





Greetings, Fellow Lions!

While splitting wood the other day, our old log splitter suddenly coughed and died. A quick diagnostic check soon revealed the problem: no spark. Given the sudden failure, it was likely that the condenser had shorted out. So, I grabbed my tools, and began taking things apart. Ten minutes later, things were back together and we were splitting wood again. What does a log splitter have to do with Lions? Well, directly, not much. The important concept is that I fixed everything in ten minutes. How? By using the proper tools for the job.

Have you considered becoming a Lion leader at the District level? On July 1, 2022, a resolution was passed at the International Convention which prohibits District Governors from serving more than one term. This means leadership, always important to our association, is now critical. And yet, we have district positions around the country that remain unfilled. This is not a good trend.

My first District 14-G service began in 2009, and I have served in several posts during the ensuing years. As I got to know my fellow Lions, and look around today, I can name at least ten potential candidates for District positions, including Governor. Over the years, some of us (and you know who you are) have even talked about it at length. During these talks, two objections always pop up: "I don't have the time," or "I don't know how."

The time element is an individual issue between Lions and their families. Training, however, is another matter entirely. Did you know there is excellent online training for Club Officers? Did you know that Lions International and MD-14 provide multiple in-person training sessions for Lion Leaders and District Governors? Did you know that a District Governor can call on Past District Governors, and other MD-14 officials for advice? No one in leadership is alone. Lions International ensures you will always have support, outstanding training, and the proper tools to do the work.

MD-14 will be holding its Regional Lions Leadership Institute training March 10-March 12, 2023 in Harrisburg. You must apply, through DG Clay, to attend. The instructors are outstanding, and include several of Pennsylvania's Past International Directors. After attending last spring, I heartily recommend it. You will learn bunches, and have a lot of fun, too. Please consider going; your District and Multiple District need you for our future.



Adopt A Highway

In 1984 the idea for the Adopt A Highway program was born when James Evans, an engineer for the Texas Department of Transportation, witnessed litter blowing out of the back of a pickup truck he was following in Tyler Texas. Concerned about the increasing cost to the government of keeping roadways clean, Evans began asking community groups to volunteer to pick up trash along designated sections of local state highways. Evans got few takers for his idea. In 1985, Billy Black, the Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Transportation took up the cause and organized the first official Adopt A Highway program. In April of 1990, The Pennsylvania Department Transportation (PennDOT) began Adopt A Highway (AAH) program. Since 1990, volunteers have been beautifying roadsides two miles at a time.



Board of Directors Meetings

From the Lions Club Handbook - USA-Canada LIONS Leadership Forum

The presence of a majority of the directors at any meeting of the Board of Directors constitutes a quorum for that meeting. The act of a majority of the directors at any meeting of the board is to be taken as the act of the entire board.

The club president is the presiding officer of the board with the vice presidents, in order of their rank, taking the place of the president as necessary. The secretary of the club also serves as the secretary of the board. Typically the minutes of the boards are shared with club members in a timely manner following the board meetings. This can be orally at the following club meeting, written, or distributed electronically.

LCI recommends that Board of Directors meetings be held at least once a month. The time and place are set by the board. In some clubs, board meetings are held in conjunction with a club meeting either before or after. In other clubs, board meetings are held at a time separate from the club meeting. In any case, board meetings are open meetings and should be announced to the club as a whole so that any member can attend. When attending a board meeting, Lions who are not on the board may ask to be recognized to speak to an issue but may not make or vote on motions.

Tips for a Successful Year

Although the responsibilities of board members are defined by the Constitution and By-Laws, it is important for Boards of Directors to meet at the beginning of each Lions year (or before with the permission of the sitting presidents) to discuss how they are going to share responsibilities among the members. Of course, the incoming president should preside over this meeting and it would be expected that in most cases the board would defer to his/her suggestions.

The president may ask for suggestions for the administrative and activity committees that he/she is responsible to assign.

In large clubs in particular, the vice presidents may be asked to oversee some or all of the administrative and activity committees.

Committee chairpersons with upcoming and just completed activities should be invited to board meetings to address plans, concerns, challenges, and successes.

If it has not already been done, the board should evaluate the fund raisers and service activities of the previous year to see if they met their goals and continue to have the support of the community. Are the service activities still needed?

The boar should consider suggesting the club participate in the Club Excellence Process if it has not been done in the previous five years. If it has been done, informal evaluation of ember satisfaction and community needs assessment should be considered.

Service, fundraising and membership goals for the upcoming year should be outlined. Remember, however, it is important for club members to have input in developing these goals. They are the Lions who will be working to achieve them. One way of doing this is to announce a special board meeting called for the purpose of goal setting at a time and a place convenient for all Lions to have input.

Has your club created long term goals, 5 years and 10 years, with plans to support them? Having goals that everyone supports and works toward helps a club grow and prosper.

It is important for the board to work as a team supporting the club and working for excellence in everything the club does. The composition of a well-structured team is such that even though not everyone is an expert in all of the team's responsibilities, the team as a whole has an expert on each of its responsibilities.
