I sincerely wish that 1698 of you could see this by an electronic document method. However, the truth is that is not possible: WHY?

Well ("that's a Deep Subject" as my father, who died 14 years ago today, used to say) --- as some Scouting friends of Keener said in the last century – "He will always tell you the truth, or change the subject !!" In 2005, when I was diagnosed with congestive heart failure and asked and was answered by my Cardiologist's Physician Assistant thusly "Q - How sick am I??? A -"If you would have not gotten help you would have been dead in 6 weeks!!"

I said a quiet prayer and committed myself to helping others in any way I could. I had no idea that I would be selected to be the 14-G District Governor that would become the MD-14 Council Chair in 2013-2014. Since July 2017, I have served in the task of 14-G Staff District Administrator. I have tried to help all our 14-G Lions Clubs be the best they can be. We have less than 2 months to make that happen. The answer to the "WHY" above is at the end of this message.

As of May 5, we have had some tremendous improvement in many areas of submitting timely Monthly Membership Reports (MMRs). A Tip O' The Scouter's Campaign Hat to Williamsport LC Pres. Travis Liebig; Big Pond LC Secretary Robert Karlewicz; and Mt. Carmel LC Secretary Kerri Kondisko. As key leaders of three of our most delinquent LCs in MM reporting, they are now League Leaders! Way to Go!!!! These clubs (in reporting order) have submitted May MMRs: "Tagging the MMR home plate" at May 1, 2019, 5:48 a.m. CT (our LCI office is in Oak Brook, IL) (all Lions Clubs) Williamsport. Following "in time order until to date:" Ferguson Township; Sugar Valley: Harris Township; Mt. Carmel; Lycoming Creek; Rauchtown-Nippenose Valley; Big Pond; Northumberland; Berwick (that is our Top 10 - All 10 in by 8:00 p.m. CT on May 1, 2019) and some claim it can't be done !!!

The rest of our MMR Heroes to date: Wells Jackson; Howard; Towanda; Sylvania; Mill Hall Area; Bellefonte; Turbotville & Area; Mans-

field; Bloomsburg Area; Jersey Shore; Centre Hall; Patton Township; Millville; Northern Tioga County Centennial; and Pleasant Gap & Area. The New Bald Eagle Valley Lions Club gets a "two month pass" on submitting their MMR.

After repeated encouragement for positive action, these five clubs remain delinquent from submitting MMR's for April 2019: Canton; Coudersport; Kulpmont Centennial; South Creek; & Williamsport-Newberry. Concerned members of those five LC's who desire information about their club being on this list are encouraged to call me using the contact information on page 45 of the 2018-19 14-G Directory!!

Some of the five may be confused by the new "Universal Log-in System." I have been able to get Lions unconfused, in 5 minutes or less, if they have a working computer; textable cell phone; their membership number; date of birth; and a positive attitude - the last being the most essential!!!

Some clubs have submitted their "PU-101" on line. That is the "upcoming year club office report." Four offices are required on the report and last year ALL of our 14-G Clubs had these four officers: President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Membership Chair. We (14-G) were the only district in MD-14 (PA) to not have a page on the "missing club officers report." I repeat -- THE ONLY District to NOT have a 2018-2019 page listing any of those officers missing for any of our 14-G clubs. To date for 2019-2020, there are 4083 pages in the "All LCI Missing Officer Report," so don't try to print them all!!!! We are currently 5 pages in the "mid 300's" pages.

To date these 14-G PU 101 reporting clubs (many thanks), obviously did not get the message (no thanks!) and have not submitted Membership Chairs for 2019-2020: Picture Rocks & Benton. Coudersport & Area has not reported a president for 2019-2020 along with their 2019-2020 membership chair!!

Why is reporting 2019-2020 club officers ON TIME important?? The incoming District Governor can easily assemble the 14-G directory if all the needed information is available on MyLCI.

Now -WHY can't all 1698 14-G see this "digital Lions Tale"?? Some Great 14-G Lions may not own a computer - given the age and sophistication of some of our "great, seasoned" Lions, computer ownership is not to be expected. Computers are just not part of their life styles. That is fine, and we courage Lions Clubs to print copies for those great Lions. With no email to receive this, no matter how it is sent digitally, they will not be able to see it.

Some Lions may not have access to a digital connection. I know of one great 14-G Lion President that has to use his town's library because he simply does not "have a connection to the internet"!!

The same "computer reading ability" goes for the 2019 April and May LION Magazines!!! No computer – no read – it is as simple as that. If you are not aware, our MD-14 (PA) Lions Pride of PA magazine will be going digital come July 1, 2019. That is in less than 2 months!!!!

Shockingly, we have some clubs that have done such a poor job of submitting communicative data to MyLCI that in the case of one club only 6 of 31 dues paying Lions have an email listed with MyLCI. The 25 without email include one (and, granted, this Lion may not be "internet equipped") who is listed as both the current president and first vice president. When the 2019-2020 directory is being compiled, how can this club president be properly contacted and listed?? This club is one of our 5 MMR delinquent clubs and has been repeatedly counseled by multiple 14 -G leaders for the past decade!!! Incidentally, most Lions in this club do not even have phone numbers, or other contact data, in MyLCI - including this current president!!!!

I'll leave you with this thought - I mentioned my survival with CHF - not for sympathy but to share with you that of our 25 MMR on time clubs, one is served by a Lion who has survived ALS for over 2 years and another who is undergoing Leukemia treatment. What is your excuse for not submitting your MMR and MyLCI data on time???
