

Thanks to a grant of \$99,600 from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF), Lions in Utah, and Eye Care 4 Kids, a non-profit in Utah focused on providing vision care, Khloe now sees the world with her pink eyeglasses. "I cannot even begin to express how grateful we





KidSight USA: Vision Screening Certification

We welcome Lion Dawn Wright, (Wells-Jackson Lions Club, Secretary) for volunteering to assist clubs with creating new service projects and reporting the clubs activities monthly in MyLCI.

Are you and your club members interested in providing Vision Screening for children in your area? With financial support from PALSF the NTCCLC was able to purchase two Spot Vision Screeners to help Lions, school nurses, and school personnel to identify any vision issues with through the KidSight Program offered by Lions Clubs International.

To use the equipment, the screeners need to be certified through the KidSight Program. It is FREE!!!!!

Free Certification Vision Screener Certification is FREE

Lions KidSight USA strongly encourages Lions to become certified vision screeners so they obtain a comprehensive understanding of the screening process and then begin organizing events at Schools, Daycare Centers and Preschools. Occasionally, there is a Screening Training Seminar that takes place in your area or State. Attending a Training Seminar is a great way to learn a lot in a short period of time.

Mt. Carmel Lions Club Project



Just AWESOME! Thanks to Lion Kevin Jones, **Mt. Carmel Lions Club**, for sending the following information to be placed in the <u>Lions</u> *Tale Newsletter*.

What was once called, The Halfway Dam, now is owned and operated by the Mt. Carmel Lions Club. In 2009, the Mt. Carmel Borough Council awarded per-

mission for the Lions Club to maintain the Charles Wightman Dam while focusing on youth and recreation.

Charles Wightman was born in Connersville in 1895, one of eleven children. His father (also Charles) worked for the Mount Carmel Water Company and moved the family to the dam around 1900 where he was the caretaker. The last four children were born at this site in a large home located on the site of the present parking lot. The senior Mr. Wightman died in 1948 at the age of 83.

Filling "Jared Boxes"

"Jared McMullen was diagnosed with an incurable brainstem tumor in 1999. He carried a backpack full of toys and games to all appointments and questioned why the other children didn't bring toys to their exam rooms. Jared shared his toys and invited the other children to join him in a game of UNO. At just 5 years old, he demonstrated faith, wisdom and compassion for others." (thejaredbox.org)

In 1999, this little boy, was diagnosed of an incurable brain stem cancer. He would take a backpack full of toys and the game UNO to all of his appointments. Once settled in, Jared would open his backpack of toys and share with other children, and at times challenging them at the game of UNO. If they cheated at the game, he threatened them they had to 'clean the toilets!!' Charles, or Whitey as he was better known, began working at the age of 12 picking slate in the breaker for the Sayre Colliery. He later worked as

a fireman for the Reading Railroad, hoisting engineer and miner at the Locust Gap Colliery, and as custodian for the Union National Bank and Presbyterian Church. He married the former Mae Brocious in 1915. The couple had four children.

Charles Wightman was best known in the Mount Carmel Area as an avid fisherman. In the early 1950's he began his own business selling fishworms from his basement at Sixth and Locust Streets and later at 215 South Walnut Street. This enabled him to spread his fishing knowledge and stories far and wide through his customers. He died in 1974 at the age of 78.

"Jared's classmates at Our Lady of Victory School (State College, PA) sought to honor his memory and created boxes filled with toys for the patients at Geisinger Janet Weis Children's Hospital. What was intended as a one-time project has grown into a nonprofit that reaches into the hearts of children and their families across 50 states." (thejaredbox.org)

In May, Jim Tennis of Millville approached a member of the Millville Lions


