This month is Leo Club Awareness Month. I want to thank Lion Katrina Plummer, our District Leos Coordinator for all her hard work with the seven Leos Clubs and their advisors. She gave an excellent presentation at our last Cabinet Meeting on how a Club can start a Leo Club and a summary of our Leo Club survey to date. Please go to our District Facebook page and you can watch the presentation. She is also available to assist Clubs in starting a Leo's Club.

April is also Environmental Awareness Month and April 22nd is Earth Day. The goal of Lions, Leos and Lionesses is to sustainably protect and restore our environment to improve the well-being of all communities. It would be wonderful if all our Clubs this month could provide an environmental assistance project to your community. Your Club can work with a Leo's Club or any youth group such as, Boys and Girls Scouts, Key Clubs, etc. and other service agencies to provide roadside cleanups, riverbank cleanups, and or a tree planting project.

This month we are also looking for 100% participation of all Clubs to LCIF's Campaign 100. Over 40% of the 20-W Lions Clubs have contributed to LCIF so far this year. The average contribution per Lion is approximately \$20.00. The total so far for our District is \$11,250. If all Lions in 20-W could contribute \$20 to LCIF this year we would raise nearly \$30,000.

We are also looking to get all Clubs to report. Did you know that a Club President or a Club Secretary can assign a Club Administrator to LCI to perform all the same task as a Club Secretary. If you need assistance, please let me know. We need to report our membership even if there is no change in status and all our service projects.

In April your club should be having elections of new officers for the 2019-2020 Lions year so your Secretary can input the new officers into MyLCI. Please be sure to report new officers as soon as they have been elected so they will get access to club reports starting in April. This is great as the mentoring process can begin sooner and our future club leaders are better prepared for their year. PCC Mark Whitney is offering training program for all new Club Officers, Region and Zone Chairs, please see article in last month's newsletter. These programs are open to all Lions not just officers. So if you are thinking about taking on a leadership role in the future in your Club, the District, etc. Please take advantage of these programs.

At our Cabinet Meeting this past weekend the nominations of Lions Ed Pike for District Governor, Lion Rick Brisee for First Vice District Governor and Ricky Lauren for Third Vice District Governor were approved by our District. Congratulations to these very committed and worthy Lions – we're in good hands going forward! ### **Scotia-Glenville Lions Club**

The Scotia-Glenville Lions, charted in 1954, have been selling Christmas wreaths as a fundraiser for 64 years. Each year they purchase blank wreaths and decorate them with bows and pinecones. Decades ago, the club would sell upwards of 1000 wreathes per year; however, now the number is closer to 250. Increased competition from other non-profit organizations and the convenience of large box stores have cut into sales.

Looking forward, the club is trying to differentiate their wreathes from others to encourage

sales. For 2019 the SG Lions will be utilizing a new technology to help make their wreaths stand out. Club president, Eric Buskirk, recently purchased a laser cutter for personal use and experimented with a simple addition for the wreaths – a wood ornament with a Lions logo on the front and club information on the back. Costing about \$0.10 each and taking about a minute to make, the ornaments are cost effective. Each wreath will get an ornament (bottom of photo to right) as a keepsake and help encourage people to visit the club website.

The laser cutter works like a dot-matrix printer with a head moving rapidly back and forth. Instead of leaving ink on

paper, a laser is fired vaporizing a small amount of material it's aimed at. This results in a recessed image or lettering with sharp detail in wood, plastic or other material. Once programmed the laser can quickly engrave and cut dozens of parts at the same time. Commercial laser cutters can cost \$2000; however, this model is ~\$350 and much more basic. While it does require considerably more effort to program, it's still a very capable machine. Questions on the SG Lions or the laser cutter can be directed to scotiaglenvillelions@gmail.com.

### Sight Preservation, Awareness, and Action

A s mentioned At the September meeting, DG Michele feels our efforts should primarily concentrate on assisting and reporting on, the activities of the vision-related service providers in our district, which is why we arn't currently reporting on Visions Center on Blindness, as we have in the past. Instead, over the next two reports, I'll briefly summarize current and planned initiatives of the major providers in the district, during theiricurrent and upcoming fiscal years.

In this report, we'll discuss plans of several of the agencies working with the blind and vision-impaired communities.

This year, the Central Association for the Blind and Visually impaired, (CABVI.), is reaching a major milestone. Founded in 1929, it was one of the Utica Lions Club's early major projects, because the club played a major role in founding it.

Planned events to commemorate this include an active volunteer recognition luncheon in April, a formal celebration at CABVI.'s annual meeting in May, and the projected opening of the agency's new Vision and Wellness Center, in August, prior to the retirement, that month, of long-time Executive Director, Rudy DAmico. A search is currently underway for his replacement.

As part of its expanded Blind Hockey Program, CABVI will be hosting the US. Blind Paralympic Hockey Team, which will be training at a site in the Utica Area.

CABVI. Is currently renovating a building in Syracuse, where it plans to reestablish an employment program for the blind, formally offered at that location by Aurora.

In cooperation with a woman working in Nigeria, The agency will be sending personal hygiene and educational supplies, to schools working with girls with and without vision impairments, who are students in that country. Many of these items are manufactured and packed by blind workers, in the agency's industry program.

Two years ago, the Glens Falls Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired, (GFABVI.), Celebrated 80 years of existance, during which Current Executive Director, Lion Phil Jessen, has been in his position for more than half of it! The agency was founded in 1937, and Lion Phil became its Executive director, in 1977.

To address the current shortage of vision rehabilitation therapists, particularly in rural areas such as GFABVI.'s, the agency is developing certificate programs to train Vision Rehabilitation Therapy Assistants, who will train people who are blind or otherwise visually impaired, in basic orientation and mobility skills, as well as home management and basic adaptive technology use. These certificate programs must be approved by the New York State Commission for the Blind, and will only allow orientation and mobility training, in or around the home of the person receiving service. For o & M training out in the community, a professional O & M instructor is required.

On Saturday, April 27th, GFABVI. Will be sponsoring an accessible art and blind artist exhibition, at the Charles Wood Theater, Glens Falls, from 1:00 to 6:00 PM. This will give people who are blind a chance to experience various art works, and the public the opportunity to experience the capabilities of artists who are blind.

The North Country Association for the Visually Impaired, (NcAVI.), is located in Plattsburgh, and is celebrating its 31st year of service, having been founded in 1989. It's the youngest of the agencies serving the vision impaired community in our district.

The agency works with the other agencies in the district, to serve consumers in Plattsburgh, and the Adirondack Region. Its current executive director is Amy Kretser.

The agency added job placement services, and hopes to offer a recreation day, if there's sufficient interest, to publicize ways in which the vision impaired community can participate in local recreational opportunities.

The agency is working with the YMCA, and other Adirondack educational and recreation organizations, to assist them in making there offerings accessible to vision impaired visitors. An example was the Access Adirondacks program, where trips to various Adirondack-oriented museums and recreational opportunities were arranged, to acquaint the agencies consumers with these opportunities, and how they were being made accessible to them.

#### **PRE SEASON REPORT**

**B** uildings and Grounds: The buildings and grounds at the Camp are in good order despite the flooding we had in the fall. Some flood damage will need to be repaired before Camp opens. Most of this work involves roadway repair, clearing of trees and brush from drainage ditches and repair of the small bridge over the stream. The buildings are old and some are in need of extensive repair and maintenance. For the safety and comfort of our campers our two largest cabins are being addressed first. The cost for this work is an estimated \$40,000. We have secured some funding through local grants but we also need the financial support of the Lions of MD-20 to complete the job.

Camp Staff: All but one of our Camp Staff positions have been filled including 4 foreign exchange volunteers; 2 from UK, 1 from Mexico and 1 from Columbia. We are looking for volunteer drivers and hosts to assist us in getting staff from Ithaca Airport to the Camp. Camp Program: This year Lions Camp Badger will offer five programs over six weeks for children and young adults with functional differences and intellectual disabilities; including a program for individuals with severe emotional and behavioral challenges requiring one-on-one attention. We will also partner again with Camp Abilities for a weekend session for visually impaired and blind campers. In addition to the many activities we regularly have for our campers, several new activities will be included. Square dancing, Mardi Gras Night, Cafe Night with a professional singer and the travel zoo from Animal Adventure Park. We will also have a volunteer service opportunity with "Sole Hope" to provide shoes for kids in Uganda.

#### What is MyLion?

MyLion is Lion's Clubs International's new digital service platform for all Lions and Leos. MyLion is available in two formats:

- The NyLion app is a mobile phone application that you can download on your smart phone. It was
  gradually released starting in 2017 and is available everywhere outside of the European Union.
- MyLion on the web is the next major MyLion application and is a website that you will be able to access on any device with a web browser. MyLion on the web will be gradually released over the next few quarters.

#### When will I have access to MyLion on the web?

Over the next few quarters, Lions Clubs International will work with our Global Action Team leaders to gradually release MyLion on the web to ensure there is adequate time for testing and training.

#### Why are we gradually releasing MyLion on the web?

By gradually releasing MyLion on the web we can:

- Focus on one region at a time and provide advanced notice and support to MyLion users.
- Collect and methodically apply feedback.
- Ensure that every member has adequate time to learn the MyLion system before transitioning service activity reporting from MyLCI to MyLion.

#### Where should I report my club's service activities right now?

You should continue to report your service activities on MyLCI or your local reporting system until your region received MyLion on the web. We will communicate well in advance when MyLion on the web is available for you to test in your region.

#### Where can I learn more about the MyLion app and eventually MyLion on the web?

Our website <u>www.mylion.org</u> has tools, training resources, blog posts, and more related to the MyLion app. We will update it with content related to MyLion on the web as we begin to release the platform. <u>www.mylion.org</u> is your main, easy to navigate resource for all things MyLion.

#### When will the MyLion mobile phone app be released in the European Union?

We are working diligently with our partners in the EU to meet the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). We will release the MyLion mobile phone app to European Union countries when we feel confident that the MyLion mobile phone app meets these requirements.

#### **Amplified Telephone**

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

#### **Amplified Telephone Ringers**

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency, and **p**itch tone.

#### Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using Telephone with hearing aid.

#### **Digital Alarm Clock**

Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

#### **Alert Master**

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

#### **Cap-Tel Telephone**

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability

#### **Personal Body Pager**

Pager works with the Alert Master. You wear it to alert to sounds while awake.
