

One of the best ways to promote club membership growth is to shine a spotlight on Lions service by hosting a public event. Here are a few ideas you can share with your club leaders:

- Invite the community to a Lions open house. Have an informational table for each service project your club offers. Celebrate a ribbon cutting on your new building, park or playground. Attract local families with a barbecue or game night.
- Open your service projects to non-Lion participants. Sorting eyeglasses? Planting trees? Feeding the hungry? Show your neighbors what it means to be a Lion by inviting them to serve alongside your club.
- **Host or sponsor a major community event.** Develop a fun and exciting event or sponsor an existing one. Lions clubs all over the world are known for their unique festivals, carnivals, parades, concerts and more.
- **Invite one-time volunteers from colleges.** Episodic volunteerism has been identified as a major emerging trend. For your next big project, invite college students to participate. Many colleges will be on break soon, and the young adults will be happy to do something productive.
- **Donate a public item.** Donate a bench to a public park, or trash cans to a street, or footballs to kids, or any item that will be seen by the public. Make sure the Lions logo and slogan, "We Serve," are clearly visible. For example, in Mumbai, Lions are giving away free umbrellas to the poor with Lions branding.

For any event to succeed, Lions need a marketing plan. Encourage your club leaders to publicize their events in the local newspaper, radio, TV news, websites and social media. Post flyers or go door to door to spread the word.
