "Peace Totem".

At the Exhibition Coal Mine, one can ride through the dark passages of a vintage coal mine on an actual "mantrip". The guides are veteran miners and provide firsthand accounts of the daily responsibilities and travail of past and present day miners.

In addition to the Mine, one can tour the small mine museum and the period coal camp buildings situated throughout the grounds. Lovingly restored, the Coal Company House, Superintendent's Home, Pemberton Coal Camp Church, and the Helen Coal Camp School, give visitors a true representation of early 20th century coal camp life.

The Exhibition Coal Mine operates on a seasonal schedule, opening on April 1st and closing November 1st but is always available for tours of more than 20 people (Special opening for Lions on Nov. 5). Visitors are asked to bring a jacket because the temperature is always 58 degrees inside the Mine.

West Virginians have benefited many times from Lions Clubs contributions. This year all bond together for 100% participation. Last year we were only 50%. Amtrak Travel to Chicago LCI Convention

For those considering riding Amtrak to Chicago for the 2017 LCI Convention, the Cardinal #51 train runs Sunday, Wednesday, and Friday from New York City to Chicago with stops in White Sulphur Springs, Alderson, Hinton, Prince/Beckley, Thurmond, Montgomery, Charleston, and Huntington.

The complete Cardinal schedule is available on the District website at <u>http://e-district.org/userfiles/661/file/AmtrakCardinalSched.pdf</u> or through the Amtrak website at <u>https://www.amtrak.com/home</u>.

For example, Carolyn and I will Depart White Sulphur Springs Wednesday June 28, 2017 at 5:05 PM and arrive in Chicago the next morning at 10:05 AM. We will depart Chicago Tuesday July 4, 2017 at 5:45 PM and arrive in WSS the next morning at 11:39 AM. Our Round Trip fare, using a age 62+ 15% discount, was \$139.40 each. For those Lions under age 62, Amtrak offers a 10% Convention Fare Discount good for travel between June 15, 2017 and July 15, 2017. I advise Lions to first go to Amtrak.com and look up

Craigsville Lions

The Craigsville Lions began with \$2,423.30 in flood relief funds provided by District 29-C. Using other direct donations amounting to \$1100, partnering with United Way who provided a matching grant of up to \$3600, and with Lowes of Summersville's generosity, we were able to almost quadruple our impact, finally purchasing and delivering a large quantity of rebuilding materials with a retail value of over \$9,500. Lowes provided the materials at more than a 25% discount from retail. Ten families from Webster County were assisted. It was a great experience to be able to help these flood victims.
