


Happy Easter Lions, Lioness and Leos,

Hello everyone! My name is Pat Gillule, and I am the new director at Lions Camp Badger. It is an honor and privilege to be part of something this exciting! I look forward to a great summer and am confident that we will accomplish much, all while having fun in the process!

Camp is no stranger to me, having worked at residential programs for individuals with special needs for twelve summers. I am returning to this setting after taking a break from it to raise my family. During the school year, I am also a high school special education teacher. I can think of nothing more rewarding than spending time with the individuals we serve.

Plans for camp are in full swing, and I am pleased to say that we are almost fully staffed. In addition to some talented returning counselors, we are bringing new people on board with a lot of great skills and abilities. Another special education teacher will be assisting me in our programming efforts. Our aquatics director will be with us full-time, and we added an additional part-time nurse. Collectively, our staff will be able to offer opportunities such as: Safety-based swim instruction, karaoke, professional DJ services, nature hikes, arts & crafts, gymnastics, martial arts, and camp theater. Our nursing staff is exceptional, with two RN's sharing the camp season. They bring to the table years of experience at other special needs camps, including programs for children with chronic illness, multiple special needs, and muscular dystrophy. Our LPN happens to be a crafter, so she'll be sharing those talents with our campers. We also hope to begin a volunteer program, primarily using students from local high schools to partner with campers as friends and role models.

I am in the process of contacting campers and their families for feedback on what they want out of camp. I love knowing what they want to learn--because if we can offer it, we will! One camper surprised me by saying he always wanted to learn how to play field hockey! So plans are underway for a modified, safer version of the sport that we can try out this summer! I also hope to incorporate a Club Night a few times a week. Here, campers can choose their interests from among a few activity choices. They will be encouraged to try new things or enjoy the things they already love. We also plan to bring back some favorite activities, such as a visit from the local fire department and a magician.

As of mid-March, over one third of our campers have already registered. Please encourage any families you know to get their applications in as soon as possible.

Thanks to the generosity of many clubs throughout the district, and other donations, the \$100,000.00 matching money needed to qualify VCB for the Residential Vission Rehabilitation Center construction grant from LCIF. was raised. LCIF. recently released its matching \$100,000.00 grant to VCB.

Do to construction site preparation for the residential rehabilitation center, regular center sessions were suspended, between November, 2016, and April, 2017. The 1st session will take place, April 7th through 9th, followed by a prevocational program, April 10th through 13th.

This year's Lions Spring Workday is scheduled for Saturday, June 10th, with Family Day scheduled for Sunday, August 6th. If rehabilitataion center construction continues on-schedule, as it currently is, it should open, August 1st, and should be available for tours on Family Day.

Today, there are over 21 million Americans living with vision loss and that number is on the rise.

THE QUESTION IS WHY:

- With medical advancements, many premature babies are surviving. Some of the survivors with vision impairments.
- People are living longer. Living longer provides opportunities to develop age-related macular degeneration or glaucoma.

In preparation of this presentation, I researched Lions' funding sources. Mentioning a few who support the lives of the blind, visually impaired and deaf are LCI, LCIF, NYS & Bermuda Foundation, Local Clubs, Lions Eye Institute, and Lions Eye Bank.

Outside the Lions' realm, an important partner to mention is the New York State Commission for the Blind. The Commission's mission is to enhance employability, maximize independence and to assist in the development of the capacities and strengths of people who are legally blind.

The magnitude of NYS Commission's Comprehensive service area is 21 funding recipient blind agencies. The Commission sets parameters and guidelines by population to determine the agencies' territories.

IS THERE A NEED FOR VISION REHABILITATION CENTERS?

IS THERE A NEED FOR VISION MEDICAL HEALTH & WELLNESS CENTERS?

Referencing a current project...Congratulations to VISIONS and participating Lions for its newly established Visions Rehabilitation Center. Not only was a LCIF's \$100,000 Core 4 grant awarded and acquisition of \$108,000 matching funds.

Another successful project is the Saratoga Lions and Northeastern Association for the Blind at Albany (NABA) joined in developing and operating the Saratoga Lions Health Center under the auspices of Saratoga Hospital.

CABVI has drafted a Sight First grant. Sight First mission is building comprehensive eye care systems to fight the major causes of blindness and care for people who are blind or visually impaired into action. Sight First grants upgrade hospitals and clinics, train doctors, nurses, and other healthcare workers, and distribute medicine and raise eye diseases awareness.

CABVI's region necessities for vision rehabilitation has grown significantly. The association embraced these needs with a rehabilitation - medical model, Vision Complex.

CABVI'S seven million dollar Vision Complex design includes:

- Three clinic exam rooms and eye glass services providing Ophthalmologists, Optometrists and Opticians low vision evaluations, orientation & mobility therapy, vision rehabilitation teaching, and children services. All of which improves quality of life.
- Physical & Occupational Therapies Services: PT& OT services ensure that older adults are able to age while remain participants in their communities despite their visual impairments.
- Visually Impaired children benefit the most from OT services that determines how vision impairment has limited the child's ability for daily tasks, and then modifies their environment
- Assistive Technology Center: State-of-Art Assistive Technology that provides lifetime skills Tech services range from preschool to adults of any age.
- Health & Wellness Facility:
 Allows people who are blind the opportunity
 to exercise in a safe and accessible environment.
 Plans include therapy pool and gymnasium.
- Offices for Vision Rehabilitation Professionals will be located in the Vision Complex. Blind

agencies' professional staff teach people to adapt to the challenges posed by blindness and visual impairment.

District 20Y2 has stamped their approval for further submission to LCIF.

CABVI's Vision complex addresses National Prevent Blindness and VISION 2020 initiatives in collaboration with NYS Commission for the Blind and federal, state and local organizations who are willing to underwrite holistic approaches to helping people with vision loss.



The proposed plan was adapted from others that we have seen over the years. We took it to our cabinets, clubs and members for their consideration and discussion. Each District held special conventions to discuss and vote on this plan and then came to the Multiple District council with our overwhelming support for redistricting. The council voted to put this question on the ballot in Lake Placid.

In our plan, District W will be split with two counties merging with District Y1 to become "Y" with 54 clubs and 1373 members. The remainder of W will merge with District Y2 to form the new "W" with 56 clubs and 1547 members.

For our districts to continue to serve our clubs, members and communities, we need to take this action. This was not an easy decision for any of us but is one that is necessary for our respective districts and for the Multiple District as well.

We hope that you will support us with an affirmative vote in Lake Placid. Thank you for helping us to continue to serve our communities.

Lions Eye Institute at Albany, New York, Inc. Patient Referral Policy

Consultants' Management Services LLC (Physicians), Albany Medical Center and other Lions Eye Institute (LEI) approved medical facilities will accept patient referrals from Lions Clubs.

- Lions may identify qualified individuals who appear to require subspecialty ophthalmologic services, who do not have private and/or governmental health insurance or the financial means to pay for such services, and who in the absence of assistance from the Lions are not likely to receive the needed ophthalmologic care.
- Only the Club President and/or Secretary may make referrals. Referral is limited to these two individuals so that the club leaders will know who has been referred and can evaluate the appropriateness of the referral and monitor the progress of the referral.
- 3. Referrals must be made in writing. All forms must be <u>completely filled out and signed</u>. Patients must sign the HIPAA-compliant consent form allowing the exchange of medical information between the patient, Lions and LEI Physicians.

- 4. Referrals are limited to emergency, diagnostic, therapeutic and/or surgical care. Routine eye care is more appropriately handled by local eye care providers and shall not be referred to the Lions Eye Institute.

To qualify as a referred patient, the individual, agent, guardian or Lions Club must make reasonable attempts to obtain private, charitable, or governmental health insurance such as Medicare, Medicaid, Fidelis, etc. It is the responsibility of the Lions Club to make sure this has been done. Any financial assistance provided by the Lions Eye Institute shall be limited to a maximum total of \$4,500 per patient. Applicants who may require surgery and/or hospitalization must also apply to Albany Medical Center for financial aid by contacting AMC's Patient Financial Services department at 518-262-1981 or 1-866-262-7476.
- 6. Requests for information concerning a referred patient may be received. For ethical, legal and confidentially (HIPAA) reasons, information will not be released to a third party unless there is a signed release from the patient.




