# Are you Sure You are Area Code 814?

Pennsylvania



This information was sent to the editor by PCC Charles "Jim" Keener and ID Larry Edwards. Public Utility Commission has approved the addition of the 582 area code to the geographic region served by the 814 area code. This is called an area code overlay. The 814/582 area code geography covers the northwestern and central portion of Pennsylvania, serving communities such as Altoona, Bellefonte, Bradford, Brookville, Clarion, DuBois, Erie, Huntingdon, John-

The

stown, Meadville, Oil City, Saint Mary's, State College, and Warren.

Because there will be two area codes serving the same region, it will be necessary to dial or enter the full number, including the area code, for ALL calls—even local call within the same area code. For example, for a local 814 call, instead of entering 555-1212, you will enter 814-555-1212. This begins on April 3, 2021 - the grace period of entering either 7 or 10 digits ends and all calls must include the area code. If only a 7-digit is entered, the call will not go through. On May 1, 2021, new lines of service may be issued numbers with a 582 area code. Your phone number will NOT change.





### "Tax Message From State Administrator"

Lion Leaders Across Pennsylvania dated March 29, 2021

"I held off until now updating you on our request for an extension of the PA state Sales and Use Tax exemption form in hopes I could pass along the new form. As of today, though, we have not received a response from the PA Dept. of Revenue and we are getting a lot of calls from clubs asking about it.

Please feel free to share this with the clubs in your district:

The original request for an extension was submitted Feb. 25, 2021 via fax machine, which was one of the options we were given by the Dept. of Revenue. Today (3/29/2021), to make sure it was received, I emailed the paperwork, the second option we were given, and one I hope will get a quicker response.

Here is the automatic response I received after sending today's email: "Thank you for contacting the Pennsylvania Department of Revenue's Tax Specialty Unit. We will review your request in the order in which it was received. Our current processing time for Sales Tax Exemption Applications is approximately 20-24 weeks."

We were told by the Dept. of Revenue via a letter shortly before the current form's printed expiration date of Feb. 28, 2021 there is a built-in "grace period" for that form. Some clubs have been successful in having vendors honor the current form since Feb. 28 and others have not. We'd like to think the clubs have developed a good relationship with the vendors they use and will, therefore, be extended that courtesy, but the decision is entirely up to the vendor.


We will keep you updated on the situation. In the meantime, please take care and stay well, warm and safe."


