WHITE CANE DAY

In 1921, James Biggs, a photographer from Bristol, England, became blind following an accident. Because he was feeling uncomfortable with the amount of traffic around his home, he painted his walking stick white to be more easily visible. In 1930, Lion George Bonham, President of the Peoria Lions Club (Illinois) introduced the idea of using the white cane with a red band as a means of assisting the blind in independent mobility. White canes were made and distributed and the Peoria City Council adopted an ordinance giving the bearers the right-of-way to cross the street. News spread throughout the U.S., and their visually handicapped friends experimented with the white canes. Overwhelming acceptance of the white cane idea quickly gave cane users a unique method of identifying their special need for travel consideration. Today, white cane laws are on the books of every state in the US providing persons who are blind a legal status in traffic. Lions and International White Cane Safety Day is an opportunity to increase awareness about the white cane, alerting motorists of the need to exercise special caution and provide the user the right of way. In 1964 the U.S. Congress approved a resolution authorizing the President of the U.S. to annually issue a proclamation designating October 15th as "National Cane Safety Day." This date is a suggested date. Lions Clubs are free to hold awareness events according to the schedule of the club and the community it serves. Suggested Activities for Lions

Mobilize your club to partner with local blindness experts, schools and organizations for the blind to plan your International White Cane Safety Day awareness activity.

- Arrange for a person who is blind to demonstrate the use of the white cane and its benefits, and share his or her accomplishments and aspirations with the community or your club.
- Invite a representative from a local school for the blind or a low vision clinic to speak about white cane, orientation and mobility and white cane laws in your community.
- Work with your local government officials to create a White Cane Safety Day Proclamation for your event.
- Work with local news media to convey your community's white cane laws to the public.

Be sure to report your white cane awareness project or event using the Service Activity Report in MyLCI. Learn how your project may contribute toward the Centennial Service Challenge!
