



The Origins of Flag Day



This was the resolution adopted by the Continental Congress on June 14, 1777. The resolution was made following the report of a special committee which had been assigned to suggest the flag's design.

A flag of this design was first carried into battle on September 11, 1777, in the Battle of the Brandywine. The American flag was first saluted by foreign naval vessels on February 14, 1778, when the Ranger, bearing the Stars and Stripes and under the command of Captain Paul Jones, arrived in a French port. The flag first flew over a foreign territory in early 1778 at Nassau, Bahama Islands, where Americans captured a British fort.

Observance of the adoption of the flag was not soon in coming, however. Although there are many claims to the first official observance of Flag Day, all but one took place more than an entire century after the flag's adoption in 1777. The first claim was from a Hartford, Conn., celebration during the first summer of 1861. In the late 1800s, schools all over the United States held Flag Day programs to contribute to the Americanization of immigrant children, and the observance caught on with individual communities.

The Origins of Flag Day That the flag of the United States shall be of thirteen stripes of alternate red and white, with a union of thirteen stars of white in a blue field, representing the new constellation.



Hello District Governors of WPA Region,

The Lions Club is trying to get the word out to disabled veterans; bring your immediate family and use our camp facility for free. The 2021 schedule for "Veterans Project New Hope" weekend retreats at Pennsylvania Lions Beacon Lodge Camp is:

(1) June 12-16, 2021 and (2) July 3 - 7, 2021

Please provide this information to all the Clubs in your district. Four nights and all meals are provided at NO charge to the disabled veterans and their immediate family. All individuals disabled due to injuries as a result of military service as listed on their DD214 or suffering with PTSD related emotional issues are eligible and welcome to attend the retreats. Our goal is to fill all the cabins with veterans and their immediate families on these weekends and provide relaxation and fellowship with other veterans. One family per cabin, each cabin has a private bathroom and can accommodate up to seven family members. The cabin area includes the chow hall, infirmary, art room, laundry facility and activity center. Much is offered at Beacon Lodge; fishing, wheelchair accessible slopped entry swimming pool, 700 ft zip line, miniature golf and more on the mostly wooded 583 acres. Our team of nurses are on call 24 hours a day to address any health needs that arise and special diets can be accommodated with prior notice.

Beacon Lodge, owned and operated by the Pennsylvania Lions, is a facility designed and built to cater to handicapped of all ages. Beacon Lodge has proudly served over 35,500 campers in 568 sessions in 72 years. The Veterans Retreat was well attended in 2014. 2015-2019 there was about 60 veterans with about 190 family members. 
District 14-B Spring Rally


The "Pinning Ceremony" at the Honors Banquet






Members of the Pennsylvania State Council of Governors Class of 2021 - 2022 Members of the Pennsylvania State Council of Governors Class of 2020 - 2021




Remembering those who made the ultimate sacrifice...


