### **First Vice District Governor Kathy**



In meetings, listen carefully and consider all opinions; seek the advice of other board members. Most importantly, ask questions. The past and present officers, at all levels, of the district are more than willing to




# Club Secretaries Steps to Printing Membership Cards

- 9) Load printer with card stock paper
- 10) Click on "Print Cards" at the bottom right


# What Is A Member Journey?

"A member journey is your member's experience with your organization. It covers every interaction from the first touchpoint to membership renewal."





Welcome new members, involve them in discussions, have them complete a survey to identify their strengths or interests



Mentor by keeping in touch verbally, invite to pick them up to take to meetings, go for coffee afterwards

Track member retention every 3 months which helps to retain their membership



- Initial Interaction/ Consideration: Members finding, evaluating and joining our organization
- Onboarding: Integrating and introducing a new member into our organization
- Engagement; The first 90 days for new members, and ongoing relationships with existing members
- Help/Troubleshooting:
   Members hitting roadblocks and needing help





BE IT RESOLVED that effective July 1, 2023, By-Laws Article VI, Section 1 will read as follows:

Section 1: Multiple District Revenue - To provide revenue to defray the administrative expenses of the Multiple District and of each Sub-District hereof and a Multiple Convention Fund, annual per capita dues of \$16.00 is hereby levied upon each member of each club in the Multiple District. The dues are waived for Lions Club student members as defined by Lions Clubs International and for LEO to Lion members through age thirty-five.

### **BALLOT QUESTION #2**

THE RESOLUTION UPDATES LANGUAGE FROM 51% OF THE TOTAL NUMBER OF MEMBERS OF THE CLUBS TO SIMPLE MAJORITY.

BE IT RESOLVED that effective May 211, 2023, By-Laws Article IX, Section 1 (a)(b) AMENDING PROCEDURE will read as follows:

The By-laws may be amended only at the multiple district convention by amendment reported by the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws at such annual meeting and adopted by the affirmative vote of the majority of the certified delegates voting at such meeting. No amendment shall be reported to a convention for vote unless it shall first secure approval in one of the following two methods:

Section 1(a): Have been approved by the Council of Governors
Section 1(b): Have been approved by resolution of convention of a sub-district
representing no less than the majority of the total number of members for the clubs
of the sub-districts as of July 1 of the fiscal year in which the amendment is submitted
to the Council of Governors for ballot placement.
