

As summer approaches and we begin to wind down on our Lions year, it's important to take a look at our Service projects. Late Spring is a great time to focus and plan on events that we can complete now, over the summer or start planning for in the Fall.

The winter tends to bring a lot of garbage and debris that needs to be cleaned up. Attention shouldn't only be on our own backyards! Communities are always looking for volunteers to help clean up recreational bike and rail trails. Reach out to your respective town, village and city to determine the greatest need. If the physical aspect of a trail clean-up is a bit intimidating to your membership, enlist the aid of your Leo's or local Scout Packs & Troops. Joint service projects with other groups is a great way to tackle a project while also increasing our Lions visibility, and perhaps membership, in the community!

Our local food pantries are in need of our support! The summertime is a big challenge to the pantries. Donations tend to slow down, while demand picks up. With children out of school for the summer, it's important to consider ways that we can help. Consider a food drive before breaking for the summer. Backpack programs are also not active during the summer. Reach out to the schools and work to find out how we can support the children throughout the summer. Hunger is a major year-round issue! Let's step up as Lions and help out!

Our District is home to two Camp Abilities programs! The camps offer opportunities to children and teens who are blind and visually impaired. CABVI's summer camp (http://www.cabvi.org/camp-abilities-cabvi-2/) will run from July 28th – August 3rd. Camp Abilities Saratoga (https://campabilitiessaratoga.org/), the only camp in the world that is truly run by a Lions Club, will run from August 4th – 10th. We encourage our Lions to visit these camps. Please refer to the respective websites for more information.

Screening Eyes Early (Lions SEE) is an ongoing initiative with the majority of our clubs. KidsSight screenings through CABVI and NABA, or on your own, is very important to our community's youth. Please reach out now to begin scheduling screenings at your local day care programs and schools for August and September. Let's make a point to get into the schools early in the school year this Fall!

We continue to work with LCI and the American Association of Diabetes Educators (AADE) to formulate programs to educate and raise awareness of the need to monitor the conditions of pre-diabetes. Following our International Convention in Milan, we will be able to provide tool kits to our clubs that will help identify diabetes programs for your club. 



As part of the Club Officer Training Program, newly elected club officers and those Lions interested in becoming officers in the future should first complete the online self-study training module before attending the instructor-led onsite & webinar training in early May.



The "evidence-based diabetes self-management education will be accessible to all members of our community with diabetes or who are at risk for diabetes, and this project is a vital step in seeing this vision realized," the press release said.

The program is recognized for its success in guiding patients to lower their A1C values significantly, as well as lose and keep off weight, the statement said.

This is the first LCIF grant the district has ever received. A formal reception to celebrate the award and the vision of hospital's CDEs being realized will in May at the medical center.

The shredded paper was finally deposited in the rear section of the truck to be transported to Empire Waste & Recycling in Utica, NY. According to the gauges on the side of the truck, better than 3,000 pounds

of paper was shredded in a three-hour period.



What is MyLion?

MyLion is Lions Clubs International's new digital service platform for all Lions and Leos. MyLion is available in two formats:

- The MyLion app is a mobile phone application that you can download on your smart phone. It was gradually released starting in 2017 and is available everywhere outside of the European Union.
- MyLion on the web is the next major MyLion application and is a website that you will be able to
 access on any device with a web browser. MyLion on the web will be gradually released over the next
 few quarters.

When will I have access to MyLion on the web?

Over the next few quarters, Lions Clubs International will work with our Global Action Team leaders to gradually release MyLion on the web to ensure there is adequate time for testing and training.

Why are we gradually releasing MyLion on the web?

By gradually releasing MyLion on the web we can:

- Focus on one region at a time and provide advanced notice and support to MyLion users.
- Collect and methodically apply feedback.
- Ensure that every member has adequate time to learn the MyLion system before transitioning service activity reporting from MyLCI to MyLion.

Where should I report my club's service activities right now?

You should continue to report your service activities on MyLCI or your local reporting system until your region received MyLion on the web. We will communicate well in advance when MyLion on the web is available for you to test in your region.

Where can I learn more about the MyLion app and eventually MyLion on the web?

Our website <u>www.mylion.org</u> has tools, training resources, tolg posts, and more related to the MyLion app. We will update it with content related to MyLion on the web as we begin to release the platform. www.mylion.org is your main, easy to navigate resource for all things MyLion.

When will the MyLion mobile phone app be released in the European Union?

We are working diligently with our partners in the EU to meet the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). We will release the MyLion mobile phone app to European Union countries when we feel confident that the MyLion mobile phone app meets these requirements.

LIONS LOAN-OUT EQUIPMENT

Below is a list of assistive devices available at many of LHCS of NYS's Loan-Out Centers. (Other equipment may be available upon request)

Pocketalker

Personal amplifier. Ideal for one-to-one Communication and TV listening.

Infrared TV Listening System

Wireless infrared amplification system.

Personal FM System

Wireless portable amplification system. Transmits up to 300 feet. Helpful for an individual or large group sutuation.

Amplified Telephone

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

Amplified Telephone Ringers

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency, and pitch tone.

Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using Telephone with hearing aid.

Digital Alarm Clock

Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

Alert Master

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Cap-Tel Telephone

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability

Personal Body Pager

Pager works with the Alert Master. You wear it to alert to sounds while awake.
