

Dear Club Officer,

Starting on June 30, 2018, dues credits for membership drops will not be issued after the release of the semi-annual billings on July 1 and January 1.

In the past, Lions Clubs International has given clubs a grace period in January and July to adjust their club rosters and receive a credit for unreported membership drops. This practice has been a courtesy extended to clubs by Lions International despite rules governing the practice in Board Policy. The board of directors recently decided that enforcement of existing policy is necessary in order to be in compliance with Board Policy.

Semi-annual dues are billed based on our records on January 1 and July 1 of each year. This means that clubs must update their membership rosters by June 30 and December 31 respectively to ensure they receive an accurate billing statement that reflects their club's membership. Members dropped after the release of the semi-annual dues billing will no longer be credited.

Here are a few best practices that can help you prepare for your July billing:

Update your club roster online using MyLCI or your regional reporting system.

Submit your updated membership roster to MyLCI or your local reporting system by June 30, 2018 CDT.

Inform current and incoming club leaders that membership dues credits will no longer be issued.



Vision Center on Blindness (VCB)

This is my corrected report about happenings at Visions Center on Blindness to The Lions District 20-Y2 Cabinet, as of May 15th, 2018. Due to a number of VCB staff changes, it was difficult until recently, to get a current update about the center, as people in their new positions were learning their new roles, and accommodating to changes taking place.

Nancy Miller remains the director of Visions Services for the Blind, the organization operating VCB, and other service programs for persons with vision impairments. Khaled Musa, who was Lions Club Coordinator, is now Director of Technology for Visions. Krystal Findlay Jones is now Director of VCB, and is its new Lions Club Coordinator. Anisio Correia is Senior Director for both VCB, and the new Visions Rehabilitation Center, VRC., which opened in August, 2017.

At the invitation of Anisio and Krystal, I was invited to speak to the 2nd class of students in the VRC, May 3rd. These students are completing a vocational readiness program, during which they're learning job finding and college readiness skills, and obtaining various vocational certificates, such as teacher's assistant, through local community college programs.

I and Lion Larry Krug, who drove me to VCB, were warmly received. Six of the seven students were present during my presentation, all recent high school graduates. None were from our district, which isn't unusual, since statistically, most of New York State's vision-impaired population is from the New York City area. We discussed my working experiences as a person who is blind, and things to be aware of when looking for and keeping a job.

The VRC currently has a potential capacity for 32 students. The program is being increased, over time.

A frozen pipe in the VRC kitchen broke in January, causing flooding damage in that area. This is currently being repaired.

VCB served 616 consumers during 2016-2017, none of whom were in our district. Donations from our district in 2016-2017 totaled \$500.00. To date, donations from our district I'm aware of, during 2017-2018, are \$50.00.

So far, Special highlights of the 2017-2018 VCB recreation program were: An apple picking weekend, family siesta weekend, and a Thanksgiving weekend. Also, there was a pre-

vocational program for high school students, and a walkathon fundraiser. There will be a training session, this weekend, on accessable fitness technology.

The Lions Spring Work Day is scheduled for June 2nd, during the June 1st through 3rd recreation weekend. The regular summer recreation program begins July 23rd, and the annual Family Day will be held, Sunday, August 12th.

– raw & rainy, it's a good thing we had rented a large tent with drop-down sides – approximately 125 people participated and the six clubs raised almost \$17,000. This total included pledges received that day and revenues realized through procurement of corporate sponsors and from advertising sales in our annual Program/Ad Book. This year our club was the beneficiary of pledge revenues collected by "Team Meyer" – a team comprised of family and friends of recently departed club member, Lion Nate Meyer. Comprised of over twenty-five members, they created their own team t-shirts and contributed over \$2,000 to our club in memory of Lion Nate. Because of their effort, we will designate two of our Senior Awards this

year in Lion Nate's name.

One member of our club attended the MD-20 Convention in Rochester the first week end in May and represented our club at District Governor John McDonald's Testimonial the third Saturday of May in Saratoga Springs.

We once again sponsored a Little League team this year by donating \$350 for purchase of uniforms and other operational supplies, donated a senior award for \$300 to a graduate at one of our neighboring school districts (Westmoreland Central School). With our annual Garage Sale fast approaching the first week end of August, we began actively soliciting merchandise and collecting and storing it in multiple area locations. To accomplish this, three members distribute flyers to local area residences conducting their own Garage Sales. These flyers contain contact information should they desire to donate any unsold merchandise at the conclusion of their own sales. So far, we have been very busy! It appears not only do we have more merchandise than at this time last year, but the merchandise appears to be of better quality... and we're quickly running out of storage space until we can move it to the sale location (the Clinton Arena)!

We continue collecting used eyeglasses from previously established businesses throughout our community and assisting on distribution day at our local food pantry by greeting consumers as they arrive, packing food orders and transporting bags to their vehicles. This month approximately 375 individuals received supplemental nutritious food for the next month.

DG John visited us at our last meeting of the month. He

presented our President – Lion Bill O'Mara - with the District Lion of the Year Award for his many years of service to Lions, leadership at the club and zone levels and for his assistance in responding to the victims of last July's flooding in our

In addition to presenting the District Lion of the Year Award, DG John also inducted two new Lions into our club. Lion Garry Colarusso and Lion Colleen Furmanski are now the newest members of our club. DG John also addressed our club about the newest LCI initiative, Diabetes Awareness

& Education. He informed us of the three-year financial commitment LCI will announce toward this cause at the International Convention in Las Vegas and offered some practical begin to educate our Colleen Furmanski. community regarding

→ And to donate blood.



Lions Eye Institute at Albany, New York, Inc. Patient Referral Policy

Consultants' Management Services LLC (Physicians), Albany Medical Center and other Lions Eye Institute (LEI) approved medical facilities will accept patient referrals from Lions Clubs.

- Lions may identify qualified individuals who appear to require subspecialty ophthalmologic services, who do not have private and/or governmental health insurance or the financial means to pay for such services, and who in the absence of assistance from the Lions are not likely to receive the needed ophthalmologic care.
- 2. Only the Club President and/or Secretary may make referrals. Referral is limited to these two individuals so that the club leaders will know who has been referred and can evaluate the appropriateness of the referral and monitor the progress of the referral.
- 3. Referrals must be made in writing. All forms must be <u>completely filled out and signed</u>. Patients must sign the HIPAA-compliant consent form allowing the exchange of medical information between the patient, Lions and LEI Physicians.

- 4. Referrals are limited to emergency, diagnostic, therapeutic and/or surgical care. Routine eye care is more appropriately handled by local eye care providers and shall not be referred to the Lions Eye Institute.
- 5. To qualify as a referred patient, the individual, agent, guardian or Lions Club must make reasonable attempts to obtain private, charitable, or governmental health insurance such as Medicare, Medicaid, Fidelis, etc. It is the responsibility of the Lions Club to make sure this has been done. Any financial assistance provided by the Lions Eye Institute shall be limited to a maximum total of \$4,500 per patient. Applicants who may require surgery and/or hospitalization must also apply to Albany Medical Center for financial aid by contacting AMC's Patient Financial Services department at 518-262-1981 or 1-866-262-7476.
- 6. Requests for information concerning a referred patient may be received. For ethical, legal and confidentially (HIPAA) reasons, information will not be released to a third party unless there is a signed release from the patient.

Pocketalker

Personal amplifier. Ideal for one-to-one communication and T.V. listening.

Infrared T.V. Listening System

Wireless, infrared amplification system.

Personal FM System

Wireless portable amplification system. Transmits up to 300 feet. Helpful for an individual or large group situation.

Amplified Telephone

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

CapTel Telephone

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability.

Amplified Telephone Ringers

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency and pitch tone.

Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using telephone with hearing aid.

Digital Alarm Clock

Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

Alert Master

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Personal Body Pager

Pager works with the Alertmaster. The person wears it to alert to sounds while awake.
