Lion Peter took the project idea to his club which heartily got behind the idea. They decided that January and February would be the best time to start the collection—after the Christmas festivities.

The Kamloops Lions club had kicked-off their sock drive at one of the Kamloops Blazers games. So the Calgary Hitman organization was approached and agreed to have the Heritage club kick-off their collection program at their game at the Saddledome on January 5, 2018.

Thus the "Toasty Toes" Sock Collection Program

was born.

Donation drop off locations were established at a number of A&W locations. The socks go to the Calgary Drop-In Centre and the Calgary Women's Shelter.

The program runs from January 5—February 28, 2018. As of January 23, the program has collected 1,519 pairs of socks and the club is expecting to exceed their goal of 2,500 pairs collected.

Do you know?

The vernal (spring) equinox falls on Tuesday, March 20th, 2018.

This is when the length of both day and night are nearly equal. At 10:15 am on this day the sun shines directly on the equator.

The vernal equinox marks the astronomical end to winter and the beginning of spring. The astronomical spring will run until the summer solstice which is on June 21st, 2018.

The meteorological spring (based on temperature) runs from

March 1st to May 31st.

However, both camps agree on how to determine when Easter falls.

It is the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox! Whew!
