## Centennial Service Challenge – We're Almost There!

The latest statistics indicate we have already passed 90% of our goal of impacting the lives of 100 million people during the Centennial Service Challenge. You may remember our goal was to serve 25 million people in each of four areas: Engaging Our Youth, Protecting Our Environment, Sharing the Vision, and Relieving the Hunger. We have already surpassed our goal in two areas, but need to do more in Sharing the Vision and Relieving the Hunger.

The important thing to remember is that many clubs are doing great work in all of these areas, BUT, if the activities are not reported through MyLCI and earmarked as Centennial Service Challenge projects, the numbers do not get included. Clubs participating in the Challenge also earn banner patches each year, recognizing their work. The patches are awarded based on the reporting through MyLCI. If you don't know how to do the reporting, ask your Centennial



Coordinator to suggest a nearby club Secretary that can show you how it's done.

#### Peace Poster Contest

The theme of the 2016-17 Peace Poster Contest is "A Celebration of Peace." Students, ages 11, 12 or 13 on November 15, 2016 are eligible to participate. Eligible birth dates are November 16, 2003 through November 15, 2005.

Lions clubs interested in sponsoring the Lions International Peace Poster Contest can order a Peace Poster Contest kit (PPK-1) from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters. The cost of the kit is US\$11.95 plus shipping, handling and applicable taxes. The kit is available in all 11 of our official languages. Lions clubs must purchase a kit for each contest sponsored. Each kit contains:

- Official Club Contest Guide and Rules
- Official School or Youth Group Contest Guide and Rules
- Participant Flyer to duplicate and give to participating students to take home
- Sticker to place on back of winning poster
- Certificates for contest winner and school or youth group

You can order kits from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters from January 15 to October 1. To order a kit, call Club Supplies Sales at (630) 571-5466 or 1-800-710-7822 (U.S., Puerto Rico, U.S. Virgin Islands and Canada only). To order online, go to Club Supplies (Item Search: Peace Poster Kit). Kits will be available through October 1, 2016.

Other important dates:

- December 1: Postmark deadline for a Governor to send one winning district poster to multiple district council chairperson.
- December 1: Postmark deadline for a Governor not belonging to a multiple district to send one winning poster to the Public Relations Department at International Headquarters.
- December 1: Postmark deadline for a Club not belonging to a district to send one winning entry to the Public Relations Department at International Headquarters.
- December 15: Postmark deadline for the multiple district council chairperson to send one winning poster to the Public Relations Department at International Headquarters.
- February 1: International winners notified on or before this date.

## Leader Dog Puppy Raisers

As you know, our first try at raising a Future Leader Dog puppy rendered itself to us having a wonderful black lab as our own pet. Don't know what we would do without him now. "Durbin" is now 3 yrs. old and very much settled down. Charles and I did not want to give up on the first try so we now have another puppy, "Reo", who is half Golden Retriever and half Yellow Lab. He was born June 2, 2016, and amazes me every day at how smart these dogs are. We humans do not give them enough credit. They just speak a different language.

Leader Dog has greatly changed their method of training these puppies. Their new manual should be completed by the end of August. We still have them for a year and teach them the same commands such as Heel, Sit, Stand, etc., but in a very different way. Also, I can see a big difference in the disposition of this new puppy and Durbin. Reo seems much more calm and obedient from the beginning, than Durbin. Durbin was a "hyper" dog, always on the move. Reo likes to sleep and goes in his crate willingly.

We went to Rochester Hills, MI, and picked up Reo July 26. He was 7 weeks old and weighed 11 lbs. He has grown so quickly, weighing almost 20 lbs. now. I think he will be a bigger dog than Durbin who weighs 73.

The Kennel Renovation is almost complete and the \$14.5 million has been raised and pledged. The new facility is beautiful, much bigger, brighter and more convenient. The best part is that the puppies are now in a glass enclosed area in the lobby for all to see. All the dogs, sizes and ages, are much more accessible to trainers and volunteers. They are the center of all activity, which they should be. The day we were there several puppy raisers had brought their dogs in, now a year old, to leave them for their



formal training. The Future Leader Dogs reminded me of the first day for freshmen entering college. They looked a little nervous and wondering what they were supposed to do. The professional trainers already had several on their leashes and taking them outside......through the main lobby.

All you Lions wish us luck with Reo. Maybe he will be a Leader Dog for some lucky client. He is beautiful and a sweetie.






### **Club News**
