For seasoned and new Lions, there is an alphabet soup of acronyms on page 29 of this newsletter. The February <u>Lions</u>



at my desk, writing this month's column, l've been inexplicably drawn to the Macintosh which

Cindy and I use. By today's standards, it's an antique--built in 2013-still supported by most software suppliers. Sooner or later, I suppose, it will need to be replaced from either lack of support, or equipment failure.

This fact set me thinking about progress and all the changes I've experienced since graduating


from Penn State. (That was 1988, by the way). We learned basic programming using FORTRAN, on a terminal connected to mainframes occupying an entire building. There was also COBOL, PASCAL, and others. The first affordable PCs appeared my senior year, based upon IBM architecture. Windows and Bill Gates were unknowns. There were staff and students at University Park using punch cards; I still have one of them, somewhere, in my desk. Now, many of these are long gone; many don't even know they even existed. Those companies failing to adapt (think Digital Equipment) disappeared, along with their technology.

Lionism is no different. I've just finished a Lions International webinar about the AI tools they are developing. All I can say is wow! It's about to get much easier to develop presentations, compile data, and the like. However, there is one problem: we, as Lions, must be willing to use it.

I've written about this before. Lions are often fearful or close-minded about change. I get it...in some ways, I feel like the last of the "old school" governors. Our year (2024-2025) is on the threshold of what I suspect will be some fantastic improvements upon how Lionism works. Ultimately, I think it will make our organization better, and more relevant to the young people we so desperately need. But, like all technology, it requires individuals to operate and succeed.

Our challenge, fellow Lions, is to successfully integrate new technology into oldfashioned Lionism. How? By seeing it for what it is: a tool that can help us do our job better and serve more people in our communities. This doesn't mean giving up the old way of doing things. Keep on inviting prospective members. Keep on building networks in your community. Keep on being visible...keep on serving. But, know that wonderful things to help us better serve our communities, and our clubs, are just around the corner.

The future is upon us...I can't wait. Can you?

Clubs Interested in Forming a Foundation..

A Lions Foundation formed in accordance with 501 (c)(3) would be eligible to obtain a 1023 exemption number from the Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") which would qualify a contributor's donation as tax deductible to the extent allowed by law. Other benefits available to a 501(c)(3) organization include exemption from property and sales taxes in most states.

To form a Lions Foundation, the by-laws and policies of LCI provide that the applying Club or District must request authorization from LCI. Also, the applying Lions Foundation must satisfy criteria established by the International Board of Directors (see Exhibit A). A Lions Club or District can place an order with CSC in forming a Lions 501(c)(3) Foundation that satisfies the criteria established by the International Board of Directors. If your club or district decides to use CSC services and establish a foundation, please submit the following documents directly to CSC and CSC will coordinate review and authorization by the LCI Legal Division and assist with the necessary filings.

- A completed application for use of the Lions name and/or emblem (see Exhibit B).
 A copy of the minutes of resolution of the club or district indicating the support of the Lions Club or District in the formation of the Lions Foundation (see Exhibit C).
- 3. A copy of the proposed Articles of Incorporation and Constitution and By-laws for the Lions Foundation (see Exhibits D and E). You have the option to handle all necessary filings to establish a Lions Foundation on your own. If you choose to do so, please submit the required documents to the LCI Legal Division for review and authorization.




