

What Will Your Lions Club Be Doing On February 13th?

One of the biggest misconceptions is that we have plenty of treatments available for pediatric cancer, when in fact only 4% of our government funds or cancer goes toward childhood cancer.

In 20 years only 4 new drugs have been developed specifically to treat children with cancer. In the United States more children die of cancer that any other disease!

How Can Lions Club Help?

Listed below are 10 suggestions to get your club started:

- 1. Raising Awareness in your club and community. Arrange for a speaker familiar to childhood cancer or hold a fundraiser at a local restaurant in your area.
- 2. Identify nearby childhood cancer center and provide crafts, books, puzzles and board games to children receiving therapy. All items must be new!
- 3. Gift Cards: I Tunes, Movie Passes, Targets, Walmart, Gamestop, Dunkin Donuts, Gas Cards, Stewarts, Price Chopper and Hannaford.
- 4. Prepare healthy meals for families in your area or contact the Ronald McDonald House. They are always looking for volunteers to cook evening meals.
- 5. Make or buy new hats, caps, head scarves to donate to childhood cancer centers.
- 6. Help coordinate travel arrangements to and from treatment for families and patients.
- 7. Sponsor a Comfort Bag or a Family Hope Bag Donate \$150 to help purchase items to help children being diagnosed for the first time and their families at Albany Medical Center. (Contact: janinecammarata@fighttobehealed.org)
- 8. Provide tutoring services to children with cancer and their siblings.
- 9. Sponsor a Luke's Legacy Pillow Teens battling cancer (skipper2dfl@yahoo.com)
- 10. Sponsor a child to attend a childhood cancer camp through Rosie's Love Foundation or Double H Ranch.

Provide children's entertainment at a local hospital. Distraction is a great medicine! Sponsor eye screening in you area day care centers to detect eye cancer. "WHERE THERE IS A NEED, THERE IS A LION." Please help spread Childhood Cancer Awareness.





- Collect and methodically apply feedback.
- Ensure that every member has adequate time to learn the MyLion system before transitioning service activity reporting from MyLCI to MyLion.

Where should I report my club's service activities right now?

You should continue to report your service activities on MyLCI or your local reporting system until your region received MyLion on the web. We will communicate well in advance when MyLion on the web is available for you to test in your region.

Where can I learn more about the MyLion app and eventually MyLion on the web?

Our website <u>www.mvlion.org</u> has tools, training resources, tolog posts, and more related to the MyLion app. We will update it with content related to MyLion on the web as we begin to release the platform. www.mylion.org is your main, easy to navigate resource for all things MyLion.

When will the MyLion mobile phone app be released in the European Union?

We are working diligently with our partners in the EU to meet the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). We will release the MyLion mobile phone app to European Union countries when we feel confident that the MyLion mobile phone app meets these requirements.
