There was a Blind-Bowl-a-thon that was a huge success. Meetings were conducted in an orderly fashion and everyone was always willing to help out.

He, along with a number of other Leos were members of the EF Warrior Band. Mike participated in the Pennsylvania Lions All State Band several years. The All State Band performed at the Lions Clubs International Conventions and was made up of the best musicians in Pennsylvania. When Mike graduated and went on to college at the Catholic University in Washington D.C., being a Leo club member had been fulfilled, but he left his mark. Following his college education, Mike enlisted in the Marine Corps where he served his country well. Upon returning to his hometown following his discharge, he joined the Central Elizabeth Lions Club and eventually transferred to the Boston-Greenock-Mt. Vernon Lions Club. He was a true volunteer and he will be sadly missed by all who knew him. I was one of the advisors for the Leo Club – I knew Mike.

Lions Clubs International Convention in Montreal

Due to the continuing concerns about the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the board of directors voted to transition the 2021 Montreal Lions Clubs International Convention to a virtual event that will be delivered totally online. This decision was made with the health and safety of our Lions, staff and vendors in mind as limiting international travel and large gatherings is key to global containment strategies.

Although we are disappointed that we won't be able to host this event in person, we are excited about hosting our first virtual international convention that can safely connect Lions from around the world. We are still finalizing the details of your new convention experience and will share those with you as soon as they are ready.

Here are some important details about the 2021 virtual convention we'd like to share with you:

- Everyone's invited Our 2021 convention will be a virtual event that's open to all Lions and Leos around the world.
- Registration fees The registration fee will be US\$50 until March 31, then US\$75 beginning April 1. The registration fee for Leos will be US\$30 regardless of date. Convention is currently scheduled for June 25-29. Additional event and registration details will be provided soon.
- Current registrants Lions who are currently registered for convention will receive an email soon with more information about their registration options.
- Elections Executive officer and international director elections will be conducted electronically and voting procedures will be forthcoming.
- Convention updates Check our convention website <u>LCICon</u> for convention updates and details as they become available.



Dr. Jonas Salk administers a trial polio vaccine to David Rosenbloom in Pittsburgh in 1954. The widespread vaccine trials that year were the largest of their kind in history.

On February 23, 1954, a group of children from Arsenal Elementary School in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, receive the first injections of the new polio vaccine developed by Dr. Jonas Salk

This picture appeared in the Sunday, January 10, 2021 edition of the Pittsburgh Post Gazette. It shows a young student receiving the first polio vaccine.

That young man is David A. Rosenbloom. Some of our Lions members might remember David. He went on to become a doctor of optometry with his office in Pittsburgh. He was also an active (very active) member of the Pittsburgh Host Lions Club. He served on the District Cabinet as Coordinator of Blind Activities from 1979-1989. He was the depository for all eyeglasses that were collected. Lion David always had a smile and a personality that made him likeable by everyone.

The Campaign will be concluded with the Shaving event to be held at the first State Convention when our goal of \$10,000.00 is reached.




Pittsburgh DeafBlind Lions Club Christmas Gifts and Toys

BATTERY RECYCLING

Batteries should never be placed in the residential trash, so what do you do with them? Bring them to one of PRC's <u>Hard to Recycle Collection Events</u>! PRC is proud to offer a number of **Hard to Recycle Collection**

Events throughout Allegheny County to help local residents responsibly recycle materials that are not accepted into local recycling programs. Over the last 16 years, PRC has worked hard to expand this list to take as many different materials as possible to ensure that is is responsibly recycled instead of placed into the trash or illegally dumped.

Each of these products have different processes to be recycled into new products, which is largely why they cannot be recycled with your regular curbside recycling. In this **Hard-to-Recycle Materials Series**, we will be taking a closer look at what happens to the products that you bring to recycling collection events! This installment will focus on what happens to the batteries you bring to our events for recycling.

WHY RECYCLE?

Batteries contain a variety of heavy metals, which react with chemical electrolytes to power everyday electronics. These metals are extremely versatile and can be recycled many times, but when they a not properly disposed of they can contaminate water and soil. When batteries are recycled, not only are dangerous heavy metals prevented from harming you and wildlife, but those metals are also put back into a circular economy.

Some stores in your area may accept used batteries: such as batteriesplus and BestBuy.



"Reorganizing to Support Diabetes Patients in both Allegheny and Westmoreland Counties"

Did you know that diabetes is the 7th leading cause of death accounting for more than 80,000 deaths in our country every year? Diabetes can lead to heart disease (number 1 cause of death) and to stroke (number 5 cause of death). You need to be aware that patients with diabetes may also experience kidney failure, possible lower limb amputations, and *adult blindness*. What is even more alarming is that there is no cure for diabetes (CDC.gov).

So, why have Lions Clubs of Allegheny County, with support from Lions from Westmoreland County, provided financial support for diabetes patients who cannot afford their medications since the program started in 1993? This program that began at UPMC McKeesport is a Lions' priority (diabetes causing blindness) and was featured by Lions Clubs International as the first of its kind. The program later became a worldwide Lions' initiative. The diabetes program has become even more prominent and important today than ever before.

Every club in Allegheny and Westmoreland Counties should be proud and honored to know that their financial support has been beneficial to the ongoing survival of this vital program. And why is this important? Just think about it! If the Lions Diabetes Fund wasn't important and did not exist, the program would not have survived over 25 years and hundreds of diabetes patients would not have received medications to control their illness, possibly accounting for more deaths. In fact, most programs are gone within a year or two.





The Lions Diabetes Board of

Allegheny and Westmoreland Counties (LDBAW) reorganized in August 2020 to include assisting diabetes patients not only at UPMC McKeesport, but Westmoreland Hospital. This, too, is the first plan where two leading competing hospitals have been brought together for one cause - diabetes. Most recently, LDBAW learned that \$283,826 in medications reached 1,657 indigent diabetes patients at UPMC McKeesport since 2010. Moving forward now that

LDBAW support includes Westmoreland Hospital, these numbers will increase significantly.

Speaking as chair of the board, we are honored to have Past International Director Cindy Gregg serve as vice chair. LDBAW's new charter and bylaws were accepted and approved by Lions Clubs International because of Cindy's efforts. Lions Chris Tognarine serves as the board's secretary, and Lisa Gismondi is the board's newly appointed treasurer with no set term of office. We are also pleased to have both District Governors Chris Raynak and Chuck Tompkins serve on the board, along with their appointed diabetes chairs Lions Dave Zimmer and Ron Somers. Vice District Governors Mary Ann Belles, Margie Wolff, and Anthony Catullo are also represented in a board rotation with significant leadership roles over the next two years.

LDBAW's three and one-year terms are held by representatives from each county, and there are two permanent board members who were involved in the program from the beginning. They are: PDG Joe Donkin (permanent board member), PDG Mary Jane Keller, Lions Dee Connor, Marty Griffith, Dave Long, and Zack Mesher, as well as those serving as officers of the board. Up-to-date diabetes patient information is provided quarterly by program directors Carla DeJesus of UPMC McKeesport and Michele Axelson of Westmoreland Hospital. Hospital presidents Mark O'Hern and John Sphon and his vice president of primary care Judy Haliko, as well as medical directors Drs. Mon and Lang, support the Lions Diabetes Board's efforts. More information will follow on the possibility of scheduling a diabetes symposium sometime late spring. We are looking forward to their reports at our February board meeting.

The Burden of Diabetes in Pennsylvania

Diabetes is an epidemic in the United States. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), over 34 million Americans have diabetes and face its devastating consequences. What's true nationwide is also true in Pennsylvania.

Pennsylvania's diabetes epidemic:

- Approximately 1,144,000 people in Pennsylvania, or 11.3% of the adult population, have diagnosed diabetes.
- An additional 303,000 people in Pennsylvania have diabetes but don't know it, greatly increasing their health risk.
- There are 3,484,000 people in Pennsylvania, 34.1% of the adult population, who have prediabetes with blood glucose levels that are higher than normal but not yet high enough to be diagnosed as diabetes.

Diagnosed diabetes costs an estimated \$12.9 billion in Pennsylvania each year.

The serious complications include heart disease, stroke, amputation, end-stage kidney disease, blindness—and death.

Every year an estimated 67,000 people in Pennsylvania are diagnosed with diabetes.

Diabetes is expensive:

People with diabetes have **medical expenses approximately 2.3 times higher** than those who do not have diabetes.

- Total direct medical expenses for diagnosed diabetes in Pennsylvania were estimated at \$9.3 billion in 2017.
- In addition, another \$3.5 billion was spent on indirect costs from lost productivity due to diabetes.

McKeesport Lions Club thanks first responders

An annual dinner was replaced this year by gift cards to Eat'n Park.

The McKeesport Lions Club on Tuesday said thank you to first responders from the city by way of gift cards to a Lysle Boulevard restaurant.

The club, which meets each Tuesday evening at McKee's Point Cafe during non-pandemic times, has an aging membership and has been forced to scale back its meetings and initiatives during the coronavirus pandemic.

McKeesport Lions secretary Annette James, who is also McKeesport's city clerk, said club members gather each year to prepare meals at McKees Point Cafe alongside the cafe's staff for the McKeesport Lions Club First Responder Appreciation Dinner.

"The annual dinner could not be held and members could not get together to prepare the meal due to the pandemic," James said. "We usually cook the meal and deliver it, but it just isn't safe this year. Hoping things get better soon."

James said, the Lions weren't willing to forgo providing McKeesport police, firefighters and McKeesport Ambulance Rescue Service crews with a hot meal as a show of appreciation for protecting the city and its residents, as well as neighbors who live in communities where McKeesport first responders provide mutual aid. James delivered thank you cards Tuesday, along with gift cards for the McKeesport Eat'n Park. She said a few donors, who were not identified, chipped in to purchase the gift cards.

McKeesport fire Chief Jeff Tomovcsik said he and the firefighters are grateful each year for the Lions Club dinner, but they're especially grateful this year.

"The sentiment carries a little bit of extra kindness this year," he said, adding that 2020 and the beginning of 2021 have been rough on first responders and the communities they serve.

"It means a little bit more this year," he said. "We've had firefighters at work 24/7. The additional exposure to the public that the job creates just creates more stress to an already high-stress job. When a community organization like the Lions Club gives us a gift card for food at Eat'n Park, it helps. It makes the guys feel appreciated and puts some of the negativity of 2020 and 2021 in the back ground. Its a real nice gesture."

The fire chief said he thinks its nice that the Lions Club was able to show support for the McKeesport branch of Eat'n Park.

The chief and James said the staff and management at McKeesport Eat'n Park make an effort to be involved with the local community by raising money for and donating to charities from time to time and participating in city events.

"It's nice for the guys to be able to patronize the Eat'n Park in McKeesport and show some support for them," Tomovcsik said, adding that he misses the meal prepared by Lions, but is grateful because the menu at Eat'n Park reminds him of home-cooked food.

McKeesport police Chief Adam Alfer said officers are thrilled with the Lions' generosity.

"We are thankful to the McKeesport Lions Club. Their generous gift will allow each of our officers to get a meal during their shift," he said.

James said McKeesport Lions take pride in giving back to their community. Last month, the Lions volunteered to ring the bell for the McKeesport Salvation Army's Red Kettle Campaign in front of Giant Eagle on Oneil Boulevard. In addition to other events and initiatives, the club also annually holds dances and/or events to raise money and collect goods for the U.S. Postal Service's Stamp Out Hunger campaign, participates in numerous city-sponsored events and co-hosts the summer concert series at Renziehausen Park, which had to be canceled in 2020 due to the pandemic.
