Almost THE Final MMR Score for 2018:

Fellow Sub-District 14-G Lions:

This is THE ALMOST Final MMR Score for 2018!

A few days ago, before the major seasonal holiday we just observed that saves the economic fortune of many American Corporations, we still had 20 of our 60 14-G Lions Clubs in default of submitting their final Monthly Membership Report for 2018. As of yesterday we still had six (6) - Can you believe it -SIX - that still haven't gotten the message of "PLEASE log onto MyLCI and click the 'no change this month button' that submits your MMR within the first 5 days of each month."

Then, if there is a death, drop, or "wonder of wonders" - A NEW LION, the secretary or president can make that change later in the month when it occurs. This makes everyone's "Lions Lives" easy and enjoyable for the next 30 days until the next MM Report is due in a similar fashion.

Even after an un-necessary "prompting action" by our GMT IPDG Cheryl Wilbur, as of 7:05 p.m. on Dec 31, 2018, these four 14-G Clubs still have not completed their 2018 MMRs:

Big Pond

Canton

Shamokin Dam

South Creek

These clubs have all submitted their MMRs before so I know it is not a case of lack of knowledge of the skill needed in accomplishing the task!!! In recent *Lions Tales*, I have made the offer to help them – all it takes is a phone call to my number listed in the 2018-19 14-G Directory. It appears that after Dec. 31, 2018 calls from IPDG; 14-G GMT; MD-14 GMT Cher that the

only club as of 8:00 p.m., 12/31/2018, that totally let the 14-G record of "ALL MRRs IN" fall is club #5999 !!!

Shamokin Dam has responded, while Big Pond and South Creek have "promised." HOOO-RAY!!!!! (These 2 still have not reported as of 8:37 p.m. ET 12/31/2018).

Why are the December and June MMRs **SO** important. Several of your 14-G Leaders have attempted to explain that since June 30, 2018, what membership is "on the books" as of those "closing dates" is what the International Association of Lions Clubs ("International/ Oak Brook") bills your club for on July 1 and January 1. There is no longer a "month's grace period" to "remove and get a credit" as in previous years.

Also, we have three clubs that since July 1, 2018, have dropped one of four key mandatory reportable officer positions. The Membership Director was absent from Shamokin Dam; (resolved!!!) and both Bloomsburg (resolved) and Mt. Carmel (resolved) were missing treasurers. This is very important -- BECAUSE --- WHO RECEIVES THE DUES BILLS /// The TREASURER!!!!

Some very inspired Club Secretaries also have been taking the time to submit homemade reports to the *Lions Tale* Editor, our 14-G Governor Howard "Butch" Haus, and me. Many Thanks!, But save your typing skills for more important tasks.

But - and, I hope this is not offensive - if your service activities report and your Monthly Membership Report are submitted properly to the International Association of Lions Clubs (LCI), then your job is done!! No further reporting; however, as wonderful it may seem, is needed. If an activity is reported on these "homemade reports" and not submitted to LCI (using MyLCI), It does NOT count - it is as simple as that. The activity reports on MyLCI have

changed drastically in the past 3 three months. In fact, I believe they are actually simpler. Home made reports are therefore just an extra un-needed effort.

If you have paid attention (sorry to alert those clubs you have yet to visit Gov!!) to 14-G Governor Howard "Butch" Haus's presentation, you will have heard about the importance of reporting "ALL Lions connection service happenings."

I realize that many of our Lions are "computer/internet challenged." That is not a sin, but a sign of our maturing membership. Just ask their grand or great grandchildren "how behind is Grandpa, or Grandma??"!!!! Anyone can see the Monthly Club Health Assessments that ranks your own club as to how well YOU are doing in the World of Lionism.

The district governor (DG) is the chief administrative officer of the district and serves as the district governor team leader. The by-laws of the District Constitution and By-laws state a district governor's responsibilities include:

- Administer and promote membership growth and new club development.
- Administer and promote leadership development at the club and district levels.
- Promote impactful service projects, empower and support implementation at the club and district levels.
- Preside, when present, over cabinet, convention and other district meetings.
- Promote harmony among the chartered Lions clubs.
- Ensure that each Lions club in the district be visited by the district governor or other district officer once every year to facilitate successful administration of the club.
- Perform such other functions and acts as shall be required of him/her by the International Board of Directors.

Meeting the requirements is just the beginning of being a CEO of an organization. There are qualities beyond what is written down on paper. As the District Governor, there are individual club reports that need to be submitted to International; mileage charts for reimbursements; computer literacy; enjoy meeting people; comfortable speaking to large audiences; and being a multi-tasker to accomplish many areas of expertise in Lionism.

The training that is required by International will be the support system and where do I go when I need an answer to inquiries. Searching through the District e-Book is a wealth of information for any Lion.

#### **Ballot Question 2**

THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION CONCERNS THE CONSTITUTION. (THIS AMENDMENT TO THE BY-LAWS REQUIRES A TWO THIRDS MAJORITY OF THE VOTES CAST TO ADOPT.)

A RESOLUTION TO PROVIDE A REVISION TO THE SELECTION OF THE VICE COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON AND THE COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON AS LISTED IN ARTICLE VII, SECTIONS 1- COMPOSITION, SECTION 4-COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON, AND SECTION 5- COUNCIL VICE CHAIRPERSON.

BE IT RESOLVED, that effective July 1, 2019, Article VII, Sections 1, 4, and 5 will read as follows:

"Section 1. COMPOSITION. There shall be a State Council composed of all of the District Governors in the Multiple District and the Chairperson of the State Council (who shall be a Past District Governor), who are the voting members.

Section 4. COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON. The Chairperson of the State Council shall be the Immediate Past District Governor who served in the capacity of Vice Council Chairperson during the preceding year. The Council Chairperson will serve a one- year term only and cannot serve in that capacity again. In the event the Chairperson is unable or refuses to serve, or having accepted, resigns or dies, the sitting District Governors shall appoint an Immediate Past District Governor to serve the remaining term of office. If no Immediate Past District Governor is willing to serve, the District Governors may select a qualified Past District Governor to serve the remainder of the term.

Section 5. VICE COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON. The Vice Council Chairperson for Lions year 2019-2020 shall be the District Governor from District 14 P. The Vice Council Chairperson for Lions year 2020-2021 shall be the District Governor from District 14 T. The Vice Council Chairperson for the Lions year 2021-2022 shall be the District Governor from District 14 U. The Vice Council Chairperson for Lions year 2022-2023 shall be the District Governor from District 14 W. For Lions year 2023-2024 and thereafter, the determination as to who will be the Vice Council Chairperson for a given Council shall be made while that group is serving as Second Vice District Governors. One of the sitting Second Vice District Governors will be selected by the sitting District Governors at the Fourth Council of Governors Meeting. The first selection of a Vice Council Chairperson using this method will occur at the Fourth Council of Governors Meeting of the 2021-2022 Lions year. The Vice Council Chairperson will serve a one-year term (concurrent with the year as District Governor) and then become the Council Chairperson. In the event, either before or after becoming the Vice Council Chairperson, the Lion is unable or refuses to serve, or having accepted, resigns or dies, the sitting District Governors shall appoint a replacement from among the same group of Second Vice District Governors (who may now be First Vice District Governors or District Governors) to serve out the term of office and then serve as the Council Chairperson. If no one in this group is willing to serve, then the sitting District governors may select a qualified Past District governor to serve in the position."





- \*Passport Must be current and valid for six (6) months after your return
- \*Health insurance Medicare does not cover you out of the country; check your supplement insurance for coverage
- \*Travel Insurance Check with your travel agent to see if they recommend this coverage; estimated cost \$100 or more per person (Death benefits are important here)
- \*Visa Not required, if you are a United States citizen
- \*Currency Italy uses the Euro which can be obtained state side from various agencies, such as AAA (for a fee)

## **VOLUNTEER IN RETIREMENT . . . Why?**

Credit is given to Michael Scott with sharing a link to the group: Lions Clubs Help and Support Group.

According to a study done by the Corporation for National and Community Services, volunteering may lower the risk of health problems in seniors, such as dementia and depression. It gives many seniors a sense of purpose and greater satisfaction in life. It keeps the brain and body active. For many people once they stop working, they lose many social connections. The study indicates that about 85 percent of people who volunteer after retiring develop new friendships through their volunteer activities. And especially for those who live in a rural area, volunteering keeps them from becoming isolated.

Michelle Kaufman retired in 2015 from the New York Police Department where she worked for 35 years, most as an associate investigator. She now volunteers with the American Red Cross in Charlotte, N.C. though she has deployed several times

to volunteer at disasters around the country. In addition to volunteering for disaster response, Kaufman volunteers as a driver transporting life-saving blood products to hospitals within the region, a volunteer position she wishes more people would do. She says that volunteering with the Red Cross keeps her young, her mind occupied, and her life full of surprises. "Could today be the day I'll get a fire call or to be deployed," said Kaufman.

In a Nov. 15, 2015, U.S. News & World Report column, author Tom Sightings says that many volunteers feel that giving back to society means they make a difference in the lives of others, with 70 percent of retirees also saying being generous provides them a significant source of happiness. With this, Kaufman agrees wholeheartedly. While she finds it difficult to put into words exactly what she gets out of volunteering, she says that to get a huge hug from a client she has helped makes volunteering worth-while.

# 7 Reasons to Volunteer in Retirement

- "1. Retirees have the best opportunity. . . . They account for 45 percent of all volunteering hours, Merrill Lynch found."
- "2. They have the most money. . . This explains why retirees account for 42 percent of the money donated to charity, according to Merrill Lynch."
- "3. They find it fulfilling. . . Retirees who are active in charities also have a stronger sense of purpose and higher self-esteem. They have lower rates of depression as well as lower blood pressure and lower mortality rates."
- "4. It's a way to make social connections. . . Volunteering helps retirees meet people with similar interests and values."
- "5. Where does the money go? . . . About a third donate to relieve poverty, a quarter provide disaster aid and roughly 20 percent give to educational institutions."
- "6. Giving to family... A number of retirees also say it's more important to help put family members in times of need instead of accumulating an estate for their children."
- "7. Women versus men. . . They are more likely to give money and more likely to volunteer. Today, about a third of charitable bequests are made by married couples. But almost half are by women alone."

# Global Membership Chairperson

I will be the Guiding Lion, as well with the guidance of District Governor "Butch" Haus. They have already held a fundraiser that was very successful, so we have high hopes of this club forming this Lions calendar year!

We are also working with the Bloomsburg Lions Club. Due to this club floundering during this past year, it is considered a "Priority Club." To learn more about a "Priority Club" read the next page of this newsletter. We have met with the club in December, removed members that have not shown nor paid in a year, added 4 new members, and elected new officers. Every club is important to the association and to the community it serves. Priority designation gives the district the ability to focus on strengthening clubs that need additional assistance so they continue to serve far into the future. Priority club designation allows members of the District Governor Team (the district governor, first vice district governor or second vice district governor) to make up to two additional club visits to the club funded by the existing district governor budget. This designation does not change the status of the club nor change the clubs rights or obligations and is designed to provide support to clubs that need additional attention.

Priority clubs automatically include all clubs that have been chartered over the previous 24 months, clubs in status quo or financial suspension and clubs that have been cancelled over the previous 12 months that could be reinstated.

The district governor may request priority designation for five additional clubs. To request priority designation for clubs that are not newly formed, recently cancelled, in status quo or financial suspension as noted above, the district governor must indicate why additional support is necessary, provide a plan outlining the needed activities and assign a Guiding Lion to the club. The plan must be approved by the club, the district governor, and the first vice district governor and then submitted to the District and Club Administration Division. These clubs must continue to pay dues and fulfill the responsibilities of a Lions Club or may risk being placed in financial suspension and cancelled. If measurable progress is not made within six months, these clubs may lose their priority designation. A club is considered to have achieved success when it has reached the goals set by the club when priority designation was granted. More than five additional clubs may be given a priority designation with the approval of the District and Club Service Committee.

A priority club is considered an active club with all the rights and responsibilities of a chartered Lions club and should:

- a. Approve the assignment of a Guiding Lion to the club for two years and work closely with the district leadership toward rebuilding the club. The Guiding Lion must have the approval of both the club and the DG Team.
- b. Hold meetings to discuss ways to improve club management, develop leadership and increase membership.
- c. Report the progress toward regaining the designation of good standing to the district leadership and the District and Club Administration Division.
- d. Conduct service activities and fund-raising activities.
- e. Participate in district, multiple district, or international functions or seminars, including voting and endorsing or nominating a candidate for district, multiple district and international office, sponsor a Lions club, or organize a Leo club.
- f. Submit the Monthly Membership Report and other report forms.

Priority clubs must continue to pay dues and fulfill their responsibilities of a Lions Club or may risk being placed in financial suspension and cancelled. A club is considered to have achieved success when it has reached the goals set by the club when priority designation was granted. #### New Policy Effective October 17, 2018!

It is no longer a requirement to have served as club president in order to serve as a Guiding Lion. We encourage Lions to become Certified by successfully passing the Certified Guiding Lion Course prior to appointment.

#### **Designed for New, Existing and Priority Designated Clubs**

The Guiding Lion Program is designed to assist clubs that are newly chartered, established or determined as priority designation. Guiding Lions are assigned for a two-year term by the district governor in consultation with the sponsoring or established club president. Guiding Lions are limited to serving no more than two new clubs at any point in time.

Guiding Lions assist a club to:

- Be successful in its first two years of operation
- Orient and train club officers and members
- Motivate and support club growth and development
- Locate resources available to assist the club.

The application process is completed by the District Governor.  $% \label{eq:completed} % \label{eq:completeddef} % \label{eq:completedd$ 

Questions include:

"What are the goals to achieve while in Priority Designation?"

"How does the district plan to help the club achieve the goals?

In addition, 3 Guiding Lions need to be assigned and the approval of the club president, District Governor, and First Vice District Governor. International will notify the District Governor of the approval.

Join Together is a special program that was created to grow the capabilities of Lions Clubs International by encouraging other service minded organizations to join us on this journey of hope. We know that every caring man and woman matters in our mission of service. That's why we're inviting Lionesses to become active members and join our global force for good. The Join Together invitation has been tailored to recognize and honor Lionesses' service efforts prior to their decision to accept membership. Are there special incentives for a Lioness club to become a Lions club? Yes. We would love to have Lionesses serving with us as Lions. That's why we are offering existing Lioness clubs with special incentives to become Lions clubs, including: No minimum number of members required · Charter fee for existing clubs will be waived · The years as a Lioness carry over to Lions membership

How can a Lioness Club become a Lions Club? Lioness Clubs that want to join our global force would need to provide the following information:

- · Letter from a sponsoring club verifying the club's years of service emailed to newclubs@lionsclubs.org.
- · Join Together Charter Application Worksheet to collect club information that will be submitted online via MyLCI o Please indicate in the "Comments" section that the new club is part of the Join Together Program and is a Lioness Club affiliated with the (Sponsoring Club Name) Club. The Join Together Worksheet does not need to be submitted to MyLCI.
- · Report of Charter Membership Worksheet to collect all member information to be submitted to MyLCI. The Membership Worksheet does not need to be submitted to MyLCI. · Lioness Conversion Historical Record for each Lioness to ensure recognition of their past service

Can an individual Lioness become a Lion? Yes. The member would simply need to pay the entrance fee and international dues, as well as any other local dues. This would entitle the new member to the full benefits of being a member of our international association. For those Lionesses who have a family member that is a Lion, they would potentially be eligible to join the same club as a "family member," which would entitle them to discounted international dues.

What are the advantages of being a Lion? There are so many great benefits of being a member of Lions International. Members get to vote, attend convention and hold leadership positions that give them a greater voice in Lions. Members receive the support of Lions International, which provides service planning resources, professional development opportunities, and other critical benefits like insurance, legal counsel and advocacy so that members can serve with confidence. Plus, they receive the LION Magazine and access to great technology like the MyLion mobile app and the lionsclubs.org website and its resource center. And they get the pride of being an official member of the largest service organization in the world.

Who can I contact with specific questions about the Lioness initiative or Join Together Program? For questions other than chartering a Lioness club into a Lions club, please email any questions that were not answered above to membershipdev@lionsclubs.org.

Can a Lioness Club still keep their identity as Lioness in their Lion's Club naming convention? Yes. When you are chartering your club as part of the Join Together Program, we request that you use the naming convention of Municipality (city, town, village, prefecture, county, etc.) and then a "distinguishing designation" if desired, which could include the word Lioness. For example, a Lioness club in Hyderabad, India could be named as: Lions Club of "Hyderabad Lioness" Additional club name rules can be found in Chapter X of Board Policy. Clubs that do not utilize this naming convention will require special approval from the Membership Development Committee.

The "Jared Box" project was started in 2001 by the children at Our Lady of Victory School in State College, PA, to honor their classmate and friend, Jared. He was a brave little boy who battled cancer with courage and faith that continues to inspire us all. Jared was diagnosed with an incurable brainstem tumor in 1999. At just 5 years old, he demonstrated faith, wisdom, and compassion for others.

Jared maintained his sense of humor and the joys of childhood through play. He carried a backpack full of toys and games to all appointments and questioned why the other children didn't bring toys to their exam rooms. Jared's battle ended on November 12, 2000, while listening to his favorite song, "You'll Be In My Heart."

Chances are it involved play—whether it was a favorite vacation, special toy, or time spent with family and friends. A Jared Box is the gift of play to chronically ill children. Play is important, and a life threatening illness shouldn't interfere with the need to play."
