Do you know . . . that Milan has a Vertical Forest?

Designed by architect Stefano Boeri, the two residential towers built in 2014 are covered in 800 trees, 3,400 shrubs and 14,000 plants.

Each year the trees will absorb 10,000 tonnes of carbon dioxide and 57 tonnes of pollutants. They will also produce about 900 tonnes of oxygen.

The plants will also decrease the average air temperature, create noise barriers and boost biodiversity by creating a

Thoughts on the 2018 Las Vegas Convention

50%, undoubtedly due to the great success of our Centennial Convention in Chicago last year. Comparison: Chicago had

28,684 registrations and 9,550 hotel rooms; Las Vegas had 15, 268 registrations and 4,743 hotel rooms. However, it is to be noted that a total of 2,500 Lions cancelled their registration, with approximately 1,500 due to denial of visas.

It is expected that about 25,000 will attend the 102nd International Convention in Milan, Italy where, hopefully, our own Lion Dr. Patti Hill will be elected to the office of International Third Vice-President. I have heard that many Lions from Canada chose to skip Las Vegas in favour of going to Milan. In Milan the delegates will be staying in 46 different hotels, but most of the Canadian Lions will be housed in two - the Blaise & Francis Hotel and the Radisson Blu Hotel Milano. The delegations from Atlantic Canada, Quebec, Ontario, and our own MD C will be in those two, along with the Lions delegations from Eastern Europe.

Several travel agencies in Canada and the USA are preparing materials for pre and post-convention tours for delegates, and those materials should be available in the very near future. The dates of the Milan International Convention are July 5-9, 2019.

Back to the Las Vegas Convention. The weather was quite warm - the temperature seldom goes below 80 degrees (F) during the night, and on most days was usually well over 100 degrees. On the day of the International Parade, I believe it got close to 115 degrees. However, almost everything took place in the gigantic MGM complex, so there was limited requirement (outside of the parade) to

A highlight of the Convention was a decision by the International Board of Directors to unanimously endorse Patti Hill as their choice for Third VP election in Milan.

The program had something for everyone. Following the

The attendance was down almost parade the Canadian delegation (about 250-300) met to receive an update from our Canadian International Director Tom Gordon, some information about Campaign 100 (the new LCIF fundraising campaign), some preliminary information about celebrating the Lions of Canada Centennial in 2020, and Patti Hill's campaign.

> On the Saturday evening the traditional International Show was spectacular and featured Cirque du Soleil performing a Cirque Dreams Jungle Fantasy.

The opening Plenary Session on Sunday featured Dr. Sanjay Gupta, a CNN celebrity, speaking about our need to live a more healthy existence.

The Second Plenary Session featured former US President George W. Bush being interviewed by Ari Fleischer, former White House Press Secretary - the former President was most engaging, and subtly critical of some of the current US President's policies. Wynonna Judd, western country music star, was also part of the program leading up to the introduction of former President Bush.

The final Plenary Session on Tuesday was opened by "Mr. Las Vegas", Wayne Newton, and the presentation of our Humanitarian Award to Dr. Prathap Reddy, founder and chairman of Apollo Hospitals. The session concluded with the introduction of our new International Third Vice President Brian Sheehan from Minnesota USA, our 2018-2019 International President Gudrun Yngvadottir from Iceland. and the newly elected International Directors.

Beginning on Friday, June 29th and continuing through to Monday July 2nd, there were over 100 seminars about almost every aspect of Lions. A great learning experience was enjoyed by all. Also, throughout those days the Exhibit Hall had booths and displays about our global presence, as well as more than 40 commercial enterprises selling their wares.

One of the great positives about International Conventions is the opportunity to meet, make friends, and share information with other Lions from around the world - the 2018 Las Vegas Convention, in my opinion, met that ob-

For the past 25 years, the "Tabbie Project" has been carried on by the club but relatively unknown to the rest of the district's Lion clubs. It is an effective and easy way to raise funds to send diabetic kids to Camp Jean Nelson located in the Rocky Mountain Foothills just outside Water Valley in Alberta. The camp accommodates campers from ages 7 to 15 in a number of sessions staffed by counselors, instructors and medical professionals.

The "Toasty Toes" program is relatively new to the club having only started in 2018. The success was overwhelming and so has become one of Heritage club's on-going service projects. Update From Our District Governor Lion Tyler Bray 2018-2019

It has been a hot, dry and smokey summer so far. I hope everyone is safe and able to

cope with the current smoke issues.

Your district governor team has been involved and active since early July. The 101st LCI Convention was a very successful endeavour. Our very own, Dr. Patti Hill, has been unanimously endorsed by the LCI board and directors and is their candidate of choice for the position of 3rd IVP. This will be decided upon in Milan in July of 2019. Dr. Hill will be challenged by one individual who believes he can achieve more votes. Lions—now is the time to step up. We need Lions to make the journey to Milan and help our candidate by being there to vote for Dr. Patti Hill. We are asking each Lions club and individuals to make donations to support our candidate. It has been 30 plus years since we had a Canadian Lions International President— and, yes, the last was Judge Brian Stevenson.

As of July 1st, 2018 we had a total of 79 Lions clubs and 1,952 Lions in our district. LCI has closed Calgary McCall Lions club for financial issues and Calgary Mountainview Lions declared they were shutting down. Both districts (C –1, C–2) had been working on moving Lions clubs from C–1 into C–2. These clubs were originally part of District 37–O and had expressed interest to relocate into district C–2. Around July 15 of this year, LCI moved 11 clubs from C–1 into C–2. We now have 90 Lions clubs and 2.127 Lions in District.
