## Canadian Lions Eyeglass RECYCLING Centre

CLERC, an out of sight opportunity to aid the vision impaired of the world!

### UPDATE

Lion James Lee, Chairman of CLERC, confirms that their 3-ton truck will be present at both the C-2 and C-1 conventions in October/November to collect eyeglasses brought by convention attendees. CLERC will also be presenting how to pack glasses and how the sorting, grinding, and classifying is done before they are shipped out.

CLERC is one of 19 Lions Eyeglass Recycling Centres (LERCs) world-wide collecting and distributing eyeglasses to people in need in low and middle income communities. The Centre in Calgary serves all of Canada. There are also Centres in Australia, France, Italy, Republic of South Africa, Spain and thirteen in the United States.

CLERC was the 2nd highest contributor to eyeglass recycling of all 19 Centres with almost 500,000 pairs in the past year. The Centre is expanding across Canada and with the support of International Director for Canada, PCC Tom Gordon, the program is being endorsed by organizations such as the BP Retirees Association and Imperial Oil Retirees Association. As well, Loblaws in Ontario now ships new glasses—readers and sunglasses— to CLERC for distribution.

CLERC is also collecting hearing aids. The new collection boxes will show this as well as the collection of eye glasses.

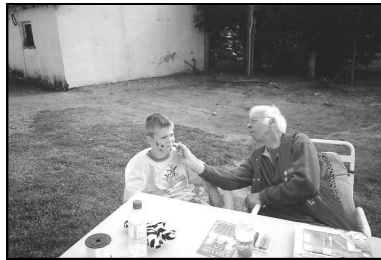
### Lethbridge Host Lions Club

### "O Canada" Redcliff Style!

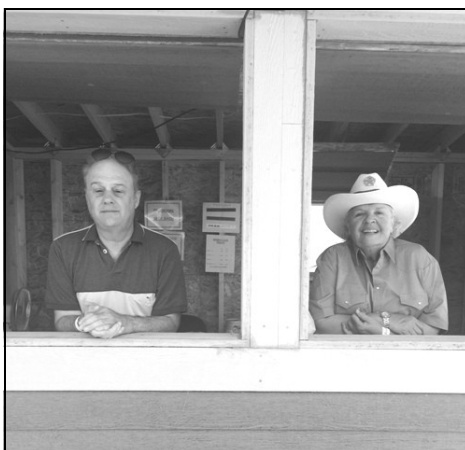

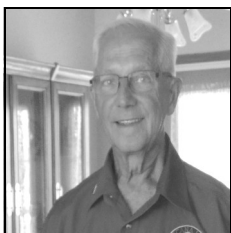

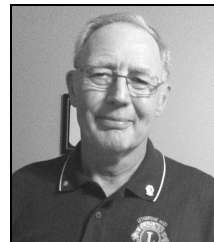
