"On December 10, 2021, a violent, long-tracked tornado moved across Western Kentucky producing severe to catastrophic damage in numerous towns: Mayfield, Benton, Dawson Springs, and Bremen. This may be one of the most devastating tornadoes we've ever seen—just two weeks before Christmas! Already, 79 are confirmed dead, including 70 in Kentucky, hitting a 250-mile path of

devastation across south central United

States.

"The PA Lions Disaster Relief Team has been in contact with 43-K District Governor Gary Logan from Hopkinsville, KY. DG Gary has asked Pennsylvania Lions to help. At this time there are items that they are in dire need and are putting out a plea to all 17 districts for help in getting the times listed on the right. 

Guidelines for PDG Art Girio Scholarship Fund



- 1. Scholarship applicant inclusion criteria:
 - *A member of a participating Lions Club in Good Standing
 - *The child/grandchild (natural or adopted) of a Lions members in good standing (living or deceased)
 - *A student, who for 2 years, was a member of a Leo Club in Good Standing
- 2. Scholarship applicant exclusion criteria:
 - *A Student who has previously received this award is not eligible to reapply
- 3. The applicant must submit written proof that he/she has enrolled for their 2nd year onward in a full-time undergraduate or graduate degree program at an accredited, recognized facility for post-secondary or graduate education of the student's choice
- 4. The applicant must submit written proof that he/she has maintained a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 2.5 in the immediate prior full year of full-time attendance at their place of post-secondary or graduate education
- 5. The applicant must submit a short written essay describing how the award would help them fulfill their educational goals. Please submit on a separate sheet of paper (maximum 50 words)
- 6. Application submission:
 - *Applications must be submitted by a participating Lion or Lioness Club in good standing OR
 - *Applications from past Leo members in good standing (member for a minimum of 2 years) can be submitted without sponsorship from a Lion/Lioness, but must be accompanied by a recommendation from the student's former Leo Club Advisor
 - *Applications are accepted annually between January 1st and March 15th
- 7. Upon approval of the scholarship, the successful applicant must submit a copy of a paid tuition receipt for the upcoming Fall Semester

Board of Directors

Taken from Lions Club Handbook

The Board of Directors in a Lions Club is a working Board. The board formulates and executes policies of the club and has financial oversight of club funds. All new business is considered and shaped by the board of directors.

The schedule for Board of Directors meeting also varies among clubs. Some clubs hold Board meetings in conjunction with the regular meeting, either immediately before or immediately after. Other clubs have the Board meeting at a different time and/or place than the business meeting. In some cases, it is only the members of the Board that attend the meetings, and in other cases, most of the members of the club attend. Please bear in mind, though, that Board of Directors meetings are open to all Lions. Lions may speak upon recognition by the presiding officer, but it is only members of the board who may make or second motions and vote. (Try ZOOM Meetings)

Standing Committees

The standing committees of the club are appointed by the president with the exception of the membership Chairperson, who is elected. The committees listed below are those designated by LCI. The president, however, is authorized to appoint special committees with the approval of the Board of Directors. All committees shall consist of a chairperson and as many members shall be considered necessary by the president.


Service support activities: 4 broad categories

- Holding meetings to strengthen your club, educate and train members, or plan other service activities.
- Fulfilling administrative tasks, such as running errands, maintaining club records, or reporting.
- Attending Lions events such as conventions and forums.
- Engaging in fellowship and fun, together with other Lions.

These activities contribute to Lions' positive impact in various ways, including attracting new members to the clubs, helping clubs retain members by providing a positive experience, preparing Lions to serve, or directly benefitting the people we serve.

What is Service?

When we share our stories and report our impact, we unify our organization, inspire our communities and capture the attention of a global audience. Helping you with: **Defining** what service means to Lions and Leos; **Explaining** the various ways Lions and Leos measure their impact; and **Providing** direction on how to calculate the number of people served.



Number of Activities: Each activity reported by a club, district or multiple district is counted as one activity.

Number of People Served: These are the direct beneficiaries of Lions service. Sometimes the number of people served can be counted precisely, and sometimes it must be estimated.

Number of Volunteers: The number of people who participate in the planning or implementation of a service project. As Lions often invite friends to join their service activities, the number of volunteers can include both Lions and ono-Lions.

<u>Number of Volunteer Hours:</u> The number of hours spent planning and implementing a service project.

<u>Funds Raised:</u> The amount of money collected to fund service activities or charitable donations. This can't be from Lions making personal contributions, or funds raised from ono-Lions during a fundraising event.

<u>Funds Donated:</u> The amount of charitable funds given to an individual or organization. Funds donated to LCIF are tracked by the foundation and need not be reported as a service activity, but if an event was held to raise those funds, that event cam be reported as a fundraising activity.



Attention MMR Reporters

Did you ever file a Monthly Membership Report in a month that reflected a change "last month," and then have someone ask you -- "where is your report for this month?" An example of this would be listing new Lion Ida K. Kneau as a new member in November 2021 on a MM Report filed on December 1, 2021.

OK, Wise Guy! – you say – What is this "secret"??? The answer is that for MMRs to be credited for a certain month, they MUST reflect action IN THAT MONTH!! A November 2021 new Lion filed in December 2021 counts as a late November 2021 MMR - NOT as a December MMR!! This exact situation happened in December 2021 with two of our 14-G Lions Clubs.

Even if the "report" is changing "PO Box" to "Post Office Box" -- If it is sent in December, it counts as a December MM Report!! Strange, but True!!! The bottom line, MM Reporters, is that if you report a new Lion, drop, or death from LAST month during this month, you still need to submit a "no change this month", or list a specific actual change for this month's MMR to be "counted"!!! Strange, BUT True!!!

By the way, Lion Ida K. Kneau's full name is Ida Knot Kneau!!! Putting that full name in a December MMR counts as a December MMR, also!!!

A **HUGE** thanks to the secretaries, presidents or club administrators entering their Monthly Membership Reports! There are always 20 or less that I need to send reminders; however, **IF** they would only do this on the 1st of every month it would be done and not have to be sent an email or receive a phone call.
