
LOWVILLE LIONS CLUB

The Lions club also supports the Capital Region NY2 Blue Star Mothers Holiday Troop Drive at Colonie Center in Albany. Lions volunteered to fill Freedom Boxes and the club made a monetary donation to defray shipping costs overseas.

On the first day of our new Lion year (July 1), while the International Convention in Chicago was celebrating Lions Clubs International's Centennial, Mother Nature "dumped" between 6 – 8 inches of rain on various areas of our region within a 24-hour period, causing flash flooding and devastation! The flash flooding resulted in our County Executive issuing a county-wide state of emergency banning all unnecessary travel for 48 hours. The eastern part of our District was also hit hard and through the efforts of IPDG James & DG John (initiated while at the Convention in Chicago), the District obtained Emergency Disaster Grants from LCI, the NYS & BLF and the Brandel-Murphy Youth Foundation. While local Emergency Disaster Agencies. i.e., the Red Cross, Salvation Army, County Emergency Personnel and

local Fire & Police Departments handled the bulk of the initial impact from the flooding, Lion Bill O'Mara and Jim Winkler obtained \$50 gift cards from our local ALDI grocery store in New Hartford along with a letter certifying their purchase and eligible items to be purchased upon redemption which complied with LCI Grant Guidelines.

Wearing reflective LCI vests, we walked door-to-door through several of the most severely affected areas in the Town of Kirkland and the Village of Whitesboro. We introduced

ourselves as Lions and offered the gift cards and one of our club brochures to the residents who were rebuilding/cleaning up their properties. Many properties/houses had been abandoned or condemned by governmental officials pending additional cleanup efforts or demolition. Recipients were extremely grateful and relayed their experiences about how fast the water came and how







Lion Paul said the idea to participate came about after discussing it with his son. Brandon thought it would be a great idea to entice our high school to join



storage for Long Island's collecting activities. Soon, though, the materials collected proved to be a challenge for the truck supplied by Phoenix Charity.

The generous stream of supplies of all kind kept on flowing after the truck left and one more truck was needed. Phoenix charity offered once more their help and the second truck was promptly provided. So many volunteers helped with the collection, storage and loading of the supplies; among them members

The local community was also not shy in giving a helping hand and both trucks brought the much needed provisions, all *110,000 pounds of them*.

As Sue Piccolo stated, "The water was not receding fast enough; it did not have a place to go. Flesh-eating disease started to pop up in various locations and these supplies were essential to a proper response to this tragedy." Regarding this aspect of the destruction hurricane Harvey had brought, medicines were in high demand and short supply, so Sue located a nurse, Mary, who provided contacts to supply much needed medicines to Beaumont Hospital in Houston.

After these laudable efforts by the Long Island Lions and the community they serve, one would think they would lay back for a while, but the arrival of two hurricanes in Florida and Puerto Rico (Irma and Maria) presented a dilemma to Sue: could they ignore this second attack from Mother Nature just because energy was low and it felt awkward to ask people for more donations? Well, Sue and her friends did not have time to sleep over this conundrum and they decided that a response was necessary, even if they had to be the only one to do it.

The love that the community has shown her and the **Massapequa Lions** over the years, though, proved once more alive and well, since \$1425 were promptly collected for Florida along with 15,000 pounds of supplies for Puerto Rico, proving

this generous and extended effort on the part of the Long Island Lions and their surrounding community a real success and confirming that brotherhood is still alive in America.

BABYLON LIONS CLUB

We'd like to let the community know what the Babylon Lions Club has been doing in response to the recent hurricanes that struck Texas, Florida, and Puerto Rico. Our Club has reached out to local Lions Clubs in the affected areas of both Texas and Florida. Representatives of Lions Clubs in both Rockport, Texas and Key Largo, Florida shared the tremendous needs of residents of both communities and informed us how committed they were to providing assistance to those most affected. The Babylon Lions Club immediately forwarded financial assistance to both Clubs in the amount of \$2,500 per community. We felt very comfortable in making these funds directly available since we know there would be no administrative costs and that Lions Club members, as well as respected activists and leaders in their communities, would know just what to do with the help we made available.

As far as Puerto Rico was concerned, the process was a little more difficult since the ability to communicate with a majority of the Island was so impacted. We did partner with an organization that specifically was formed to provide relief to those struggling to regain some sense of normalcy in their lives. Since there is such a connection between Babylon and Rincon, Puerto Rico and since residents of Babylon Village informed us how many people were hurting in Rincon due to a lack of water, electricity, and available work opportunities, we sent along a check in the amount of \$2,500 to assist the recovery efforts in Rincon. Again, we the organization we dealt with dedicated 100% of our funds to this effort.

We want to let our many friends in Babylon Village, West Islip, and Lindenhurst know how much we value their support. We always have, and always will, take seriously our responsibility to expend the funds we raise in our communities both prudently and compassionately.

FROM SST TIM JACHLEWSKI :-: DUES BILLING

All clubs should have received the dues billing from both Lions International and the MD-20.

MD-20 dues are \$20.00 per member annually. We bill semi-annually at \$10 per member in July and again in January. The office utilizes membership reports from LCI.

The MD-20 bills for life members. The Life Member program is exclusive to LCI only. The only category the MD-20 offers a reduced rate for is student members. Student members are billed at half the regular rate, \$5.00 per billing period

If you believe you have less members than what you were billed for you must send a copy (email or US Mail) of ether LCI's invoice showing the drop in membership or a membership report from LCI showing the member name and date of drop. We will not credit for drops occurring more than a month after the new billing. You may make the change on your invoice and send this information along with your payment but you will not receive credit if we do not receive something showing the reduction in membership.

We do not bill retroactively. In other words, if you gain or drop members in the six month period between billings we will not bill or credit for those members. We bill for the number of members LCI has for your club in June and again in July. So if you gain a member in Feb. or March-June you will not be billed for that member until the July billing. The same goes for dropped members.
