Hearing impairment and deafness are serious disabilities that can result in learning difficulties for children and decreased employment opportunities for adults as well as social isolation.

The Long Lake Lions ask you to donate used hearing aids to the Lions Hearing Aid Recycling Program. Perhaps you, a family member or friend may have one or more hearing aids no longer in use. So please check those drawers as you spring clean. The Long Lake Lions Club will be collecting used hearing aids as part of an on-going recycling program. Look for the collection box in the Long Lake Post Office that can

The Long Lake Lion's Club is pleased to host the slide presentation "Logging in the Adirondacks" by Dick Nason on Tuesday, July 23 at 7:00 p.m. in the Long Lake Town Hall. PDG Nason is a retired forester, for Finch Pruyn, and Co. formerly one of the largest land owners of Adirondack forest property. The company purchased its first Adirondack tract, 13,000 acres, in the late 1800s and by the 1950s owned 202,045 acres of timberland to supply their mill operation in Glen Falls. Nason's forestry position in the company gave him unique access as well as an excellent perspective on the history of logging in the Adirondacks. He has just completed a first draft of a book about this subject. This important economic and environmental aspect of Adirondack history will come alive during his one-hour slide presentation.

While there is no admission fee, the club is requesting free will donations for their holiday food basket account. The Lions provide local families in need with a complete holiday dinner for Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter. The Luca Award is awarded to an individual or organization that has made a significant impact on employment and upward mobility opportunities for people who are blind and visually impaired.

The award honors former CABVI Vice President of Manufacturing, Luca Esposito. Luca played an integral part in developing product lines that employ most of CABVI's blind and visually impaired workers. Employment growth under Luca's leadership went from a small sewing group of several people in the basement workshop at Court Street to well over 100 at the Kent Street manufacturing facility.

The Guiding Light Award is an award bestowed upon an individual or group who made a significant contribution leading to rehabilitation program expansion and improved quality of service. They believe in CABVI's mission, join its team in challenging the status quo and play a key role

as we pushed boundaries to advance our cause. As a result of working together, this individual has a significant impact on programming and positively impacts the lives of those with visual impairment.

The Luca Award was presented by Dennis Webster, Senior Vice President of Production and Operations, and Rudy D'Amico, CABVI President and CEO.

The Central Association for the Blind & Visually Impaired (CABVI) hosted a graduation ceremony for its third graduating class of the Quest program. Quest is an upward mobility, certificate-earned program, integrating sighted and non-sighted employees, that is held over a 10-month time period. Participants meet monthly to attend lectures, study topics, participate in discussions, take part in group activities and projects, and ultimately, graduate with their classmates. The program started in 2016.

The program goal of Quest is to offer non-sighted and sighted employees a defined and integrated leadership program which will help them to prepare for personal and career development. Participants learn the skills to become stronger team players and improve performance in their current positions. Session leaders include executive/senior management, rehabilitation staff and outside consultants. Upon graduation, when future positions become available, participants in this program may receive special consideration providing opportunities for upward mobility with the agency.

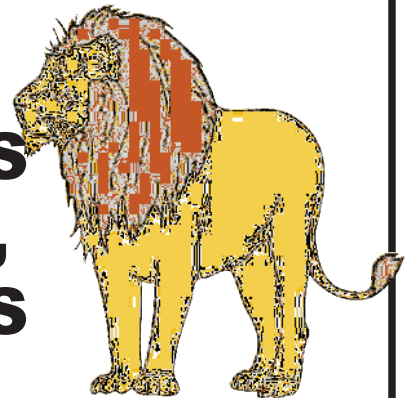

What is MyLion?

MyLion is Lions Clubs International's new digital service platform for all Lions and Leos. MyLion is available in two formats:

- The MyLion app is a mobile phone application that you can download on your smart phone. It was gradually released starting in 2017 and is available everywhere outside of the European Union.
- MyLion on the web is the next major MyLion application and is a website that you will be able to access on any device with a web browser. MyLion on the web will be gradually released over the next few quarters.

When will I have access to MyLion on the web?

Over the next few quarters, Lions Clubs International will work with our Global Action Team leaders to gradually release MyLion on the web to ensure there is adequate time for testing and training.

Why are we gradually releasing MyLion on the web?

By gradually releasing MyLion on the web we can:

- Focus on one region at a time and provide advanced notice and support to MyLion users.
- Collect and methodically apply feedback.
- Ensure that every member has adequate time to learn the MyLion system before transitioning service activity reporting from MyLCI to MyLion.

Where should I report my club's service activities right now?

You should continue to report your service activities on MyLCI or your local reporting system until your region received MyLion on the web. We will communicate well in advance when MyLion on the web is available for you to test in your region.

Where can I learn more about the MyLion app and eventually MyLion on the web?

Our website www.mylion.org has tools, training resources, blog posts, and more related to the MyLion app. We will update it with content related to MyLion on the web as we begin to release the platform. www.mylion.org is your main, easy to navigate resource for all things MyLion.

When will the MyLion mobile phone app be released in the European Union?

We are working diligently with our partners in the EU to meet the requirements of the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR). We will release the MyLion mobile phone app to European Union countries when we feel confident that the MyLion mobile phone app meets these requirements.

Below is a list of assistive devices available at many of LHCS of NYS's Loan-Out Centers.
(Other equipment may be available upon request)

Pocketalker

Personal amplifier. Ideal for one-to-one Communication and TV listening.

Infrared TV Listening System

Wireless infrared amplification system.

Personal FM System

Wireless portable amplification system. Transmits up to 300 feet. Helpful for an individual or large group situation.

Amplified Telephone

Adjustable volume control with amplified ringer.

Amplified Telephone Ringers

Provides adjustable ring volume, frequency, and pitch tone.

Whistle Stop

Phone adapter to prevent feedback from using Telephone with hearing aid.

Digital Alarm Clock

Wake to an alarm, a flashing light, or a portable pillow shaker.

Alert Master

Uses a pillow shaker and a lamp flashing simultaneously to alert you to a smoke detector sounding, door knocking, telephone ringing, and alarm clock activation.

Cap-Tel Telephone

Telephone that has both amplification and caption capability

Personal Body Pager

Pager works with the Alert Master. You wear it to alert to sounds while awake.
