

Dear Club Secretary:

Please forward your list of Delegates and Alternates for the upcoming District 14-G Convention to be held on Saturday, April 2, 2022, at the **Genetti Hotel, SureStay Collection by Best Western, 200 W. 4th Street, Williamsport, PA 17701.** 

As per the Lions Clubs International Constitution, each chartered Lions club in good standing (all dues paid in full to Lions Clubs International, State Dues, and District Dues) shall be entitled to one (1) Delegate and one (1) Alternate for every ten (10) members or major fraction thereof (major fraction is 5 or more). Should your club have a PDG as a member, they will receive their PDG Delegate Card directly from the Certifications Committee. *Please note all delegates and alternates must be a member of Lions for one year and one day in order to qualify.* 

**Example:** Your club has 20 members; your club is entitled to two (2) Delegates/Alternates. Your club has 44 members; your club is entitled to four (4) Delegates/Alternates. Your club has 37 members and a PDG; your club is entitled to four (4) Delegates/Alternates and one (1) PDG Delegate.

The list of Delegates/Alternates need to be emailed (or typed copy via USPS) no later than March 20, 2022, so the Registration Committee can process the credential in time for the District Convention. Credentials will be available for pick up the day of the convention at the Certification Table, Room,


> Townsend, who, in 2019 went home to be with the Lord. "Kindness Mattered to the Man with the Bow Tie." (LION magazine article)

## Northeast PA Lions Service Foundation

"The Northeast Pennsylvania Lions Service Foundation (NEPALSF), formerly known as Northeast Pennsylvania Lions Eye Bank, was created with the primary goal of eliminating corneal blindness. The Foundation has a long history of working to enact change, dating back to when the first Lions Clubs began supporting Pennsylvania communities in 1957. Our goal is to end blindness not just in the 37 counties we serve today, but also nationally and globally. It's an ambitious goal, but with technological and scientific advancements combined with education and access, it's an achievable one."

MISSION "To end eyesight and hearing impairment in our lifetime through education, grants, and partnerships within our communities."

<u>VISION</u> "Our vision is to create a world where preventative blindness no longer exists, communities actively and effectively support the impaired in our society, and all hearing and visually-impaired individuals have access to medical professionals and technology that can help them."


## On the Blue Below for Grant Applications

<u>Patient care</u>. The Northeast Pennsylvania Lions Service Foundation helps to pay for treatment and equipment for individuals with vision or hearing needs. Funded treatment and equipment include cataract surgery, cornea transplants, vision therapy, special glasses/contacts, speech therapy for children with hearing loss, hearing aids, baby monitors for parents who are deaf, and talking computer software, among others. All requests must include a signed HIPAA release form witnessed by the physician's office.

**Equipment**. The Foundation helps to fund the purchase of medical equipment to treat or prevent hearing or vision impairment or loss. Recently, the Foundation provided partial funding for the purchase of a vision screener for children under 5 years of age and a digital imaging camera to diagnose retinopathy in premature infants.

<u>Professional development</u>. The Foundation provides financial assistance to medical professionals, such as occupational and rehabilitation therapists, so they can obtain their visual impairment certification to assist individuals who are visually or hearing impaired. Recipients are expected to serve communities in Central and/or Eastern Pennsylvania Lions districts for a minimum of two years.

<u>Community projects</u>. Community projects must benefit the general public living in Central and/or Eastern Pennsylvania Lions districts. Projects might include vision and hearing loss prevention and rehabilitation; facilities and equipment that improve the vision and hearing welfare of the general public; and public relations campaigns that increase public awareness of the importance of vision and hearing care and available treatment, including tissue and organ donations. The Foundation recently funded enhancements to a braille trail at a Lions park for the visually impaired.

## **Guidelines for PDG Art Girio Scholarship Fund**



- 1. Scholarship applicant inclusion criteria:
  - \*A member of a participating Lions Club in Good Standing
  - \*The child/grandchild (natural or adopted) of a Lions members in good standing (living or deceased)
  - \*A student, who for 2 years, was a member of a Leo Club in Good Standing
- 2. Scholarship applicant exclusion criteria:
  - \*A Student who has previously received this award is not eligible to reapply
- 3. The applicant must submit written proof that he/she has enrolled for their 2nd year onward in a full-time undergraduate or graduate degree program at an accredited, recognized facility for post-secondary or graduate education of the student's choice
- 4. The applicant must submit written proof that he/she has maintained a minimum grade point average (GPA) of 2.5 in the immediate prior full year of full-time attendance at their place of post-secondary or graduate education
- 5. The applicant must submit a short written essay describing how the award would help them fulfill their educational goals. Please submit on a separate sheet of paper (maximum 50 words)
- 6. Application submission:
  - \*Applications must be submitted by a participating Lion or Lioness Club in good standing OR
  - \*Applications from past Leo members in good standing (member for a minimum of 2 years) can be submitted without sponsorship from a Lion/Lioness, but must be accompanied by a recommendation from the student's former Leo Club Advisor
  - \*Applications are accepted annually between January 1st and March 15th
- 7. Upon approval of the scholarship, the successful applicant must submit a copy of a paid tuition receipt for the upcoming Fall Semester







### **Preventing Scams**

### **Popular Scams**

**Phone Scams:** Promise winnings or claim a family member is in trouble.

Door to Door Scams: Ask to seal driveway, or fix roof, or claim they are with the power or water company.

**Email Scams:** Promise winnings or prizes, usually provide a link to click on.



How much do I have to pay to get my prize?

Ask the "family member" basic questions about themselves that only they would know the answer to. Do you have a business card? May I see you company ID?

### **Prevent Scams**

Screen calls. Let numbers you don't recognize go to voicemail. Scammers rarely leave a message. Ask Questions about the prize or ask basic questions abo the family member.

Ask to see a business card. Look to see what vehicle they are driving. Ask for company ID. Call your power or water company to see if they are legitimate.

Never open emails if you do not recognize the sender. Never click on links with-in the emails.




You are asked to send money via gift card or wire transfer.

### **Club Officers and Board of Directors**

Taken from Lions Club Handbook

Officers of a Lions Club agree to serve their club and fellow members as well as those in need in their communities. The roles and responsibilities for each office are defined in the Standard Club Constitution and By-Laws as well as their responsibilities as members of the Board of Directors. Because all of the officers are members of the Board of Directors, their duties with regard to the Board of Directors are the same. This chapter will cover information for and duties of club officers in general as well as the specific chapters will discuss the roles and responsibilities of individual officers.





- ♦ A CLUB consists of a minimum of 20 Lions
- ♦ A ZONE consists of 4 8 clubs
- ♦ A \*REGION consists of 10-14 clubs
- ♦ A **DISTRICT** is comprised of at least 35 clubs with 1250 active members
- Several districts in a given geographical area comprise a Multiple District
- Each Lions Club is located in one of seven
   Constitutional Areas which is represented by at least one International Director
- \*Optional
