I want to brag on Constitutional Area 1, which we are a part of. As of August 5, 2025, there





More Hands More Service!

First, I want to take this opportunity to congratulate IPDG Dr. Joe Hinojosa and all of the Lions of District 2-A3 in achieving POSITIVE MEMBERSHIP GROWTH for the July 1, 2024 to June 30, 2025, Lion's year! The challenge that we now have for this Lion's year is to keep that POSITIVE MEMBERSHIP GROWTH going for another year – and then another year – and on and on.

As we talk about membership growth, many Lions see it only as a numbers game seeking membership growth for the sake of membership growth. However, we all need to be ever mindful of the concept that the primary reason that we talk about membership growth in our clubs is that MORE HANDS = MORE SERVICE.

In order to achieve POSITIVE MEMBERSHIP GROWTH for our District, it takes a cumulative effort of all our Clubs. So, I ask each Club to ask this question: What do we want our Club membership to be on June 30, 2026 – and how do we get there? Although, the answer to this question is unique to each Club, there are some common factors to consider. For all Clubs it takes a dual effort of INVITING new members and RETAINING those members that you have.



For clubs with less than 20 members (which is the required number to form a new Lions Club), it would be a meaningful goal to get back to at least 20 members. For Clubs with more than 20 members it would be a meaningful goal to grow by at least 10% of your July 1, 2025 membership number. In either case, it will require both **INVITING** members and RETAINING your existing members. Both things are important.

Lions Clubs are successful in their service projects and fund-raising projects by planning each project and working the plan. We need to treat membership growth in the same way – plan it as a project and then work the plan. The Lions International website has some great ideas and information on helping us to keep moving forward with recognizing that MORE HANDS = MORE SERVICE as we continue to honor our purpose in Lionism as WE SERVE.

In closing, District Governor Lynde Todd is asking that each Lions Club in District 2A3 set a realistic and achievable membership growth goal for June 30, 2026 – and that you email that goal to me at rstalbert2@aol.com no later than September 30, 2025, so that we can know where we are going.

Remember that when each of us took the Oath as a newly inducted Lion that part of that Oath asked the following: WILL YOU ASSIST IN MAINTAINING, BUILDING AND STRENGTHENING THE MEMBERSHIP OF YOUR CLUB – and that each of us said YES!

Free Postage to Mail Eyeglasses to the Texas Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center

The USPS Publication 347 dated October 2015 spells out how to mail glasses for recycling to the Texas Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center in Midland, Texas. The publication states that individuals and non-commercial organizations which serve eligible people (i.e., those who require glasses) qualify. No advertising is allowed.

The box or envelope must not be sealed. The boxes must have the words "FREE MATER FOR THE BLIND OR THE HANDICAPPED" in the upper right corner of the address side of the envelope or parcel where postage is normally placed. The words may be printed, rubber stamped or handwritten. (See the form at the end of this newsletter.)

The mail is not considered a specific class of mail. If you wish to insure the item, you may pay the required insurance fee. Boxes up to the size of a "Banker's" box or the size of the box that comes with 10 reams of paper are accepted.

On behalf of our President Cecilia Luna and the Lions of the Kingsville Noon Lions Club, please accept our warm wishes and appreciation on your publishing the following submission and look forward to including more items as we progress through the year. This is our fourth article and will be entitled "Lions Empowering Literacy Through Community Education Interactions"

Submitted Text for this article:

Hello, Kingsville and Howdy, we are the Kingsville Noon Lions Club, and we meet once a week at 12 noon at the El Dorado Restaurant at the corner of 14th and Santa Gertrudis. For over 100 years, Lions have served our community, the state, the nation, and our neighbors around the world. Our Association consists of 1.4 million people, in over 49,000 clubs, in over 200 countries. The Kingsville Noon Lions is composed of 40 members who each work in various professions and come together as a group to provide some assistance to citizens who might need a helping hand.

One of our common goals among Lions Clubs is to promote literacy and education among our young people. To do this we facilitate health screenings (Health, Vision, Hearing, etc.), donate funds to enhance youth groups (Boys & Girls Clubs, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, FFA, 4H, etc.), and by providing scholarships to graduating seniors or when fiscally possible for those young people attending course work in higher education.

Recently we invited Mrs. Rebecca Perkins who serves as the Instructional Literacy Coordinator for Kingsville Independent School District as our guest speaker on "Empowering Literacy Through Community and Tools". As you can imagine the topic is vast and with many factions, however, today she concentrated her presentation on a simple, but powerful tool, that can change the trajectory of a child's educational journey...a dictionary.

The Dictionary Project's website beautifully captures its value with this statement "A Dictionary teaches a child how to approach a problem and use critical thinking skills by sounding out the word and finding it in the dictionary. This simple task gives them a feeling of self-confidence and satisfaction that they cannot get online."

Mrs. Perkins states that this is more than a quote, it is a reflection of what we, as educators, strive to foster every single day in our classrooms: critical thinking, independence, and confidence. An interesting observation was raised by one of our members as to whether an encyclopedia might

also provide the same benefits, Mrs. Perkins did not disagree, however she related that such in her case if you are growing up on a ranch, if you don't have a complete set of encyclopedias, it might be impossible to find your answer.

As is generally known our educational system has faced significant challenges in the area of literacy and far too many of our students are not reading on grade level which limits their ability to succeed across content areas such as, math, science, social studies, and beyond. These challenges, while complex in nature, are not insurmountable. One of our most powerful ways to reverse this trend is through building strong, sustainable partnerships within our communities. One such initiative is "The Dictionary Project". The Kingsville Lions throughout the last few years have distributed a Dictionary to each 3rd Grader in the local area. Through this initiative, and others like it, we are giving these children the means to explore language on their own. Building those skills to decode unfamiliar words, expand their vocabulary, and strengthen their reading comprehension. As we discussed this issue it was noted that children throughout their first two years of classroom instruction learn how to read, and it is within that third year of classroom instruction that they read to learn.

Everyone was fascinated by Mrs. Perkins' presentation, and it reinforced our understanding and drive to continue with "The Dictionary Project" now and in the years to come.
