



Speaking of Leadership

Now that you have the position, it is time to grasp the title's information for yourself. Again, we do not want 'to do what we've always done,' and continue to make errors in our CBL. There are e-books for almost every position in lionsclubs.org.

Critical Leadership Positions



The critical leadership positions are the President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Membership Chairperson. The club's officers and various event and committee chairs usually comprise the Board of Directors, which establishes policy and provides overall direction for all club activities.

Responsibility of Club Officers

Club officers set and monitor club goals. Runs, appoints, and delegates. Appoints committee chairs.

Objectives of Club Officers

"Learning how to manage a group's finances, which also helps them learn how to manage their own finances. Developing team work skills by working together to accomplish club goals. Improving communication skills by writing, speaking, etc. Increasing self-esteem and confidence."

Roles and Responsibilities

of Lions Club Presidents

"He/she shall be the chief executive officer of the club; preside at all meetings of the board of directors and the club; issue the call for regular meetings and special meetings of the board of directors and the club; appoint the standing and special committees of this club and cooperate with chairpersons."

With a new Lions year of 2023-2024, there will be some incoming officers that have not held a leadership position previously. PLEASE take these positions seriously, not just to say you are a president, secretary, treasurer, etc. Perform it to the best of your ability. Many times, the incoming does the same as the previous leader, but read the CB&L to learn how it is done correctly. Surely, there is a LCI booklet out on *Your Club, Your Way*, BUT there are guidelines International expects to be followed as Lions.

What Makes a Good Leader?

"Have a good working knowledge of the club rules and the duties of all office bearers and sub-committees. Manage (chair) committee and/or executive meetings. Manage (chair) the annual general meeting. Represent the club at local, regional, and state level."

Why Be a Club Officer?

"Becoming a club officer develops your communication skills, problem-solving, and gives you the discipline to move forward regardless of hardship. By no coincidence, this is what Lions Clubs International is looking for when recruiting new members."

6 Critical Practices for Leading a Team

Lions Clubs of 14G:

Now is when you are all working on your budgets for the Lions year 2023 – 2024 - I hope you will include a donation to the North East Pennsylvania Lions Service Foundation (NEPLSF). Those of you that are not familiar with the foundation, it originally was the North East Eye Bank.

The foundation is made up of 9 districts, C-D-G-H-K-L-T-U-W, from Eastern Pennsylvania to the Northeast of Pennsylvania. Our District G and District L are as far west as we serve.

This year the NEPLSF gave out \$445,677.00 in grants, which \$106,737.40 of that money came to clubs in our District, that means our District received 24% of the grants given out.

Where NEPLSF gets its funds from is the club donations in the 9 districts we serve, while carefully investing those funds. To date, our District has donated \$2700.00 which is 19% of the total funds donated by clubs from the 9 districts. I would say that is a very good return on our investments.

Please consider a donation as our clubs can do so much more with grants than from doing a project through fund-raising projects alone. If you would like to know more about the foundation, one of our representatives for our District 14-G would be more than happy to attend one of your club meetings to provide more information and answer your valuable questions.


