

#### Second Vice District Governor Steve Myers

Dear Lions and LEOs:

As you know, our Lions motto is "We Serve," whether in our local community, or throughout the world via LCIF. Sometimes, we face the question: whom shall we serve? I know some of our clubs struggle with this; there are several good "idea sheets" for service projects available. However, I would suggest to all of us, myself included, that we sometimes overthink the problem. Often the need is right in front of us, in plain sight. In these cases, we simply need to see, and act. Read on to learn the true story of one such instance.

In 1948, Watsontown's Police Chief, Carl Reed, watched a little girl walk without a coat to school through the cold and snow of winter. Later, after Christmas had come and gone, he watched as some children chatted happily about their Christmas presents, while the less fortunate ones had nothing but sadness and resignation in their eyes. He knew these families; many had suffered losses during the recent war, and were simply struggling just to survive. This bothered him; he simply couldn't stand to see the children hurting.

In 1949, the Chief decided to hold a used toy drive. Working with the local fire police, the Lions Club, and other organizations, the word went out. As the toys rolled in, local factories, merchants, and citizens donated time and material to ensure that each and every toy was refurbished and repaired. By Christmas, enough toys were ready for Santa to deliver.

In December, 1949, he wrote a letter to the <u>Sunbury Daily Item</u>, saying: "...November 15 to December 15, over 500 toys were collected, repaired, and painted. These toys ran from miniature trains to large sleds and bicycles...56 families were able to enjoy a real Christmas. This meant that 185 children shared the 500 or more toys that were delivered the night before Christmas. It is my hope that one of the service clubs or organizations in Watsontown will take the program from here, and make each year a better and larger, happy Christmas for the children of Watsontown and vicinity. Sincerely, Carl L. Reed"

Today, 73 years later, the Chief Reed Christmas Fund is still going strong, administered by the Watsontown Police Department, and supported by many community organizations including the Watsontown Lions.

By now, I'm sure some of you are wondering why I've devoted an entire column to the actions of a small-town police chief. Well, you see, *Lion* Carl L. Reed went on to serve as District Governor of 14-G in the 1960s. PDG Reed retired on April 17, 1972 after 27 years, and passed away on October 9, 1972. He saw a need, and acted without hesitation. What an endearing legacy; may we all have the compassion to serve as well as him.

## Alpha or Omega?

### January 13th

Melvin Jones was born on January 13, 1879, at Fort Thomas, Arizona, a remote U.S. Army cavalry post where his father was a scout for the Army. At age 7, Jones' family moved east and settled in Illinois. Gifted with a fine tenor voice, he considered making his career in music.

Lions International was founded by Melvin Jones in 1917 as a result of his dream to form a local business club for the betterment of the community and the world at large. A favorite saying of his was "You can't get very far until you start doing something for someone else." That passion was his way of life."

and club administrators taking the time to provide club members sheets of paper to record their activities and hours of volunteering; collecting the papers or passing around a clipboard to record hours; and then completing the tallies to put into MyLion, it is greatly appreciated.

The time you volunteer to report and record for your club counts. Presidents, secretaries, treasurers, and membership chairs should be including those hours as well.

Club secretaries have been encouraged to report the MMR at the first of the month. If there are any changes in the membership, the system will automatically update.

December is a VERY IMPORTANT month for Membership!!! If there are members not paying their dues, they need to be dropped for non-payment of dues, or your club will be charged for that member for the next 6 months.

Every member is

responsible for paying their own dues. It averages less than \$6 per month. Surely, a cup of coffee or a hamburger from McDonald's can be given up once a month. Our district still has issues with some clubs. This needs to stop. It is an HONOR to be a Lion. Together We Can Make a Difference! Being a Lion means . . .

## **Service Hours: Make a Difference**

Searching for answers to the dilemma of the importance of clubs reporting service hours, even if it is just a meeting; however, meetings are not counted as a service to others. With the responsibility falling on the shoulders of club secretaries, LCI realizes there is much to do as a club secretary. The old saying of, 'secretaries are the backbone of any organization,' is only good if the secretaries are performing the roles and responsibilities of the secretaries description. LCI added the position of Club Administrator.

#### WHAT IS CLUB ADMINISTRATOR? (LCI)

"In order to assist some club officers who may have difficulty operating certain technologies, Lions Clubs International created the role of **"club administrator"** to support a club president or secretary with administrative tasks that are completed through MyLCI/MyLion. This role has access to the same information in MyLCI/MyLion as the club president and secretary. Together and in consultation, the president and secretary may assign this administrative role if deemed beneficial for effective club operations. The **"club administrator"** is not a formal position recognized by LCI, but functions to provide administrative assistance only."

Acknowledgments: A special THANKS to the secretaries or club administrators with their con-



sistent reporting of MMR's and service activities. Having numerous responsibilities of being a secretary, some clubs may choose to appoint a Club Administrator (CA) to assist with reporting service activities. The following clubs have elected to add a CA.







My 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> grade social studies teacher, AC ("Sparkplug" & "Chrome Dome") Krause at the State College Jr. High gave me many words of wisdom besides teaching me how to "outline" - a skill that has helped me throughout my 76 years.

One collection of words that I have never forgotten and found to be mightily true over a 33-year career as a professional

scouter for the BSA is: Educate Before You Legislate. Explain to someone the "why" or the "value of doing something" before you share that task with them.

On this *Lions Tale*, page 9, my fellow Lions, you will see a listing (ever so subtly created and shared) of 14-G Lions Clubs that have completed their November 2022 Monthly Membership Report on time (and those that did not!) Which, according to the International Association of Lions Clubs, is before the end of each month. Check pages 9 and 10 in the Club Secretary e-Book- publication EN-CSEB.EN 2/2022. [pdf] Club Secretary e-Book The Monthly Membership Report (MMR) is expected whether or not there are any membership changes.

The easiest way to find the e-Book is to "google" – "Lions Club Secretary e-Book". There are ways of finding it on the www.lionsclubs.org site; "resources for members" tab - but googling is so much easier and quicker. If you can read 6<sup>th</sup> grade English, you can decipher this very beneficial guidebook. If you are your club secretary, or not, "take a gander (take a look from above)" and see what is expected of the job.

When a club secretary logs onto MyLCI, there is a section that reads: "Tasks to complete this month." Hit "the report no membership change button" by the 5<sup>th</sup> of each month, and the task is completed until the next 45+ days are up (the end of the following month !!). It literally takes longer to log into MyLCI than to complete the MMR!!

When I was appointed by DG Cheryl Wilbur in 2017 as the first District Administrator for 14-G, we set a target of having all the 14-G MMR's completed monthly. Not just to have them done, but to ensure that our records were accurate at LCI. Very few Districts have had the MMR record our beloved 14-G has had since the beginning of her Governor's year. The months of December and June are extremely important as the due's bills of LCI, MD-14, and District 14-G are based on those two months. If you have two Lions die, and three others move and leave our beloved Lions, and if not reported by Dec 31, or June 30, your club will be billed for those Lions. It is as simple as that.

I found out from a source at LCI, that non-filing of MMR's is one of several grounds for putting a club on "Status Quo," and that is not good!!! On Nov 29, 2022, at 2:36 ET, there were 18 of our 58 Lions clubs that had not filed their November MMR and were reminded by email from 14-G GLT PDG Cheryl Wilbur. Referring to page 9, you can see (in red lettering), the sixteen 14-G clubs that "missed the MMR Boat" in November - even after being gently and kindly reminded by email. If the club secretary is "computer challenged," the club president or administrator can accomplish this monthly duty.

First submitted every month is Ferguson Township Lions Club by secretary Lion Nevin Corl. This month he submitted their MMR at 12:01 a.m. CT - as Central Time is THE time at Oakbrook Illinois. Others done by December 5th were Benton; Catawissa Valley; Eagles Mere Laporte; Harris Township; Mansfield; Millville; Montgomery; Northern Tioga County Centennial; Pleasant Gap and Area; Rauchtown-Nippenose Valley; South Creek; Sylvania; Turbotville & Area; and Watsontown Centennial Lioness. Way to Go! Some of those have been oft-times been nonreporters and PDG C. Wilbur has had to submit it for them. It seems they got the message via her November reminder email! Please continue the good work.

If you read the list of Lions reading the *Lions Tale* and your president and/ secretary is not listed, encourage them to keep up to date by opening the *Lions Tale* Mail Chimp monthly. There seems to be a correlation between the late and non-MM Reporters and the number of Lions in those clubs reading the Lions Tale and if the secretary is among the readers. I took the time to fact check them for you.





Yep, it can happen to your club if the club is consistent on NOT reporting the club's Monthly Membership Report (MMR).
