# News from Lions International District C-2 April 2018





# April is Leo Awareness Month so here is a little bit of history.

Not long after the Lions Association was established in 1917, junior Lions clubs and youth auxiliary clubs were sprouting up throughout the United States. They had one thing in common—they were focused on civic service and leadership.

However it wasn't until 1957 that the efforts of two Lions, Jim Graver and Bill Ernst of the Glenside Lions club in Pennsylvania, developed the basis for a permanent youthoriented, Lion-related club that continues to this day.

Lion Graver, active in coaching youth and American Legion baseball in the summer leagues, believed that a vehicle was needed to encourage youth to participate in community service. He and Lion Ernst took their idea to their Lions club which supported their vision whole-heartedly.

The club started with Bill Graver, Lion Jim Graver's teen-age son who was active in both high school baseball and youth leagues, and 25 members of young Graver's high school baseball team plus 9 additional students. On December 5th,1957 the new club was

formed—The Abington Senior High School Leo club.

The young club agreed on the name of Leo as it obviously refers to Lion ("leo" is also the Greek word for "lion"). It wasn't until after this name was chosen that the motto "Leadership, Equality, Opportunity" was devised to support the letters of the name Leo.

Later, the word "Equality" in the motto would be changed to "Experience". This was done as the program was being prepared for worldwide distribution. It was thought that "experience" had a more universal appeal.

In 1963 two more Leo clubs were established and by 1964 there were 27 Leo clubs in Pennsylvania and 1 in New York.

In 1964 the Lions of Pennsylvania District 14 incorporated Leo clubs and it became an official district program. From there it didn't take long for Lions Clubs International to recognize the Leo clubs as an effective youth program. "When the national organization indicated their interest in taking on Leos as a project certain things were negotiated", explains Lion Bill Graver. "The name 'Leo Club' for one and the colors of maroon and white to match those of Abington High School. Also a narrative of the founding would be preserved by national". In October of 1967 the board of directors of LCI implemented Leo clubs into their organization as one of their youth programs.

And the rest, as they say, is history!





# "And the Roar Goes On"



The charter president of the first Leo club in 1957, Bill Graver—Lion Jim Graver's son—is today a member of the Manchester Lions club in Manchester Connecticut (pictured at left).

"Many schools have embraced the value of introducing community service in the curriculum. A vehicle such as Leo clubs is a natural fit to promote the value of community service and to bring diverse groups together in that pursuit. We are living in a time when we need to do more to bridge gaps of age, gender, race and class. I would hope that constructive involvement in Leo club activities would encourage and motivate youth toward those kinds of goals."

Lion Bill Ernst, the co-founder of the 1st Leo club, spent many years after the founding of the Abington High School Leo club working to promote the expansion of Leo clubs. He visited Lions at district meetings and visited many clubs in the southeastern Pennsylvania area. Lion Bill is shown in the picture third from the left. The picture was probably taken at one of the many events Lion Bill attended promoting the establishment of Leo clubs. "It became his pride and joy to do all this work and he did it exceptionally well" adds Lion Bill Graver.

### The World's First Leo Club is Alive and Well!

The Abington High School Leo club is back in business. After their chartering sponsor club dissolved, the Leo club became inactive for a few years. However in 2017 the Hatboro Lions club in Abington Pennsylvania took up the challenge and sponsorship of the Leo club. Led by Leo club advisor Lion Mindy Katz, a teacher at Abington High School, 62 members were inducted as Leos on November 14th, 2017. PDG Ed Tustin did the honours.

The Abington High School Leo club and Hatboro Lions club are part of Pennsylvania's District 14-A.

Nanton Leo Club

## Leos in Our District Lethbridge Community College Leo Club

The Lethbridge Community College Leo club is solely made up of students from the Criminal Justice Program (specifically policing) with focus on providing services to the community through a number of volunteer events.

Typically club members volunteer at between 30 and 40 events per year. Any donations received by the club from volunteering at events is donated in turn to local organizations identified by the club's executive team.

The Leo club strives to give their policing students an opportunity to gain valuable life experience through community involvement. Many of these students are pursuing careers in policing where they are required to have not only life experience but also volunteerism within their community.

Some of the activities club members have participated in this year are:

- Claytons annual wine auction which raises funds that go towards the college
- Newcomer welcome event with Lethbridge Family Services which helps newcomers to Canada realize all the support services that are available to them
- Several marathons such as the Lethbridge Police Marathon and the CIBC Run For The Cure
- Volunteered at a Hallowe'en fundraising

- event by the Correctional Centre Staff. All proceeds were donated to Wounded Warrior Canada.
- Participate monthly in the Lethbridge Crime Stoppers reenactment videos.
- Volunteered at Christmas dinner for the blind and visually impaired.
- Participated in "red nose" programs during Christmas where club members drive participants who need a ride home.

The club also provides training for members at no cost. Recently training has been provided in ProServe (providing workers with training on the social responsibilities related to serving or selling liquor); First Responder to Sexual Assault & Abuse; mental health and first aid training.

"Since September our members have participated in approximately 20 events and are close to 700 hours of volunteering. We are very proud of those numbers!" adds Scott Sigfusson, President.
