Back on Track . . .

Calling all presidents, vice presidents, secretaries, treasurers and zone chairs of clubs in District 14-G:

Under the new International President, Dr. Choi, the leaders in Lionism are being held accountable for the positions of which one holds. There are quarterly reports to be submitted in the goals the District Governor set for the district.

The Global Action Team: Global Leadership (GLT), Global Membership (GMT), and Global Service (GST) Chairs are having to meet and discuss the status of the district and file a report.

Our first report is due September 5, 2019. The report includes information of training for club officers and Currently, the GLT has zone chairs. scheduled trainings in September and October due to clubs be very active in the summer months with fairs, community activities, and vacations. However, the GLT has worked diligently on scheduling in all areas of the district to alleviate the traveling distances and choices of dates that would be convenient for them. Some of these places for training will be charging the Lions District for use of the building.

Until the summer is over, does the GMT get a bigger picture of the membership. The plans are to form a Specialty Club in the district, which is one that specifically represents a group of individuals with a commonality.

In addition, Branch Clubs will be discussed in the Officers Training and in the Zone Chair Training. A team will be brought together to be able to assist clubs wanting help with membership, but the members of the club will also need to help with increasing membership. A proposal for the use of billboards will be discussed at the first cabinet meeting to be in the forefront of October being Membership Month.

Our service reporting is way below what was recorded last year. My goal was to have 42,500 people served the first quarter; however, only 20,463 were served. I am sure this is due to the MYLion not working effectively and we lost our momentum!! Out of our service activities goal of 425, only 100 were recorded. I am sure it is much higher than that, but technology has made this transition difficult for all clubs in the world. 30.5% of our clubs reported activities. More training is definitely going to be needed to assist club officers to be successful in letting the world know just what they do for others and how busy they are within their communities and giving back to many. Our motto, "WE SERVE" is exactly what we do best!

Thank you for allowing me to be the District Governor; together we can do what is expected in our positions for our communities, for our district, and for our world!

"Phishing Protection for Lions" District Administrator

"At Lions Clubs International, we pride ourselves in service to others. Our efforts bring notoriety and respect from communities worldwide. Unfortunately, this notoriety can also attract individuals that misrepresent themselves in order to gain access to personal or financial information. When individuals use the internet or phone to commit this type of fraud it is commonly known as "phishing."

"LCI systems are password protected for your safety, and restrict access to personal information including email addresses and phone numbers. Outside of our LCI systems, Club information is widely known in our local communities through the media or non-LCI websites, and it is quite easy to obtain. This visibility also increases the chance of being contacted by a phisher.

To protect yourself, your club, and the Association from phishing:

 As a general practice when receiving unsolicited emails, do not follow embedded links in emails, especially if there is any mention of updating credit card information, personal data, PIN numbers, or passwords. Delete these emails immediately.

- If you should be redirected to a website, verify that the URL address starts with https://. The single letter S after http indicates that it is a secure site, and is likely legitimate. If the URL is not secure, close your browser immediately.
- If contacted by another club member or the Association Headquarters via email, mobile text message or social media, and there is a request for financial assistance, wire transfer, etc. do not reply to the message. Contact the club member or Association staff separately via email, phone, or through the MyLCI Communications Center to validate that the request is legitimate.
- Always use virus protection software on your PC or MAC.
- Exercise caution when using

public Wi-Fi systems in a coffee house, restaurant, or internet café. These public systems offer no protection from unauthorized fraudulent monitoring.

- Create strong passwords for your email, social media and other online accounts, and update your passwords often.
- Never store passwords, banking information, or credit card numbers in your email."

This information link was sent to me by the Immediate District Staff Administrator PCC Charles "Jim" Keener. We agreed this would be of interest to our Lion members.

As "We Serve," we also need to be cognizant of our social media and protect each other from harm.

- Approved minutes of the fourth 2018-2019 State Council meeting and 2019 state convention meetings held at Kalahari Resorts & Conventions in Pocono Manor, Pa.
- Endorsed Philadelphia Convention & Visitors Bureau's bid to host the 2027 LCI Convention.
- Authorized State Administrator Lion Bob McComas to continue discussions with representatives from Kalahari Resorts & Conventions Poconos, the Pocono Mountain Visitors Bureau and/or Erie Events related to the possibility of Pennsylvania hosting the 2024 USA/Canada Lion Leadership Forum
- Approved 2019-2020 PA Lions All State Band budget.
- Re-appointed Lion Allison Kline (Tamaqua Lions Club, District 14-U) to serve a three-year term as Eastern Representative on the PA Lions All State Band Committee.

Collecting Plastic is Simple For a Service Project



Trex is proud to sponsor local recycling programs in universities and communities throughout the country. If your team can collect more than 500 pounds of plastic refuse in a sixmonth span (about 40,500 plastic bags), we'll donate a high-performance composite bench to your school or community.

It **takes** about 40,500 **plastic bags** to reach the 500-pound mark. On average, a 30-gallon trash **bag** holds about 650 **plastic bags** and weighs about eight pounds, according to a Trex flier outlining how the program works.

Twelve percent of 832 million **pounds** (recovered material) is about 100 million **pounds**, or about 50,000 tons. At roughly 15 **lbs.** per thousand **bags**, we arrive at about 6.7 billion **bags** recovered which is about a 6.4% recovery rate. Try a reusable shopping **bag**!

Get Out There.

- 18. Present an award. Ask for public nominations, select a winner or winners, present the award publicly and publicize the award a lot. Ideas: nurse of the year, teacher of the year, women in business owner of the year, mother or grandmother of the year, etc.
- 19. Say thank you. Honor secretaries, nurses, teachers, scientists, business owners, emergency medical technicians, firemen, policemen or any other group that has a national day. Something as simple as a post card saying thanks for all you do, from your local Lions Club, says a lot. Use this as an opportunity to tell them what your Lions Club does.
- 20. Put information where women will see it on the back of restroom doors in restaurants, in school district newsletters, in doctors' waiting rooms or on table tents at tea rooms.
- 21. Put your eyeglass collection boxes in businesses women visit medical

clinics, gyms, spas, hair salons, grocery stores - and attach a holder for your club brochures.

- 22. Ask businesses to post a public service announcement flyer. Topics could be signs of diabetes, flu prevention or protecting children's eyesight.
- 23. Do something that will gain publicity for your club. Put on a pie baking contest for the public, perhaps with a little twist. The men bake the pies and key women around town serving as judges. You could also collect and donate school supplies or screen the eyesight of children or infants. Whatever it is, be sure to tell the papers about it.
- 24. Publicize every fundraiser and project. If you fund surgery for a child, make sure people know about it. Many parents are so thankful they will work with you to tell the media how much your help meant. And be sure to tell your story with passion.

Stand for causes important to women.

- 25. Help at the humane society. Walking dogs gives you a great opportunity to talk to people.
- 26. Tell the community you are looking for a few good women. Send a news release to the paper, radio and school. Focus on the impact your club has and specific needs for upcoming service projects. Don't

- ask for members, ask for help.
- 27. Get tied in with the volunteer center or other places women go to find an opportunity to volunteer. Update your contact information and upcoming projects regularly.
- 28. Put a Lions logo on your car. Wear your pin every time you go out. People notice
- 29. Carry and use business cards with your Lions information.
- 30. Be ready to tell people what your Lions club does in two sentences, tops.
- 31. Make it easy for women to find you. Websites. Article in the newspaper. A flyer at the library. Sign up forms at the volunteer center. They can't join if they can't find
- 32. Talk to the human resource department of large businesses or government agencies. Employees about to retire are looking for something to fill their time. Make sure those human resource departments have your information readily available.
- 33. Ensure newcomers groups know about your club. Consider making a presentation to them at least once a year.

Lioness Initiative Under the "Join Together Program"



The Lioness Initiative under the Join Together Program makes it possible for Lionesses to honor and acknowledge their proud past while enjoying all the benefits, rights, and privileges associated with Lions club membership.

At the April 2019 LCI International Board of Directors meeting in Miami, the decision was made to encourage all current Lioness clubs to join the Lions family by extending the Join Together program effective until June 2021. In addition, at the June 2018 LCI International Board of Directors meeting in Las Vegas, additional concessions were made to encourage individual Lioness to formally join the Lions family Those concessions included:

- ♦ No minimum number of members required
- ♦ Charter fee for existing clubs will be waived
- The years as a Lioness carry over to Lions membership

Who is Considered Part of a Lioness Club?

Per LCI policy, a Lioness club is a sponsored activity of an active Lions Club. Sponsorships of Lioness Clubs are covered in the Board Policy Manual, Chapter V, Section I and states: The purpose o Lioness clubs shall be:

- A. To provide community service opportunities for individuals under the jurisdiction of the sponsoring Lions club
- B. To cooperate with the club in carrying out its service programs and activities
- C. To unite its members in friendship, fellowship and mutual understanding
- D. Sponsorship: No group or organization shall be recognized as a Lioness Club unless sponsored by a Lions Club. The sponsoring Lions Club is responsible for organization, supervision and guidance of its affiliate Lioness Club.
- E. The Board of Directors shall and hereby does withhold official recognition of any proposed Lioness Club entity other than local affiliate clubs.
- F. Lioness Clubs, as Lions Club affiliate activities, will have the same program of comprehensive general liability insurance available at no cost as is provided to Lions clubs.

What are the Advantages of being Lion?

There are many great benefits of being a member of Lions International. Members get to vote, attend convention and hold leadership positions that give them a greater voice in Lions. Members receive the support of Lions International, which provides service planning resources, professional development opportunities, and other critical benefits like insurance e, legal counsel and advocacy. Plus, they received the LION Magazine and access to great technology like the MyLion mobile app and the lionsclubs.org website and its resource center. And they get the pride of being an official member of the largest service organization in the world.

Can a Lioness Club Keep their Identity as Lioness in their Lions Club naming convention?

Yes. When you are chartering your club as part of the Join Together Program, we request that you use the naming convention of Municipality (city, town, village, prefecture, county, etc.) and then a "distinguishing designation if desired, which could include the word Lioness. Additional club name rues can be found in Chapter X of Board Policy. Clubs that do not utilize this naming convention will require special approval from the Membership Development Committee.

As a Lioness Lions Club You Can:

- Continue to make a real impact in your community
- Vote at the International Convention
- Receive administrative support from Lions Clubs International
- Enjoy new leadership opportunities

How Can a Lioness Club Become a Lions Club?

Lioness Clubs that want to join our global force would need to provide the following information:
*Letter from a sponsoring club verifying the club's years of service
*Use the Join Together Charter Application Worksheet to collect club information that will be submitted online via MyLCI

*Use the Report of Charter Membership Worksheet to collect all member information to be submitted online via MyLCI

*The Membership Worksheet does not need to be submitted to MyLCI, it is just gathering the information *Lioness Conversion Form for each Lioness to ensure recognition of past service


